Hosting Principal Uras Agee took the floor to update the crowd about just a few of the great events happening at Brainerd High School, including the recent rise in TVAAS scores from all 1s to all 3s, Monday's visit to the state capital by members of the BHS leadership team and the upcoming trip for select seniors to see *Hidden Figures* and then take part in a panel discussion about the film.

HCDE Interim Superintendent Dr. Kirk then gave attendees an update about Hamilton County's five iZone schools. He explained the number one way to make sure students score well on upcoming tests is to make sure they attend school and are engaged in learning. He also briefly explained the state's Achievement School District (ASD) tracks for consistently under-performing schools.

Vanderbilt University's Tennessee Education Research Alliance Compares iZone vs. ASD

Teacher turnover plays a critical role in Tennessee's ambitious efforts to turn around its lowest performing schools, according to a new Vanderbilt report. Examining data from the 2012-13 school year through 2014-15, the study focused on teacher retention in the two largest efforts to turn around Tennessee's priority schools—locally-run Innovation Zone (iZone) and Achievement School District (ASD.)

The report found annual teacher turnover rates were much higher among ASD schools than among iZone schools. Turnover rates naturally will be high in a school's first year in a turnaround reform, given the requirement that teachers in turnaround schools must reapply for their jobs at that point. But in the year following that procedure, the ASD experienced a teacher turnover rate of 50 percent among its first cohort of schools, and 49 percent for its second. Among iZone schools, the corresponding rates were 40 percent and 23 percent, respectively.

Red Bank Middle School Students Learn about Artificial Intelligence

As a second World Reading Day event, HCDE Interim Superintendent Dr. Kirk Kelly taught Dr. Elbakidze's students at Red Bank Middle all about Artificial Intelligence (AI) on Wednesday. Dr. Kelly read from a *Computer World* article that explained every day uses of AI, and the difference between Narrow and General AI. Narrow AI refers to Artificial Intelligence designed for one purpose, like IBM's Deep Blue, the computer that beat chess champion Garry Kasparov. General AI refers to Artificial Intelligence that can reason like a human being.

Dr. Kelly talked about a real-world application of AI. He explained that by using AI-generated input for an algebraic equation, he can determine what ACT score a current 8th grader should get in the future.
