SCHOOL COUNSELORS

School counseling began in the early 1900s as vocational guidance. It was established in schools as a position occupied by administrators and teachers who became known as guidance counselors. Their work was directed by a list of job responsibilities. As school counseling evolved, it moved from simple vocational assistance to addressing the needs of the whole child. With that evolution came greater scrutiny into the training and job responsibilities of the counselor. Today's school counselor must hold a master's degree in school counseling. Their training and education are more rigorous than their earlier counterparts. Professional school counselors are guided


by national student standards as well as professional ethical standards. They deliver high quality, data-driven comprehensive school counseling programs to positively impact the academic, personal/social and college/career development of all students. This is accomplished through a variety of methods such as individual counseling, group counseling, and classroom school counseling curricula. School counselors also work collaboratively with students, teachers, parents, administration, and community members. School counselors use data to show the impact of the school counseling program on student achievement, attendance, and behavior and analyze program assessments to guide

future action and improve future outcomes for all students. *In 1999, the Tennessee legislature passed HB 302/SB 637 to legally change the name from guidance counselors to school counselors.* These educators have earned their title and should be known as school counselors. Project AWARE recognizes the importance of the school counselor in our community as we work together to build mental resiliency and well-being for our children and families.
