

Who's Your Baby?

Before spring break, Key Club wrapped up their "Who's Your Baby?" fundraiser in honor of The Eliminate Project. The goal was to match funds with the Pawleys Island Kiwanis to help support a program that seeks to eliminate Maternal/Neonatal Tetanus (MNT). This lethal disease affects those who struggle financially in geographically remote areas of over 25 different countries across the globe, usually afflicting many people without any health care. MNT is caused when tetanus spores found in the soil come in contact with open cuts or sores during childbirth. Newborns suffer from convulsions and extreme sensitivity to light and touch, while

mothers usually do not survive the days following the birth of their children. MNT is extremely preventable; with just three doses of a sixty-cent vaccine given to the mother, she passes on her immunity to her newborn child making the sickness even harder to spread to future generations.

Mr. Arias and Mr. Phillips, teachers at WHS, volunteered to help raise funds for this special cause. They agreed that the person who received the most donations would dress up like a "big baby"; students "voted" for their favorite baby through donations. As for Mr. Arias, he could not pull off a win over Mr. Phillips, leaving Phillips to prance around the hallways and cafeteria of WHS in his pre-planned baby outfit—complete with a giant teddy bear, bonnet, and diaper. Our Waccamaw Warriors boys tennis team reached mid-season, continuing its winning tradition by besting Marion High in both ends of a double header. With only four matches remaining in the regular season, the Warriors are 5 and 4 overall, but are undefeated in region matches. Lower State playoffs start on May 8th and the State Team Championships will be on May 17th in Columbia.

Waccamaw vs Marion

Before spring break, Waccamaw played a double-header against Marion. Justin Dunn, playing in the No. 1 position, dominated Tyler Williams, 6-0, 6-0. Playing at No. 2 Joey Hewes controlled most of the points and defeated Matt Williams of Marion 6-0, 6-1. Also noteworthy was the Warrior duo of Thomas Rowland and J. D. Tucker, two 8th graders, who crafted a fine win over Matt Pridgen and Brian McQueen 6-4, 6-2. Other scores: Ben Hewes defeated Zi Huang 6-1, 7-5; Woody Tudor beat Gabriel Thomas 6-1, 6-0; and Parker Brinson over-powered Brandon Sanders 6-0, 6-0 concluding a Waccamaw sweep of the top of the double-header 6-0!

In the bottom of the double-header, scores were much closer. With both teams agreeing to play eight-game "Pro Sets" to save time, the Warriors got off to a great start with Joey Hewes playing the No. 1 position beating Tyler Williams 8-1. The second match was then tied when Ben Hewes playing up at No. 2 lost a close, hard fought match to Matt Williams 4-8. Waccamaw's Jaz Greene got the team back on track coming from behind to best Zi Huang 8-6. Kevin Mushock kept up the winning way by dominating Gabriel Thomas 8-1. In the next match, the contest got a little closer when Parker Lipton lost a hard fought match to Brandon Sanders 6-8!

The victory came down to winning the two doubles matches. Again, in fine Waccamaw tradition, our players came through as Justin Dunn and Joey Hewes proved unstoppable beating

Williams brothers 8-1. Next, our No. 2 doubles team of Spencer Kemp and Scott Johnson, both 8th graders, displayed exceptional teamwork and outplayed their opponents, winning in convincing fashion 8-1.

Waccamaw vs Socastee

On Monday, April 28th, the boys tennis team faced Socastee HS, last year's AAA State Champs, at home. The team lost to Socastee 3-4.

Waccamaw vs Mullins

In the No. 1 doubles match, Parker Brinson and Kevin Mushock were on a roll when the Mullins team forfeited due to an injury. In the No. 2 doubles match, 7th grader Thomas Rowland and 9th grader Lach Dancy played an outstanding match and prevailed in an eight-game Pro set 8-1.

Counselor's Corner

Georgetown County School District

Many students are very close to qualifying for one or both of the awards below, and could re-test for higher scores for eligibility. Below is the criteria for both the Honors Certificate and the South Carolina Academic Achievement Honors Award. For questions, see your quidance counselor.



