Phillips takes second step toward IB

Phillips Academy has taken a second step toward becoming an International Baccalaureate school for kindergarten through eighth grade.

Principal Mark A. Sullivan has received notification that Phillips has been approved as a candidate for the International Baccalaureate Primary Program. He was notified in late May that Phillips' application for candidacy for the International Baccalaureate Middle Years Program had been approved.

"This is great news!" said Superintendent Craig Witherspoon. "There are hurdles you have to go through to become a full IB school. Phillips has just cleared another hurdle in the process."

During the candidacy phase, Phillips' faculty will work toward fulfilling the requirements for gaining full IB status. Teachers, for example, will have access to an online IB curriculum center where they can obtain IB publications and teaching materials.

If Phillips successfully completes the candidacy phase, it will become an IB World School. IB World Schools share a common philosophy – a commitment to high-quality, challenging, international education.

Teachers, schools use Gizmo

When most adults think about gizmos, they're likely to come up with whatchamacallits or thingamajigs as a synonym. But students in many schools in the Birmingham City School System would think of interactive online simulations of math and science concepts.

Several schools and teachers received awards for their use of Gizmos May 25 in the classroom from ExploreLearning.

Jackson-Olin was named as the top high school, with Ruqayyah Aqeel of Wenonah High School being the top teacher. N. Wilson of Jackson-Olin High School was the runner up.

Hudson K-8 School was the top midde or K-8 school. Imogene Hill of Whatley K-8 was the top teacher in that category, with Hudson's Miriam Moore finishing as the runner up.

Gibson Elementary School was tops in the elementary school division. Lacresha McDaniel of Lewis Elementary School was the top teacher, and Kelly Mitchell of Gibson was the runner up.

Overall, 37 teachers received Leadership Award certificates from ExploreLearning. The awards were based on the number of both teacher and student logins to the Gizmo site.

Texas teachers donate supplies

"We went through Ike and we had many people who were generous to us," said Patti Freudenberg, one of the leaders of the Texas group. "We thought a school in Birmingham could use our help."
