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Community Profile

Macon County, Tennessee is located in northern middle Tennessee. We are northeast of Nashville, Tennessee, and we border the State of Kentucky. Macon County has traditionally been a rural, agricultural area. However, as new highways are being built through the county, we are becoming more industrial. There is still plenty of open space, and many people are choosing to bring their families into Macon County to live and work. We have excellent schools, affordable housing, a low crime rate, excellent utilities, and very nice people. Currently, Macon County Schools consist of three elementary schools, one junior high, one high school and one K-12 school.

School Profile

Macon County High School was built in 1998 and is situated in a rural community in the county seat of Lafayette. MCHS currently serves more than 970 students from Lafayette and the communities on the west side of the county. The student population consists of 90.1% white, .08% Hispanic, and .02% African American, Asian, Native American and other races. Enrollment for the Class of 2019 is 240 students, and there are approximately 101 faculty and staff members. Macon County High School has AdvancED accreditation through the Southern Association of Schools and Colleges.

Curriculum

Reflecting the district's commitment to meeting the needs of all students, the core courses of language arts, math, science, and social studies are aligned to the Tennessee Standards. MCHS offers standard and honors level courses in core academic subjects. Technology that includes laptops, Chromebooks, iPads, and interactive white boards is also integrated throughout the curriculum. World language is offered for two levels of Spanish. A wide variety of elective courses are offered in agriculture, business, music, art, theater, physical education, engineering, science, social studies, language arts, family and consumer sciences, nursing, cosmetology, culinary arts, machine technology, construction, welding, and automotive. Some of the elective course programs allow for the opportunity of state and national certifications. The goal of Macon County High School is to empower and inspire students to graduate career and college ready.

Educational Options

In order to provide educational programs that fulfill the unique needs of our juniors and seniors, students who meet certain criteria are eligible to participate in the following educational options.

- Dual Enrollment Program: Juniors and seniors may earn high school and college credits by enrolling in courses at our local community college, Volunteer State Community College, and they can work toward certain career-technical certifications at our local technical college, Tennessee College of Applied Technology-Hartsville.
- Dual Credit: Students are able to earn high school credit and college credit by exam through core academic courses and through CTE electives.
- Work-Based Learning Program: Seniors may explore career choices by enrolling in non-paid internship or paid cooperative education program, by following our Teaching as a Profession curriculum, or by participating in our Service Learning class through which students also volunteer for service projects.
- Project Lead the Way: Our Engineering students may also earn college credits through the PLTW curriculum.
- SAILS: Student Alignment and Integrated Learning Support in math is a college remedial math course for seniors scoring less than 19 on the math ACT.

Minimum Requirements

A total of 28 credits are required for graduation. *(Transfer students and SWD may differ).*

Student Assessments

The district administers the following assessments to aid teachers and counselors in diagnosing individual strengths and weaknesses in order to provide more effective instruction.

TNReady Assessments—Students are required to take end of course exams in US History, Biology, Chemistry, Algebra I, Algebra II Geometry, English I, English II, and English III as part of their final grade in these specified courses.

Practice ACT – administered to all 9th and 10th graders in order to predict college readiness capabilities and whether or not students will need remedial courses in English and/or math.

ACT – the leading US college admissions test, measuring what students learn in high school to determine academic readiness for college.
