
UT Math and Science Center





Talent Search provides many opportunities throughout the year for students to tour area campuses and helps with all aspects of college preparation including applying for financial aid.



To be eligible to receive federal financial aid, and student must complete a FAFSA.

The Free Application for Feceral Student Aid (FAFSA) is the first step to financial aid. It serves as the application for most of the the financial aid from federal and state programs and from colleges and universities. Even if you are not sure that you will need financial aid, it is recommended that you fill our a FAFSA anyway. Remember.... it's a free application!

You should submit the FAFSA as soon after January 1, 2012 as possible, making sure you meet any college or state deadlines. The deadline for the Tennessee Studnet

Assistance Award is February 1, 2012. The quickest and most accurate way to file a FAFSA is online. In contrasts to a paper copy, the online form displays only the data entry fields you need to complete. You also receive directions as you need them.

Representatives form area colleges and financial aid representatives will be presenting important information concerning the FAFSA and other scholarships at Financial Aid Night. This event is planned for Thursday, November 3 at 6:00 p.m. in the GHS cafeteria.

Many students here at GHS carry germ-x in their pockets or on key rings and just use it instead of taking the extra 30 seconds to wash their hands with soap and water. While on bathroom duty, GHS teachers notice many students leaving without washing hands. "It is surprising to see so many students leave the restrooms without washing hands. I actually see students bring food into the bathroom and share with friends without either washing hands. How do you know what the person in the stall before you left behind?" comments Mrs. Martin. In a 2007 study, 77% of students admit that they have been bullied physically, mentally or verbally; 14% of those students said they experienced severe reactions to the abuse. What's worse is that half of these incidents go unreported. That means that the kids that endure this abuse are usually the ones who suffer in silence. If you are being bullied, tell a teacher, a parent, a student, or a counselor. You are not alone.

Verbal abuse is the most common, though many think of physical abuse when they hear the word "bullying". Rude words can cut deeper than almost any physical attack, but you don't think about that until it's too late. Mental bullying results mostly in social isolation. Avoiding, or isolating, these students can hurt them and make them think they aren't good enough. Statistics show that 87% of school shootings are motivated by getting revenge on those who have hurt them. Many resort to suicide to escape bullying. If you are guilty of bullying by any means, stop and think about how you are affecting your

How can you help? Intervene. Every 7 minutes a child is bullied on school grounds. The rate of adult intervention is a depressing 4%. Peer intervention is at 11%. What is worse is that the rate of no intervention at all is a startling 85%. If you see bullying taking place, stop it. Take a stand against bullying. You could save a

tnAchieves Scholarship available for 2012 graduates.

Grainger High School is excited • to announce that seniors now have the opportunity to receive money for college through a new grant called tnAchieves. This program provides an opportunity for Tennessee public high school graduates from the Class of 2012 to receive up to \$3,000 annually for two years or four consecutive semesters for community college tuition. Recipients of the tnAchieves scholarship must complete the following list for college preparation:

- Attend all scheduled tnAchieves meet-
- Work closely with a tnAchieves men-
- Complete the FAFSA by February 1,
- Complete the ACT by April 4, 2012
- Apply to one of the approved community colleges by April 15, 2012
- Register for classes at one of the approved community colleges by July 1,
- Carry a minimum of six credit hours

- Check in twice per semester at tnAchieves.org
- Complete one approved 8-hour community service project per semester
- Maintain a 2.0 GPA all for semesters of college.

The tnAchieves program works through the collaboration of sponsors voluntarily donating funds to provide a college education for Tennessee students, volunteering mentors for scholarship recipients, and students giving back to the community with at least one community service project each semester.

The amount of money awarded is determined after all other sources of scholarships and financial aid have been awarded. Money will be paid directly to the college; students will never receive payment in-hand. Funding begins in the fall semester following high school graduation. Applications are due October 14. 

1 cup canned shoestring potatoes


1 cup cheese sticks
