

Last Wednesday, the 22nd, the Warriors hosted Socastee for two heated games. The girls were able to defeat the Braves 1-0. The boys faced a considerable challenge as Socastee scored the first goal early in the game. The Warriors were able to even the odds when Blake Marsh scored off an assist from Todd Mauney, tying the game at 1-1. Socastee regained the lead in the second half after a foul within the box led to a penalty kick. Waccamaw proceeded to fall apart, allowing the Braves to put in one more shot. The game closed out with Socastee victorious over the Warriors 3-1.

Friday, the 24th, the boys traveled to Loris to take on the Lions on their home field. The Warriors scored three goals in quick succession twenty minutes into the game. Mauney was responsible for two of these, assisted by Marsh. The third goal came from Boomer Frank, who followed up a loose ball that came in on a long ball from Davis Hogan.



Loris managed to put one in of their own, but at little consequence due to the Warriors two-goal lead. Marsh scored one of his own later on, assisted by Hogan. The final goal came in the second half when Chris Crosby played a beautiful ball to Mauney who finished it for a hat trick. The final whistle sounded with the Warriors defeating Loris 5-1.

This week, both varsities traveled to Aynor on Monday, April 27th, to make up for the games that were previously rained out. The girls played a solid game, defeating the Blue Jackets 6-2. With this victory, the girls closed out the season as Region Champions. The boys took to the field, ready to ensure region victory as well. Mauney scored the first two goals, assisted first by Carson Stecz and then Marsh. The Warriors prevented Aynor from any real attempts at the goal all throughout the game. The third and final goal came from Matt Staub after Mauney put the ball into the six. The game ended with the Warriors victorious 3-0, making them Region Champions.

On Tuesday, April 28th, both teams faced off against Andrews on the road. The girls won by a confident 6-0 and the boys destroyed the Yellow Jackets with a 9-0 victory.

After the ceremonies were over, it was time to play. Both teams were scoreless in the first inning but the Warriors pulled away early with many timely hits. BOYS GOLF WINS BLUE JACKET INVITATIONAL

Last weekend, April 25th-26th, the varsity boys' golf team competed in the Blue Jacket Invitational held at Black Bear in Longs, S.C. The field consisted of 14 teams from different areas of S.C. Waccamaw took the win by seven shots with a two-day team total of 593. North Myrtle Beach took second with a total of 600, followed by Hilton Head (604) and Myrtle Beach (613).

On day one of the tournament, Waccamaw set a new school record with a team total of 291, 3-over par. Jackson Cole led the team with a 3-under par 69. Other individual scores were: Patrick Golden (72), Will Canipe (73), and Chris Kaylor (77). The team finished the day with a 8-shot lead. On day two of the tournament, the team shot a 302, 14-over par. Coach Daily said, "I was glad to finally get a win on the year with all the nice finishes we've had along the way. However, I'm still not completely pleased with how we finished off either of the rounds. Both days we gave up shots on the final three holes. We need to continue to work on being mentally tougher so that we can finish these rounds off and contend in the bigger events."

In the tournament, Waccamaw had four players finish in the top 10 in individual scoring. Golden finished 3rd, Canipe 5th, Cole 6th, and Kaylor 9th. Congratulations, golfers, on your win!

On Monday, April 27th, Waccamaw played Bishop England and on Tuesday, April 28th, played Socastee, both in a 9-hole match. Waccamaw lost to Bishop England by four shots but destroyed Socastee by 23 shots. Match medalist for both days was Patrick Golden shooting 34 (2-under par). Tuesday was also senior day for the golf team. Seniors Michael English and Davis Hogan were recognized.





