




YOUR INVITATION TO "WACCAMAW'S GOT TALENT"

Celebration of Black History Month





Anderson, SC. Four of the six who qualified for state placed in the top four within their weight class. Head Coach, Scott Cook, stated, "To date, in our six year history, we have only had four place in the top four over the years. This year we had four in one year!" Senior Parker Williams was a silver medalist as runner-up state champion in the 152 lb. weight class. He holds the honor of being the highest place finisher of any wrestler that started and finished their career within the WHS program. Juniors Shea Burke (145 lbs.) and Arman Singh (126 lbs.) each rallied back in the consolation round to take home a bronze medal in their weight class, going 3-1. Junior Bobby Walters (120 lbs.) placed fourth going 2-2 and senior Connor Summer (138 lbs.) and sophomore Gabe Pope (120 lbs.) did not place, yet each gained valuable experience. The Waccamaw Warriors boy's lacrosse team dropped their 2014 season opener to visiting Bluffton 11-5, at Stables Park on Friday, February 28th. Sophomore attackman Griffin DesMarteau, sophomore midfielder Colin Floyd, and junior attackman Knox Walters each scored their first career goal as a Warrior. Senior attackman Jackson Homnick chipped in with a goal, while DesMarteau (two goals) and Walters (one goal and one assist) each finished with two points to pace the Warriors offense. Waccamaw finished an impressive 10-13 at the faceoff X. Sophomore goalie Jonah Maro went the distance in cage making 15 saves, including eight in the second-half—many at point blank range.

WHS JV BASEBALL 2014 GEORGETOWN INVITATIONAL CHAMPIONS

For the second year in a row Coach Tyler Vick led the JV baseball team to a championship win in the Georgetown Invitational.

On Friday, February 28th, Waccamaw and Andrews played in the first game of the tournament. Sophomore Connor Eckard led on the mound striking out six Yellow Jackets, picking up his first win of the season. In the fifth inning, freshman reliever David Geney earned the save with a double-play to end the game. The Warriors were led at the plate by freshman Daniel Rourk who was 3-3 with a run scored, sophomore Forrest Powell who was 2-3 with a run scored, and sophomore Tripp Perrow who tallied two RBI's along with a base hit and run scored.

On Saturday, March 1st, the second and final day of the tournament, Waccamaw started the day with a game against the Georgetown Bulldogs. Pitcher Forrest Powell dominated the mound with a complete game shutout, throwing 53 pitches in five innings while only allowing two hits, picking up his first win of the season. Freshman McKinley Grooms doubled to start the third inning and was later driven home by Connor Eckard to take the lead. Tripp Perrow had a double and run scored late in the game to add to the Warriors lead. In the last inning, the Bulldogs attempted a comeback but Powell would force a fly ball to third base to end the game.

With two wins, Waccamaw faced Johnsonville for the Championship title. They found themselves behind in runs for the first time all weekend but rallied back to take the lead and win against Johnsonville. Sophomore veteran Christian Hendrickson took the mound in the first four innings with freshman closing pitcher Karl Strittmatter striking out the final batter of the game in the fifth to clinch the championship title. Leading at the plate were Daniel Rourk who scored on a fielder's choice, freshman Alex Scogin with a single and a score on a fielder's choice by freshman catcher Shelton Rutherford and Rutherford with a hit in the bottom of the fourth that drove in pinch runner David Geney to take the lead for good. Coach Vick stated, "The Warriors pitched and played defense extremely well over the weekend, adding timely hitting to take the crown in Georgetown." Congratulations JV!

Nominators may wish to gather the following information before beginning the nomination process:

- Student information: Including full name, age, date of birth, complete address, phone number(s), email, current school and address, expected high school graduation month and year. This information will be used to verify the student's eligibility at several points in the review process, so be sure the information is accurate. Entering an incorrect age, date of birth, or
- · Parent/Guardian information: Name, phone and email.

other inaccurate information, may disqualify the student.

- Primary volunteer activity information: Including type and purpose of activity, student's involvement for the past 12 months, hours invested, any items collected or money raised, number of people affected, outcome of the project and general project description.
- Other volunteer service information: Student's involvement in other volunteer activities for the past 12 months, including hours invested.

Awards

Nomination forms will be separated into two age groups: ages 6-12 and ages 13-18. Kohl's plans to recognize one student from each age group as a store winner for each Kohl's store. Winners are chosen based on the benefits and outcomes of their volunteer service. Each store winner will receive a \$50 Kohl's Gift Card. Scholarships will be paid in one installment in August; the check will be mailed to the recipient and will be payable to the recipient's gualifying Institution.
