TRUMP TAKES OFFICE

President Trump made his first presidential speech explaining his plans to "start taking action" and "making changes to our nation," he said to USA Today.

Trump is beginning his action with eliminating or replacing Obama Care, a a manufacturing regulation freeze, and confirmations of his appointed staff. "His tone is distinctly different from his predecessors," says Brandon Rottinghaus, a professor at the University of Houston who studies presidential proclamations.

U.S. drones have killed 5 Al-Qaeda operatives in central Yemen. This is the first such operative since President Donald Trump's inauguration. The "targeted drone strikes" took place in the town of Bayda, in south central Yemen, according to US Navy captain Jeff Davis, spokesman for the Pentagon.

"AQAP remains a significant threat to the region and the United States," Davis said, referring to the Al-Qaeda in the Arabian Peninsula, the terrorist group's branch operating in Yemen. In his inauguration speech on Friday, Trump vowed to "eradicate [radical Islamic terrorism] from the face of the Earth." (USA Today)

Have you ever heard of the <u>Rafflesia arnoldii</u>??? Well, if you have, then you probably know that it is the world's largest and stinkiest plant. When the plant is fully grown, it releases a deadly smell which compares to that of a rotting body. When mature, it can grow up to three feet long, as well as weigh up to 24 pounds. The plant's horrible smell is released to attract its main pollinator, the carrion fly. The <u>Rafflesia arnoldii</u>, among thirty other blooming plants, is known as the "queen of all the parasitic organisms."

The <u>Rafflesia arnoldii</u> soaks up normal water and nutrition with its vine. The harmful bacteria doesn't have any foliage, originates, or real root base. The plant does not generate chlorophyll, meaning it can't

execute the entire process of the photosynthesis. As a result, "the odiferous aroma is the only way of its survival."

After just a few days of practice, five middle school wrestlers traveled to Simla for a BFL match-up tournament on a Monday. All established themselves as winners to be counted upon. Teams represented, in addition to the host Simla (S) and Calhan, were Stratton (ST), Deaf & Blind School (D & B), Bennett (B), Kiowa (K), and Miami-Yoder (MY). Overall, out of the four wrestlers competing we had two 1st place and two 2nd place showings, with a total of 11 wins out of 13 matches.

Our lightest wrestler, 6th grader Aiden Jack, has several years of club wrestling and that experience immediately paid dividends as Aiden was unscored upon in 3 bouts, earning first place at 95 pound by pinning his MY opponent Hilton, beating Jordan (B) by major decision, and besting Sigmon (K) by pin.

In the 100-pound class, 7th grader Odiahus Bishop made the announcer pronounce his name several times on his way to a 1st place finish, as he dominated his 3 matches despite being brand new to the sport.
