

Junior – Senior Prom 2015 Rules & Information for Prom

- Prom will be held on May 2, 2015 at 8 p.m.
- Location: Heritage Plantation, Pawleys Island
- Proper formal attire is required.
- Tickets will be sold at school during lunch periods
- A WHS ID will be required for the purchase of tickets.

Ticket prices are as follows:

*<u>Apr.15 – Apr. 24</u> WHS Seniors - \$15 per person WHS Juniors - \$30 per person All Others - \$40 per person <u>*The week before Prom Apr. 27 –May 1</u> All tickets - \$40 per person

- Any student planning to invite a date who is not a student at WHS will need to have prior approval from Prom Sponsors Mrs. Tester or Mrs. Griffin <u>and</u> WHS administration. Contact Prom Sponsors before you purchase your tickets to get approval.
- All Prom attendees must be 20 years of age or younger and at least of high school age. Any exception to this rule must be approved by administration.
- All sales are final. No ticket refunds.
- A WHS ID or SC driver's license will be required at the door when entering prom.
- After check in at Prom students will not be allowed to reenter if they leave.
- Only seniors will vote for Prom King & Queen as they enter the door on prom night. Crowning will be held at 10:30 pm at the prom. The winners must be present to accept the crown, or the runner-ups will be crowned.
- Smoking is strictly prohibited inside the building and outside on the premises.

Anyone regardless of age, who arrives at the prom under the influence of alcoholic beverages or any other illegal substance, will be denied entrance. Further legal and / or administrative consequences may result.

Waccamaw was represented in the 2015 All State at Winthrop University by five of the top vocalists at WHS: Mac Atkinson, Stephanie Cook, Ashlyn DeLoach, Chris Holmes, and Ariana Senn. These students performed with both a mixed or SATB choir and with ladies' or men's choir. All State weekend is a strenuous, high performance experience which requires excellence in vocal skill, music reading, ability to follow music direction, and to blend with others in ensemble. The top vocalists from high schools across the state were chosen in November and invited to perform in the choirs at Winthrop University. Rehearsals began Thursday evening at 8:00pm and restarted Friday morning at 9:00am. Rehearsals ran all day except for meal time and everyone gave their all in this event. Students rehearsed with top level directors, chosen from universities across the country. The finale for the three days of rehearsing and very hard work came with the final showcase on Saturday in the infamous Byrnes Auditorium. To stand on this stage as an All State participant is an honor and part of a long time South Carolina tradition for students. Our students bring great pride to Waccamaw by their awesome accomplishments each year. Congratulations, WHS chorus students!

Each spring, the Congressional Institute sponsors a nationwide high school visual art competition to recognize and encourage artistic talent in the nation and in each congressional district. Since the

On Saturday, March 7th, Waccamaw defeated visiting White Knoll 12-4. ڬ Senior Knox Walters put on an

offensive clinic as he faced his former school with a season high of seven goals, three assists, and seven ground balls. Junior Ethan Chapman (one goal and three assists), freshman Hanes Grafe (two goals), senior Walter Reid (one goal), and junior Colin Floyd (one goal) all contributed offensively as well. The Warrior offense was sparked by a quick passing attack and tremendous off ball movement. Defensively, the Warriors were physical and relentless as a unit. Junior Gavin Chilton continued as an anchor while generating 21 saves and facilitating the clears. Junior and Captain Todd Maas led all defenders with three takeaways while guarding White Knoll's leading scorer. This marks the first time in the program's brief history that lacrosse has earned a winning record (3-2).

Waccamaw faced a tough away game at Carolina Forest on Wednesday, March 11th. Carolina Forest has produced impressive offensive numbers so far this season but expected to be well matched by a strong Warrior defense. Results of the game were not available at press time.

Last weekend, March 5th - 8th, the Waccamaw Warriors hosted the annual Coastal Invitational. This year, the teams invited to the tournament included: J.F. Byrnes High School, Johnsonville High School, Chesnee High School, Lewisville High School, Greenwood High School, Conway High School, Palmetto High School, and Waccamaw High School. In the first game of the tournament on Thursday, Waccamaw faced J.F. Byrnes High School. Waccamaw's starting pitcher, Tucker Perry, threw well against a 4A J.F. Byrnes squad that had multiple D1 recruits. The opposing team scored runs early off of timely hits; however, Waccamaw could not do the same as Alex Altman scored their only run. The final score was 7-1, a tough loss for the Warriors. On Friday, Waccamaw played Johnsonville in a close, hard-fought game. The starting pitcher was Forrest Powell who pitched a great game vs. Johnsonville only giving up one run through six innings pitched. Levi Almond also had a great game; he hit in the last run to secure the 2-1 win and closed out the last inning, pitching to end the game. He was the Palmetto MVP; congratulations, Levi! On Saturday, at 5:30pm, the annual Coastal Invitational Homerun Derby took place. Waccamaw's participant was Carter Fox; although he didn't win, he showed off his hitting skills by hitting a long homerun to left field. After the homerun derby Waccamaw faced the Palmetto Mustangs. The starting pitcher, Fox, struggled in the beginning but eventually settled in and began to strike out many Mustang batters. The Mustangs didn't hit the ball very well, but they got their hits when it counted, with men on base resulting in multiple runs. Nonetheless, Fox still threw a good game with multiple strikeouts. Waccamaw hit the ball considerably well and Perry had a clutch hit in the gap that scored two runs and put Waccamaw back into the game. The score was 6-3, but neither team could score any more runs and the score was left at 6-3 until the end of the game. In Waccamaw's last game of the tournament, Waccamaw played Chesnee for the 5th place spot in the tournament. Both teams were scoreless after the second inning until Waccamaw started to pour in runs. Almond was the starting pitcher and threw a very good game, having multiple strikeouts and giving up zero runs. Waccamaw overpowered them 7-0 after several players were pegged by pitches that led to people on base, which gave the Warriors an opportunity to put runs on the board. Waccamaw took advantage of these runners; Connor Eckard had a great hit with the bases loaded that scored two runs and put the game away. The game ended with a final score of 7-0.
