
BOYS TENNIS RECLAIMS STATE CHAMPIONSHIP TITLE

On Saturday, May 17th, the boys' tennis team traveled to Columbia, SC to compete against arch rival Christ Church for the Class AA State Championship. The boys knew they had to bring their 'A' game in order to defeat Christ Church and win back the state championship that they lost last year to the same Christ Church team. Waccamaw defeated Christ Church 5-2. The Warriors claimed



three of the five singles matches with Paul Hendrix winning 6-2, 6-1; Joey Hewes coming from behind in the second set to win 6-4, 7-5; and Jaz Greene losing, but soon reversed the momentum of the match and prevailed 6-4, 3-6, 10-6. In doubles, Paul Hendrix and Justin Dunn, as well as Parker Brinson and Woodrow Tudor, won their matches against Christ Church. It was Brinson and Tudor who struck the deciding blow, dominating their opponents in a well executed match by the score of 6-3, 6-1. Coach Hunt stated, "The dynamic duo punctuated their critical win with a jumping "chest bump" that would have made the Bryan Brothers proud." Winning the state championship was a huge accomplishment for the tennis team, who have been working extremely hard all season. Waccamaw won the state title in 2007, 2008, 2009, 2010, 2012, and this year. Congratulations to Coach Hunt and the boys tennis team.





Pasta Alla Carbonara

Servings: 6

Prep Time: 10 Minutes Cook Time: 20 Minutes

Ready In: 30

Inaredients:

1 Lb. Rotini Pasta

5 Eaas, Beaten

1.5 t. Salt

1 t. Black Pepper

½ t. Red Pepper Flakes

½ C. Parmesan Cheese, Grated

8 Oz. Bacon, Sliced

1/2 Onion, Diced

3 Cloves Garlic, Minced

Green Peas (if desired)

Parmesan Cheese (if desired)

Method of Preparation:

- 1. Bring a large pot of salted water to a boil.
- 2. In a small bowl, combine eggs, salt, black pepper, red pepper flakes, and parmesan cheese. Stir to combine. Set the egg mixture aside until use.
- 3. Add pasta to boiling water. Cook until al dente, about 10 minutes.
- 4. In a skillet, cook bacon over medium heat until slightly crisp.
- 5. Add in onion and garlic. Cook until softened. Turn off heat and leave bacon mixture in skillet.
- 6. Add pasta to pan with bacon. Immediately add egg mixture.
- 7. Stir constantly until egg mixture thickens. Add cooking liquid a little at a time if needed to obtain desired thickness.
- 8. Garnish the pasta with green peas and additional parmesan cheese if desired.
- 9. Serve immediately.


