#### Paris Under Attack

On Friday, November 13<sup>th</sup>, the City Of Lights fell into a dark and horrific night. Paris was the victim of terrorist attacks in seven different public locations. The first explosion occurred outside the Stade de France during France and Germany's soccer game, and moments later, a second explosion went off inside the stadium. Almost simultaneously, two restaurants were under fire by terrorists with assault rifles. The fourth location, a bar called A La Bonne Biere, endured another shooting, and attackers also shot at customers eating outside La Belle Equipe. A suicide bomber blew himself up inside the restaurant Comptoir Voltaire, with similar explosives to the



terrorists at the stadium. The final location was a concert at the Bataclan, where three armed attackers opened fire. During this horrible night of unjustified terror attacks, a total of 129 innocents were killed and 352 were injured. Countries throughout the world expressed France's national colors on their monuments to show their support and condolences. Three coordinated teams of terrorists appear to have been behind the execution of this attack, and the Islamic State has claimed responsibility in an official statement. In retaliation, on Sunday, November 15<sup>th</sup>, France launched a massive airstrike against ISIS in Syria. At least one of the terrorists is confirmed to have entered Europe disguised as a Syrian refugee, causing immense concern for the safety and security of nations that are accepting these refugees by the tens of thousands. President Obama claimed that the United States would still accept their original goal of 10,000, however, so far at least 30 states have ruled not to accept these people. After the Paris attacks, much of the world is left in fear, not knowing where ISIS will strike next. However, the citizens of Paris have not lost hope.

# Advanced Placement Firing Squad

On Friday, November 13<sup>th</sup>, AP Physics classes ven-

tured outside to test their knowledge on Projectile Motion by firing water balloons at their teacher, Mrs. Bray. The young physicists were taken out to the football field with roughly a dozen water balloons, launchers, various measuring devices, and what they know about Projectile Motion. Projectile Motion, summed up, is the measurements that consist of throwing/launching an object. Students stood in their teams 80-90 feet from Mrs. Bray. Two students held the launcher while one was pulling back and angling the launcher. The remaining team members took measurements of how far the launcher was pulled, the angle of the launcher, the airtime of a water balloon, and taking an estimation of a water balloon's distance that it was launched. The students got to enjoy applying what they've learned to real life, along with the extra satisfaction of getting bonus points, and no repercussions, for hitting and soaking Mrs. Bray.



### **Waccamaw Sailing Team Finds Silver in Raleigh**

Temperatures are beginning to drop but not the spirit of the Waccamaw sailors. Last weekend the team traveled to Mooresville, NC, a suburb of Raleigh, to compete in the SAISA Lake Crabtree Open Regatta. Four sailors made the journey, sophomore Noah Benton as A Fleet Skipper, eighth grader Ella Smith as A Fleet Crew, sophomore Noah Giltmier as B Fleet Skipper, and sophomore

Anna Sandor as B Fleet crew, along with Coach Bob Turner. The morning temps were in the low 40's but quickly warmed up to the low to upper 50's to low 60's. Not good sailing weather you say, on the contrary. It was a fantastic day, the sun peaked out and the ten high school teams from North Carolina, South Carolina, and Tennessee hit the water a little after 11:00 on Saturday.

The winds on Saturday to start the races were a steady 10 knots with gusts to around 15 knots. By mid-afternoon, the winds became a little more unpredictable with wind shifts of up to 30 degrees at times with wind speeds dropping to the 3-5 knot range and then back up to the 10-12 knot range. The sailors had to depend on their skill, knowledge, and experience to keep up with the changing conditions on the water. Coach Bob, after every race, would debrief our sailors coming off the water, and let the next crew heading

out know the conditions they would likely ex-

pect. We haven't discussed this, but so everyone understands, each fleet races two races and then returns to the dock to rotate boats and crew. First A Fleet races, then B Fleet and so on until racing is complete for the day.

With the completion of 16 races, 8 for A Fleet, and 8 for B Fleet, the Warriors found themselves with an overall total of 66 points for the day. The A Fleet total was 36 points, and the B Fleet total was 30 points. This would place them in second place overall. The team made