Honors Certificate

Criteria:

- ♦ A minimum of 28 Carnegie Units and qualify for a South Carolina high school certificate
- ♦ A minimum Grade Point Average of 3.5 on the State Uniform Grading Scale
- A minimum composite SAT score of 1200 or a composite ACT score of 27
- ♦ A minimum of three (3) courses at the Advanced Placement (AP), or College (Dual Credit) level with 2 of the 3 at the AP level.
- ♦ Three Carnegie Units of foreign language
- Students will present evidence of participation in one school-sponsored organization such as athletics, academic team, student government, clubs, etc. each year in grades 9-12, or complete 50 hours of approved community service accumulated during high school

Final determination of eligibility for the Honors Certificate will be made after the 135th day of school in the semester prior to graduation. Schools, in consultation with the appropriate district administration, will retain the right to revoke the Honors Certificate in the event of any eareaious offense(s).

SC Academic Achievement Honors Award

Criteria:

- ♦ Complete twenty-four units of credit as prescribed
- Meet the standard on all subtests of the Exit Examination
- ♦ Receive a minimum grade of "B" for each semester course in grades 9–12 through the seventh semester
- Achieve either a score of 710 or higher on the SAT verbal, a score of 690 or higher on the SAT mathematics, a score of 30 or higher on the ACT English, or a score of 33 or higher on the ACT mathematics

- OR -

- Each student shall have completed twenty-four units of high school credit
- Be eligible for graduation with a state high school diploma
- Have a combined score of 1400 on the SAT verbal and math sections, or an ACT composite score of 31

Of the twenty-four units earned, **eighteen units** must be **college preparatory coursework**, four units in additional electives, and two units in one or more of the following: English, science, social studies, or mathematics.

College preparatory coursework includes the following:

- English (English I or above), four units
- mathematics (Algebra I or above), four units
- laboratory science, three units
- social studies (United States/South Carolina studies, economics/ government and one unit of global studies/world history, global studies/ world geography or western civilization), three units
- computer science, one unit
- physical education, one unit
- foreign language, two units

Counselor's Corner

HGTC NURSING PROGRAM

The Associate in Applied Science in Nursing (ADN) degree prepares students for the challenges of modern healthcare. HGTC has a unique opportunity for qualified students to begin the Nursing program this fall. Ten (10) seats will be reserved for Fall (5 on the Grand Strand campus location and 5 on the Georgetown campus location). If you are a 2013-2014 High School Graduate and would like to enter into the HGTC Associate Degree Nursing Program's Scholar Initiative, please complete the "High School Nursing Scholars" form and send it to nursing@hgtc.edu by June 18th. (See guidance for a form.)

The admissions criteria for these seats are as follows:

- 1. Be a current year high school graduate.
- 2. Reside in Horry or Georgetown County.
- 3. Make a minimum of 1000 combined CR and Math score on the SAT or a composite score of 21 on the ACT, with a minimum score of 480 in each on the SAT and a minimum score of 19 on the English and Reading and a minimum score of 21 on the Math on the ACT.
- 4. Submitted a complete college admissions application with HGTC. A complete college admissions application consists of:
 - a. HGTC Admissions Application
 - b. b. Official High School Transcript with graduation date on file with the Admissions Office
 - c. c. Official ACT and/or SAT scores on file with the Admissions Office
- 5. The 10 students with the highest GPA (who meet the first 4 criteria) will be offered the nursing scholars initiative seats.
- 6. Students with the highest GPA will be allowed to choose if they will attend the Grand Strand or Georgetown campus until either location reaches the maximum enrollment of five (5). After one location achieves the maximum enrollment of 5, students will be placed in the unfilled campus location.

First Annual Summer STEM Academy

Georgetown County School District is seeking participants (rising sophomores, juniors, and seniors) for its first annual Summer STEM (Science Technology Engineering Math) Academy. Are you a hard-working, conscientious student interested in pursuing STEM related careers?

Georgetown County School District has developed the STEM Academy in conjunction with the Waccamaw Regional Education Center, Horry-Georgetown Technical College, and the Dream It Do It™ program. The summer academy is designed to encourage and serve capable, highly motivated students, who score in the middle quartiles on test performance by removing barriers and providing students with experiences that meet college and career readiness standards. This is significant because Georgetown County School District has a mission of providing challenging educational programs that prepare all students to be responsible citizens and lifelong learners.

During the five days of the course, rising sophomores, juniors and seniors will learn basic engineering principles, develop 21st Century skills, and enhance their understanding of math and science concepts. Students will tour industries within the county and visit a college campus. Additionally, students will work online in the Career Ready 101 program and take the ACT® WorkKeys® assessment giving them the opportunity to earn a National Career Readiness Certificate. On the afternoon of the fourth day, there will be an awards ceremony as a culminating event for the STEM Academy. Students participating in this program pay no fees.
