## GET THE BLOOD FLOWING

In Ms. Stephenson's anatomy classes, students have been learning about blood pressure and heart rate. The classes learned how to use a stethoscope and a sphygmomanometer to take each other's blood pressure. First, the students broke into groups of three and one member of the group laid on the floor for 10 minutes without talking, to let their body relax, and lower their blood pressure. Then the team took the blood pressure of their test subject. The next part of the lab was for the test subject to jump up on their feet as fast as possible, so the team could measure their heart rate and blood pressure as it skyrocketed. After that, the test subject would stand against the wall for 12 minutes and the team would take their blood pressure and heart rate in 2 minute intervals, to watch the blood pressure settle down again. Another part of the lab was that the test subject of the group had to run/walk for 5 minutes, then 10 minutes, while their group took their blood pressure and heart rate. The purpose of the Blood Pressure Lab was to help the students understand blood pressure and its effects on the body, as well as how to measure someone's blood pressure and heart rate.

- ◇ The week before Prom tickets will only be available through Mrs. Tester or Mrs. Griffin and will go up to \$45.

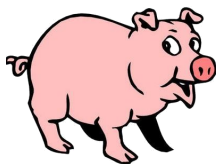

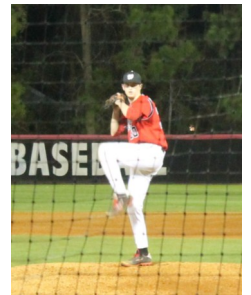
The boys' varsity baseball team had an exciting weekend March 7-9<sup>th</sup> hosting the Coastal Invitational. The tournament, recognized as one of three high level tournaments by the SC Baseball Coaches Association, was established to harness the best baseball talent in the state. Teams participating ranged from 1A-4A

schools, hand-selected each year based on potential for their up-coming season. Those in attendance this year were: South Florence, Cheraw, Broome, North Myrtle Beach, Pelion, St. James, and Greenwood.

On Friday night, the boys played their first game against 4A South Florence but were unable to secure a win with a close score of 4-3. It was an exciting game, leaving the Warriors on top with a score of 5-4. Scott Hiler, making his mark on the game, hit a double and three RBIs. Alongside Scott, Andrew Reichert also hit a double, bringing in two of his fellow teammates for runs. JC Tolson was named Palmetto Cheese player of the game for his fantastic defensive playing during the duration of the game.

## Emerging Public Leaders

June 22–June 28, 2014

Center for Education Policy and Leadership (CEPL)  
Richard W. Riley Institute at Furman University

**What is the Emerging Public Leaders program?** Leadership is a trait acquired over time through experiences, knowledge, mentoring and skill development. That's why we've created a week packed with experiences that enable students to gain the confidence, motivation, information, and skills necessary to become leaders in both domestic and international policy arenas.

**What are some of the highlights of program?** This exciting and innovative program, which received a "South Carolina on the Move" award from U.S. Senator Jim DeMint (R-SC) in 2005, features sessions with local, state and national governmental leaders as well as members of the faculty of Furman's Department of Political Science. Students attend lectures, participate in off-campus trips, and interact with speakers and faculty individually and in small-group sessions.

**Who is eligible to participate?** This program is offered to a select group of rising high school seniors who want to get involved and make a difference in the world.

**How is the Emerging Public Leaders program structured?** The summer program features on- and off-campus lectures and special sessions addressing topics such as community activism, working with the media, international politics, and issues surrounding poverty. Previous speakers include former U.S. Secretary of Education Richard W. Riley, State Representative Gilda Cobb-Hunter, State Senator Joel Lourie, and former Congressman Bob Inglis. Students have visited places such as the Greenville City Council Chambers, the South Carolina State House, and CNN Headquarters in Atlanta. Throughout the week, each student also participates in activities and workshops designed to help them identify a problem or need in their own community and to develop a student-led project addressing this problem or need. Participants return to campus the following spring to present the results of their projects to their peers and a panel of judges. Additional project funds are awarded to the winner.

**What is the cost?** The program is free of charge to participants; expenses including tuition, supervised on-campus housing and food will be paid for by the Riley Institute. Program participants will have access to campus amenities such as the James B. Duke Library, tennis courts, jogging and fitness trails. In addition, each student's high school will receive a grant to fund the community project selected by the student.
