Last Friday, Jessica Levkoff, the High School Culinary Specialist from the International Culinary Schools at the Art Institute came to Ms. Hossa's CATE (Career and Technology Education) classes to speak. She gave a presentation about the various programs offered at the Art Institute and showed examples of past student work. In the Foods and Nutrition classes and the Family and Consumer Sciences 1 class, Ms. Levkoff focused on the culinary related fields; in Fashion class, she focused more on the fashion related fields. All classes, however, were able to see her demo of Espinacas a la Catalana, a spinach dish from Spain. She reworked the recipe to make it more of a



Espinacas a la Catalana (Spinach Catalan Style)

Ingredients:

or honey.

- 1 baguette, cut into ½ inch slices
- 2 Tablespoons olive oil, to toss with bread- you can use more if desired Cinnamon and sugar- use an amount to your liking
- 2 Tablespoons olive oil
- 1 cup sweet apple (golden delicious works well), peeled and diced Honey- use an amount to your liking
- 1/4 cup pine nuts (in class we used pumpkin seeds)
- ¼ cup dark raisins
- 5 cups baby spinach, washed

Directions:

- Slice the baguette into ½ slices and place in a large bowl. 1.
- 2. Drizzle with olive oil so all pieces have some oil on them.
- Add cinnamon and sugar to bread slices and toss to lightly coat.
- Preheat oven to 400 degrees and bake bread until lightly brown.
- 5. Peel and dice apples. Drizzle with desired amount of honey.
- Heat olive oil over medium to high heat (be careful not to burn 6. the oil).
- Add the apples to the pan and brown lightly, about 1 minute.



- Add the pine nuts (or pumpkin seeds) and cook until lightly brown, 30 seconds, stirring occasionally.
- Add raisins.
- 10. Turn off the heat, add spinach and toss until the spinach starts to wilt.
- 11. Add salt and pepper to taste.
- 12. Top bread slices with spinach mixture and serve.



WACCAMAW SHUTS OUT THE TROJANS

Last Friday night, September 19th, the Waccamaw Warriors shut out the Green Sea-Floyds Trojans 35-0 and had a great



all-around game; they are now 3-2. Rob Ferraro, Tyriq Grant, and Kevin Gasque led the offense. Ferraro started at Quarterback and had a 20-yard touchdown run. Grant also played well and had three rushes for 53 vards and a touchdown. Gasque had a personal best with ten rushes for 203 yards and two touchdowns. He was named Coastal Player of the Week and received a plaque (see below). Defense also played its part, not allowing the Trojans to score a single point and held Green Sea-Floyds to under 100 yards of total offense. It did not take long for Waccamaw to score; within the first four minutes, Waccamaw scored two touchdowns,

including a 40-yard run by Gasque. Shortly before the half, it began to rain which quickly turned into a heavy downpour. This did not stop the Warriors, as the game kept going. As people began to flood out of the stadium and as the field itself began to flood, the score was 21-0 at halftime. Ferraro had the highlight play of the game; he ran to the left and when it seemed as if there was no where to go, he backtracked and switched to the right side of the field and into the end zone. The downpour continued and both sides had trouble with the ball. The Warriors still ended up on top, scoring another two touchdowns and securing a 35-0 lead that they would keep for the rest of the game.



Homecoming Parade Float Guidelines

- All floats must be pulled by a motorized vehicle. The driver of the vehicle must be at least 21 years of age.
- 2. All floats must be no higher than 6ft., longer than 14 ft., wider than 14 ft.
- There should be no more than 10 individuals on a float; six individuals in the back of a truck. All other participants should walk along side the entry.
- Due to safety concerns, any and all objects, including candy, will not be permitted to be thrown from any float. All objects must be handed to children along the parade route, or gently tossed underhand from people at ground level.
- All signs used for reference for judging will be made by the homecoming parade committee and affixed prior to the parade. An area on driver's side should be left clear in order to affix the sign. Signs will be affixed magnetically.
- 6. All entries must follow the parade route from beginning to finish.
- All entries must arrive on time, which is 4:30 pm. Any entry that arrives after the parade start time will be placed at the end of the line up and will not be judged.
- The parade is finished when ALL entries have arrived at the high school parking lot. At that time, floats are free to leave the high school. All floats must be removed from the parking lot by 6:30 pm.
- 9. All participants in the parade must sign a waiver before participating in the actual parade.
- 10. All school rules of conduct apply to those participating in the parade and will be enforced accordingly.
