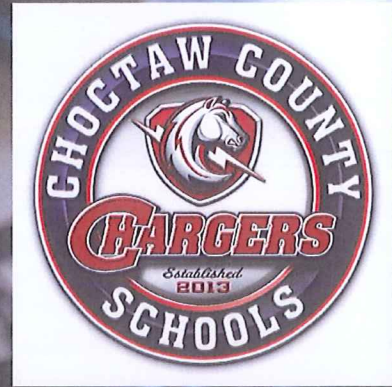

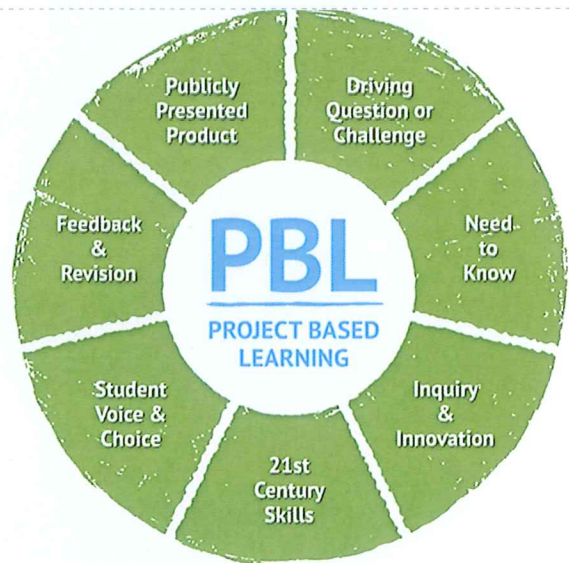

What is Project Based Learning?

Project Based Learning (PBL) is "a dynamic approach to teaching in which students explore real world problems and challenges. With this type of active and engaged learning, students are inspired to obtain a deeper knowledge of subjects they're studying." ~ Edutopia.org

Why is PBL good for Gifted Students?
