Formatting Specific Print Resources

Tips:

- Use shortened forms of publishers' names (Gale Research, Inc.→Gale; University of Chicago Press→U of Chicago P; McGraw-Hill, Inc.→McGraw; Charles Scribner's Sons→Scribner's).
- Common abbreviations in citations include Reprint→Rpt.; Editor→Ed.; Volume→Vol.
- Always include the type of publication cited. Examples: Print, Web.

- Entry from Novels for Students
 (Use if citing the article as a whole; if citing a critical essay toward the end, use the example for CLC)
- "A Tale of Two Cities." Novels for Students. Ed. Sheryll Ciccarelli and Marie Rose Napierkowski. Vol. 5. Detroit: Gale, 1999. 349-70. Print.

(Note: Article titles that include a book title should be italicized.)

- Entries from British Writers, African American Writers, and American Writers

(Note: Authors' initials may be found in the list of contributors at the beginning or end of the book.)
