The American Sign Language (ASL) students at Heritage took the top three places in the **2014 National ASL Honor Society Art Competition**. The competition challenges students to complete pieces of Deaf View Image Art (De'VIA). De'VIA represents Deaf artists and perceptions based on their Deaf experiences. It uses formal art elements with the intention of expressing innate cultural or physical Deaf experience. This year the competition highlighted the work of De'VIA artist Nancy Rourke (nancyrourke.com), and the artist chose the winners. Heritage students competed against other ASL students from 17 different schools in 13 different states.
