# **United States History**

I. Course Description as stated by the state: : Students will examine the causes and consequences of the Industrial Revolution and America's growing role in world diplomatic relations, including the Spanish-American War and World War I. Students will study the goals and accomplishments of the Progressive movement and the New Deal. Students will also learn about the various factors that led to America's entry into World War II, as well as its consequences for American life. Students will explore the causes and course of the Cold War. Students will study the important social, cultural, economic, and political changes resulting from the Civil Rights Movement, the Cold War, and recent events and trends that have shaped modern-day America. Additionally, students will learn the causes and consequences of contemporary issues impacting their world today. Students will continue to use skills for historical and geographical analysis as they examine American history since Reconstruction with special attention to Tennessee connections in history, geography, politics, and people. Students will continue to learn fundamental concepts in civics, economics, and geography within the context of United States history. The reading of primary source documents is a key feature of United States history standards. Finally, students will focus on current human and physical geographic issues important in contemporary America and the global society.

- **II.** Class Requirements: The following is a basic & brief list of the requirements of this class. If these requirements are completed, a failing grade is **NOT possible**, but a passing grade is **certain**.
  - 1. Bring proper materials (writing utensil, paper, textbook, and folder) to class *each* day. There *will not* be a day in which they are not used.
  - 2. Treat the class & assignments like a profession. Respect the boss (teacher) & fellow workers (students), and remember we are all (including me, the teacher) working together for the same result for each of us—new knowledge, a passing grade, and a credit.
  - **3.** Follow directions from beginning to end, and always ask questions when you are unsure. In other words, when there is something you are asked to do that you do not understand ask the teacher. The teacher created the directions and knows them; and no one likes to be left clueless.
  - 4. Participate in the class activities whether they involve class-wide discussion or individual work completion. You will not **normally** be asked to complete homework in this class unless the class runs out of time in completing an assignment that must be completed by the following day or you are asked to read an excerpt or section that class time does not allow to be completed. Thus, working & participating in class everyday is the **most** important ingredient for success in this class (see **Grading** section below for further proof).
  - 5. Complete all notes/daily activities, and when giving your written or spoken opinion, always tell WHY.
  - **6.** Give attention & respect to whoever is speaking during instructional or discussion time whether it is the teacher or a fellow student. No one likes an inappropriate interruption.
  - 7. Never allow yourself to become idle (a nice way of saying lazy) since idleness (laziness) always leads to bad things like distracting behavior and sleeping.
  - **8.** Use pencil or blue/black ink to complete your assignments. If you do not have these, find them before you get to this class. There <u>will not</u> be a day when they are not needed, and when we have to stop for your failure to be prepared, everyone loses.
  - **9.** Keep all class activities, notes, and completed papers in your class folder (pocket folder w/ fasteners), and **NOT** in your textbook. The textbook takes enough abuse from you carrying it and stuffing it in a locker all day, and it doesn't need its back broken from a paper jam.
  - 10. In the end do not forget this **very** important point: everyone in this class wants to succeed so let's help each other do this. Each & every time you fail to meet these requirements, it not only harms your success, but the success of us all (including the teacher).
- **III. Grading:** This is a class based upon a point total each of the **four 9-Week Grading Periods**. The following is a list of items from which the point total will be reached and a brief description of each assignment.

**NOTE:** The grading scale can be changed by the teacher, but all changes will be announced and will be beneficial to the students.

# 1. Daily Participation & Assignments

- Each *day* you will be assessed & will earn points based upon your participation & completion of assignments for that particular day.
- The more you participate and become involved in class as well as help others, the more you will succeed.
- Very simply put, the better your notes & daily work are, the better your grades on any tests will be.
- **NOTE:** Opportunities to earn Extra Credit arise *very* often.

#### 2. Tests

• At various times throughout the 9-Week Grading Period, you will be given tests.

### 3. Other Work

- This will include any assignment or activity assigned that does not fit into the previous three categories
- IV. Make-Up Work Policy: You must have been given a blue EXCUSED absence admittance from the office before being allowed to make up work. Make-up assignments are due the day following their assignment or at a time determined by the teacher. After you are told of the make up assignment and when it is due, you will NOT be reminded by the teacher to turn it in. Understanding the make-up policy is ESSENTIAL. MAKING UP WORK AT THE END OF A GRADING PERIOD IS NOT POSSIBLE.
  - V. Classroom Expectations: The following is a basic & brief list of the expectations in this classroom. Much of this is an affirmation of the Class Requirements from numeral II of this syllabus. If you do what is expected in any job, you will be successful at that job.
    - **1.** You are expected to:
      - Arrive to class on time, with proper materials needed (textbook, paper, pencil/blue or black pen, folder).
      - Complete each daily activity as well as prepare for tests.
      - Treat the teacher and fellow classmates with utmost respect and should not interrupt the speaker, whether it is the teacher or a classmate, who is speaking.
      - Not disrupt the concentration & learning experience of fellow classmates with trivial, immature, and/or ridiculous behavior.
    - 2. The teacher is up and moving at all times so remember to always look alive. Body language says a lot about your desire (or lack thereof) to succeed and pass this class.
    - 3. Students should only ask to use the restroom during instructional time if it is an emergency. By school-wide rule, when students must leave the class for any reason, they MUST provide a Central High School passbook in order to complete this exit.
    - **4.** The rules within the Student Handbook, including the dress code & cellular phone use, are to be observed to the fullest extent within this classroom at **ALL** times.
    - 5. Drinks **ARE** allowed in this class, but that allowance is dependent upon proper disposal of bottles (i.e. appropriate recycling bins located in the classroom). Please *DO NOT* eat candy or food in this class unless it is approved by the teacher.

### VI. EOC Testing

U.S. History is a tested subject, meaning there will be an EOC at the end of the year. The test will be over the standards to be covered throughout the year. This year there will be a writing portion of the test administered at the end of the year as well. It is crucial that all students work diligently as we are on a tight schedule to get all standards in before these tests occur. Good attendance and hard work are the only way we can accomplish success on these tests, which are a major part of the students' grade.
