Closing out the show was The Brothers Will playing "Waiting on the World to Change" by John Mayer









Once someone is diagnosed with ALS, they typically have 2-5 years to live. Every 90 minutes someone is diagnosed with ALS and every 90 minutes, someone loses their fight against ALS. There is no known cause for ALS and it costs roughly \$200,000 a year for treatment. Mr. Dewalt got involved with ALS last year when he taught his students about Tuesdays With Morrie. When asked about the event, Mr. Dewalt said, "Thanks to everyone who donated! It is really great to see so many people willing to support such a wonderful cause and I would like to thank the National Honor Society for helping with the setup of the event."

## **SPACE CITIES:**

Monday- Thursday, July 14 - 17, 2014, from 9:00 A.M. - 3:00 P.M.

This class is designed for students completing **2nd and 3<sup>rd</sup> grades**. Students will learn about living and working in Space, where astronauts sleep, how they eat, exercise, and work and spend free time. They will design and build space stations in cooperative groups using recycled materials and participate in activities involving EVA assimilations, hands-on science experiments dealing with microgravity, weightlessness, and astronaut foods. Students will learn to develop their imagination and creativity. Students will learn to explore NASA websites that will challenge their imagination throughout the remaining summer months and beyond. Enrollment is limited to 24 students. Cost: \$160

## **SPACE EXPLORATION:**

## Wednesday - Thursday, July 9 & 10, 2014, from 9:00 A.M- 3:00 P.M.

This class is for students completing 4th - 6th grades or students who have previously completed the Space Cities Class. Discover and learn about Orion's features, innovations and design capabilities of the future. Students will learn how innovations developed in space influence life on earth. Students will learn more about where America is going next, including the International Space Station, the moon, near Earth Asteroids and Mars. Students will investigate and experiment with scientific principles relating to space exploration. Classes will include hands-on experiments in topics such as robotics, rocketry, weather, layers of the atmosphere, and space suit technology as it relates to health care, satellites, and hydroponics. They will interact with an educational specialist from the Johnson Space Center. Students will consider technological advancement careers in aerospace fields, and how these impact the quality of life on earth. Emphasis will be on critical thinking skills, problem solving and deductive reasoning. Cost: \$90 which includes tuition and all rocket materials. Class is limited to 24 students.

The two person teaching team will be composed of Connie Richardson Smith, an educator/consultant/Morningside College adjunct instructor. Co-teaching is Mary Richardson Tester, from Pawleys Island, South Carolina, who teaches high school special education at Waccamaw High. The teaching team has successfully taught this aerospace science camp for many years adding new features each year. Both teachers have completed graduate work at the University of Iowa in Science Education through the Iowa Chautauqua Program; have completed teacher training at the Johnson Space Center through the Space Exploration Educators Conference and Mrs. Tester attended MoonKam training in Las Vegas through the Sally Ride Science Institute. The teachers are assisted by junior volunteers

who have been past participants.

## WHS Tennis Falls to Bishop England

On Thursday, the Waccamaw Warriors boys' tennis team fell victim Thursday to a determined effort by the Bishop England Battling Bishops to defeat the Warriors for the first time in 14 years.

Despite strong individual efforts by the Warriors, archrival Bishop England of Daniel Island defeated them in sets, 4-2, to capture their first victory over the Waccamaw boys' tennis team since 1990.

"The team as a whole is more focused this year because we concentrated on tournament play, which made us mentally tougher – and to beat Waccamaw that is what you have to be," said Lukas Zalesky, Bishop England's No. 1 player. Zalesky defeated Waccamaw's Justin Dunn, playing in the No. 1 position, in two sets, 6-2 and 6-4.

The Warriors needed to win three of the five individual matches or two individual matches and the doubles match to force a tie-breaking doubles match in the play held at the Creekside Tennis and Swim Club in Mount Pleasant. They came close.

Waccamaw's number three player, Ben Hewes, defeated his opponent, Daniel Knott, in two sets, 7-5 and 6-2. Hewes stayed focused and hit consistently strong against Knott, a new player for Bishop England who moved to the United States from the Virgin Islands in January of this year. Hewes, a sophomore at Waccamaw, said, "He was a really good player and he fought hard. I was able to stay focused and fight throughout the entire match."

Jaz Greene, playing in the No. 5 spot for Waccamaw, defeated his opponent, Brian Privett, in two sets, 6-4 and 6-1. Greene, selecting his ground strokes carefully, kept his opponent on the move in a quick-paced match.

Waccamaw senior Kevin Mushock, who played with teammate freshman Stephen Russell in the doubles match, is eager for the rematch. "We have a whole month to prepare. We won't let this happen again."

Bishop England's team includes three of its top five players from last year, when they were defeated by Waccamaw. "We have been waiting 14 years to beat Waccamaw," said Bishop England coach Kristin Fleming, in her second year of coaching the boys' team. "We have a team with more depth this year, and we are happy that we accomplished what we have worked really hard for."

The Warriors gathered together after the game and collectively agreed that this match was a wake-up call, and they need to return to the level of play of two years ago when they were state champions.

Waccamaw Head Coach Lynn Hunt commented, "Waccamaw Tennis is resurging as the season progresses. We lost a close match to perennial power Bishop England without 3 of our usual starters. Coupled with the fact that several of our younger players are just coming into their own on the courts, our future looks very bright. We are looking forward to the rest of the season and expect to do well in the playoffs."

The Warriors will be playing in regional matches before they meet Bishop England again on April 30<sup>th</sup>. The Warriors played Mullins High School on Wednesday, March 26<sup>th</sup>, and played a double header against Aynor at home on Thursday, March 27<sup>th</sup>. All home matches begin at 4:30pm.
