White Pass Elementary School is currently in Step #3 of School Improvement. Last year we failed to meet the standard due to poor attendance rate.

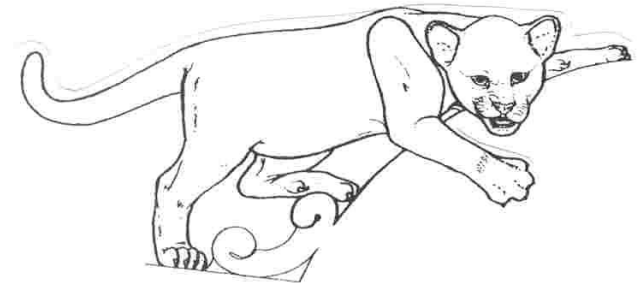

Location: White Pass School District is located in east Lewis County, 50 miles east of I-5 on Hwy 12 and approximately 100 miles west of Yakima. Located in Randle, Washington, the district serves the communities of Packwood, Randle and Glenoma.

Budget: The budget is approximately \$5.8 million for the general fund, with a total of all district budgets, including capital projects, approximately \$7.7 million. The district spends about \$14,855 per student annually (state@ \$10,014) from approximately 67% state funding, 11% federal funding. and 22% local taxes.

Buildings: The voters of the district approved a capital projects bond in 2007 for the construction of a new Secondary School, which opened in August 2010, and a remodel of the Elementary, which opened in August 2011. The district is excited about its new look and enhanced learning opportunities. The community has reason to be proud of their schools.

Challenges: The district is eager to address these and other challenges:

- Continually improving instruction and student learning,
- Increase graduation rates and decrease dropout rates.
- Continue the success of the athletic co-op and the service to student athletes.
- Increase enrollment.
- Continue to remain fiscally strong in the face of potential state and federal education funds reduction.

- Continue to seek development of diverse programs that lead to well-rounded education, including the fine and performing arts, vocational training, agriculture and regional based vocational training, biology, foreign languages and culture, etc.

White Pass School District uses Title I federal funds to support our goal of improving student achievement in reading and math. It provides funds for para educators who assist teachers from preschool through high school. Title I also provides an instructor for our public preschool that started in February 2007.

Title IIA grant funds allow us to grow professionally by providing dollars to attend workshops that enable our staff to learn the essential elements of curriculum, instruction, and assessment.

Parents are always welcome to partner or volunteer in their child's school. We know that each parent has a unique set of skills.
