CHRISTMAS CANDY CANE SNACK MIX

Making the candy cane snack mix treat is very simple. It should only take about 30 minutes to prep. All ingredients needed include; 7 cups of unsalted popped popcorn, 3 cups of pretzels, 2 cups of lightly salted dry-roasted cashews or honey-roasted peanuts, 1 1/4 pounds of vanilla flavored candy coating, and 1 cup of finely crushed peppermint candies.

The first step is to mix the popcorn, pretzels, and cashews (or peanuts) into a shallow roasting pan. Take out any unpopped kernels. Sit that to the side until later.

Next, place the candy coating in a saucepan, heat it on low heat, and stir it constantly until fully melted and smooth. Remove from heat and stir in 1/2 cup of the crushed peppermint candy. Pour the candy coating over the popcorn mixture. Stir gently so it can start coating and sprinkle the rest of the 1/2 crushed peppermint candy on it.

Finally, let it cool and break it into pieces when done. Now you have a delicious candy cane snack mix treat. Enjoy!

How to Make Your Turkey "Hot and Sizzling"

Ingredients

-- 2 tablespoons dried parsley, 2 tablespoons ground dried rosemary, 2 tablespoons rubbed dried sage, 2 tablespoons dried thyme leave, 1 tablespoon lemon pepper, 1 tablespoon salt

-- 1 (15 pound) whole turkey, neck and giblets removed

-- 2 stalks celery chopped , 1 orange cut into wedges, 1 onion chopped, 1 carrot chopped , 1 (14.5 ounce) can chicken broth

-- 1 (750 milliliters) bottle of champagne

Prep: 20 minutes; Cook: 3 hours; Ready: 3 h 20 m

Preheat an oven to 350 degrees F. Line a turkey roaster with long sheets of aluminum foil that will be long enough to wrap over the turkey.

Stir together the parsley, rosemary, sage, thyme, lemon pepper, and salt in a small bowl. Rub the herb mixture into the cavity of the turkey, then stuff with the celery, orange, onion, and carrot. Truss if desired, and place the turkey into the roasting pan.

Pour the chicken broth and champagne over the turkey, making sure to get some champagne in the cavity. Bring the aluminum foil over the top of the turkey, and seal. Try to keep the foil from touching the skin of the turkey breast or legs.

Bake the turkey in the preheated oven for 2.5 to 3 hours until no longer pink at the bone and the juices run clear. Uncover the turkey, and continue baking until the skin turns golden brown, 30 minutes to 1 hour longer. An instant-read thermometer inserted into the thickest part of the thigh, near the bone should read 180 degrees F.

Remove the turkey from the oven, cover with a doubled sheet of aluminum foil, and allow to rest in a warm area 10 to 15 minutes before slicing! There is an easy way to cleanup. If you make this in a slow cooker, using a slow cooker liner can make cleanup easier.

THE DRAGON BOAT RACING FIREFIGHTERS

Look out marathoners, there's a new sport in town – not just any old sport, it's Dragon Boat racing! Yes, you heard that right. The athletes of this daring sport are none other than the firefighters of Pueblo; they don't just slay dragons, they also race them. They have christened themselves as ... the Los Bombaros!

These athletes have been participating in this race for two years, and this year they took 2nd place in a competition, beating over twenty teams from around USA. The races were first introduced to the station by Mark Rohar, an EMO (Emergency Medical Officer). The station participates in the races as a great way to stay in shape and to learn new skills.

Mike Hlatki, an engineer, stated that the races pose as a team building exercise and strengthen the crew's relationship. Nowadays, the races are fun events, with plenty of food vendors and even a bouncy house. But the origin of the Dragon boat races has a slightly less cheery start.

The Dragon boat races began as a Chinese legend, with a court official named Qu Yuan. He was famous in China, known as the champion of political loyalty and integrity, as he often stood up for the poorer denizens of China's provinces. In the city in which Qu Yuan resided, it was believed that the monarchy fell under the influence of corrupt and jealous ministers. The corrupted ministers convinced the monarchy to banish Qu Yuan. Upon learning that his state had been corrupted, the legend states that Qu Yuan waded into the Miluo River, holding a large rock over his head in the ceremonial tradition to commit suicide to protest the corruption of a state.

The common people, upon learning about his death, rushed out into the water to save Qu Yuan's body. They beat drums and splashed the water with their paddles in order to keep the fish and evil spirits from his body. Later on, they scattered rice into the water to prevent him from suffering hunger. Another belief is that the people scattered rice to feed the fish, in order to prevent them from devouring the poet's body. However, late one night, the spirit of Qu Yuan appeared before his friends and told them that the rice meant for him was being intercepted by a huge river dragon. He asked his friends to wrap their rice into three-cornered silk packages to ward off the dragon. This has been a traditional food ever since known as Zongzi or sticky rice wrapped in leaves. In commemoration of Qu Yuan, it is said, people hold dragon boat races annually on the day of his death.

Before the races, to honor the spirit of the race, Chinese monks perform a ceremonial blessing, called the Eye Dotting, where they dot the dragon's eyes to give boats the spirit of life and wisdom. Today, dragon boat festivals continue to be celebrated around the world with dragon boat racing. The races have become a famous pastime, especially for the dragon-hearted firefighters of Pueblo, led by their Captain Barb Huber.
