- Writing
 - O Students will write for a variety of purposes, modes, and styles (formal, informal, literary, analytical, and technical).
- Research Paper/Project
 - O Students will select an author during a particular unit of study to further investigate his/her life and how it affects the way in which he/she writes.
- Extended Reading
 - Students will be assigned extended reading activities upon the current curriculum.
- Technology Project/Presentation
 - Students will present their research paper/project findings to the class in the form of a PowerPoint presentation.

Classroom Procedures

- Follow all guidelines outlined in class!
- Make-up work: It is the STUDENT'S responsibility to collect all make-up work from the appropriate tab in the make-up work notebook. The student will have only as many days as he or she has missed to make up any work. For example: out on Monday, get assignment Tuesday, due on Wednesday. *If you miss the day that an assignment is due, the assignment is expected to be turned in on the same day that you return!
- **Turning make-up work in**: There is a filing system by my desk (which will be explained in class).
- Admits: Admits should be given to me at the <u>beginning</u> of class.
- Food and drinks: Bottled water is allowed in the classroom. If a snack is brought into the classroom, clean up after yourself and make sure that ALL trash is thrown away! (If I have to pick up after food, this right will be revoked!)
- Cell Phones: <u>Students may use their phones when directed, only for instructional purposes.</u>