Waccamaw's record is now 106-27-4. Coach Daily said, "The season is starting to wind down with only the Southern Cross, Aynor, Regional, and State remaining. WHS Sailors Compete in District Competition

On April 18th-20th, the WHS Sailing Club - Competitive Team ended their season in beautiful St. Petersburg, Florida after qualifying as a top seven team from seven states in the South Atlantic Interscholastic Sailing Association (SAISA) district. Parents and sailors arrived in St. Petersburg on Friday to begin practicing with the boats typically used in college sailing, the Flying J's and Vanguard 420's. Sailing was organized out of two facilities, St. Petersburg Yacht Club and the University of Florida – St. Pete Sailing Center. Over the course of the weekend, a complete fleet rotation was accomplished by racing 16 races in

each division – 12 on Saturday and four more on Sunday. Conditions were difficult on Saturday with south winds, 6-11 knots, influenced by different components on both sides of the course. Then on Sunday, stronger-than-forecasted winds greeted sailors blowing 10-15 knots, with recorded gusts above 20 knots, resulting in several capsizes. Race organizers ran both divisions on the same course, staggered starts allowing for many races and constant action. This event presented great challenges for four freshmen, one sophomore, and one junior.


Sailors Colt Woodhouse (skipper)/Griffin DesMarteau (crew) and Noah Benton (skipper)/ Sydney Register (crew) sailed the first two races in A/B Division. Following these races, the teams divided into three sailors each in both divisions. Sydney Register and Colt Woodhouse served as skipper and crew with Ella Grace Bodie crewing for both in A division. A division scored 230 points and finished 15th. Griffin DesMarteau and Noah Benton served as skippers and crew for each other in B division with Clayton Register crewing for Noah Benton in B division. B division scored 217 points and finished 15th. Waccamaw finished 15th overall.





As the youngest, most inexperienced team in attendance, Waccamaw sailors witnessed some of the best sailing the district has to offer. They experienced many accomplishments ultimately not reflected on the score sheet such as excellent starts, great mid-fleet runs, precise mark roundings and several photo finishes. At the end of two days of intensely competitive sailing in platforms many were unfamiliar with, Waccamaw sailors held their own, gained many insights, and some well deserved confidence. They look forward to many more District Championship opportunities!



Waccamaw Elementary Summer Camp AEROSPACE EDUCATION

In the 21st Century

SPACE CITIES: June 15 – 18, 2015 Monday- Thursday 9:00 A.M. - 3:00 P.M.

This class is designed for students completing $\mathbf{2}^{\text{nd}} - \mathbf{4}^{\text{th}}$ grades. Students will learn about living and working in Space, where astronauts sleep, how they eat, exercise, work and spend their free time. They will design and build space stations in cooperative groups using recycled materials and participate in activities involving EVA assimilations, hands-on science experiments dealing with microgravity, weightlessness, and taste astronaut foods. Students will learn to develop their imagination and creativity. They will learn about contributions NASA has made to improve the quality of life on earth. SPACE EXPLORATION: June 22 & 23, 2015

Monday - Tuesday 9:00 A.M- 3:00 P.M.

This class is for students completing 5th - 8th grades or students who have previously completed the Space Cities Class. Discover and learn about Orion's features, innovations and design capabilities of the future. Students will learn about where America is going next, including the International Space Station, the moon, near Earth Asteroids and Mars. Students will investigate and experiment with scientific principles relating to space exploration. Classes will include hands-on experiments in topics such as robotics, rocketry, and weather. They will interact with an educational specialist from the Johnson Space Center. Emphasis will be on critical thinking skills, problem solving and deductive reasoning. Cost: \$100 which includes tuition and all rocket materials.

The teaching team will be composed of Connie Richardson Smith, an educator / consultant / Morningside College adjunct instructor. Co-teaching is Mary Richardson Tester, who teaches high school special education at Waccamaw High and Ben Tester, who teaches 7th grade science at Waccamaw Middle. Connie and Mary have successfully taught this aerospace science camp for many years adding new features each year. Both teachers have completed graduate work at the University of Iowa in Science Education through the Iowa Chautauqua Program. They have completed teacher training at the Johnson Space Center through the Space Exploration Educators Conference and Mary attended MoonKam training in Las Vegas ! through the Sally Ride Science Institute. This summer we are fortunate to have Ben join the team to co-teach the Space Exploration Class. He is a recent graduate of the College of Charleston and a former student of Space Camp.

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
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
