The winners of the Harper Lee Award for Alabama's Distinguished Writer and the Eugene Current-Garcia Award for Alabama's Distinguished Literary Scholar are honored each year.






Alabama Southern enrolled 1324 students in Fall 2012, with 48 students enrolled in the ASCC Honors Program.

## **HIGHLIGHTS & ACHIEVEMENTS**

- ♦ Alabama Southern Community College hosted the Alabama China Partnership Symposium, which brought together more than 200 people, including delegates representing more than 100 Chinese companies, to discuss attracting Chinese investments to Alabama. During the symposium, Dr. Reginald Sykes, president of Alabama Southern, spoke on a panel about the role of education in economic development and the importance of community colleges in preparing a workforce ready to meet the needs of new industry.
- ♦ Alabama Southern's 2012 Associate Degree Nursing Class had a 96% passing rate on the NCLEX. The NCLEX-RN and the NCLEX-PN nurse licensure examinations were developed by the National Council of State Boards of Nursing (NC-SBN) to ensure that nurses entering the workforce have the necessary skills and knowledge to practice in the field.



- ◆ ASCC and the University of South Alabama began a partnership to offer courses in Interdisciplinary Studies bachelor's degree program on the Alabama Southern Monroeville campus and online, providing an opportunity for students to pursue a portion of this degree in Monroeville.
- ◆ The Alabama Community College System Public Relations Association (ACCSPRA) recognized ASCC's marketing and public relations efforts during the 2012 Summer Conference in Mobile, AL. ASCC won first place awards in Online Advertising, Student Publications, and Special Events Publications, a second place award in Postcards and third place awards in Print Advertising and Potpourri.

- ◆ Mattie Knight, a participant in Alabama Southern's Educational Talent Search program and an upcoming senior at A.L. Johnson High School, was selected to be a representative at the 2012 National Student Leadership Congress in Washington, D.C. held June 9-14, 2012. Knight was the only representative from the state of Alabama to attend the conference.
- ◆ Tiffany Coleman, a 1997 graduate of the Gilbertown Campus Upward Bound Program, has been selected as one of only six 2012 recipients of the Southeastern Association of Educational Opportunity Program Personnel, Inc, Trio Achiever's Award. This is the first time, in the 28-year history of the TRIO programs at ASCC, that an ASCC TRIO participant has received the SAEOPP award, which recognizes outstanding TRIO alumni in the categories of educational, professional and civic leadership and achievement.
- ◆ ASCC passed the Fifth Year Interim accreditation process by the Southern Association of Colleges and Schools Commission on Colleges (SACCS) without any recommendations.
- ♦ ASCC added a new academic scholarship level (21-23 ACT students).
- ◆ Monroeville and Thomasville campuses are now equipped with wireless Internet access points that will allow connectivity to a computer or smartphone that has wireless capability. This improvement in technology was part of the Strategic Plan of the College and has been implemented on the two main campuses.
- ◆ ASCC created a new Gold Medal Award program to recognize outstanding faculty and staff members who are making a difference in the lives of students. Students can submit nominees each month through the ASCC website and all nominees are recognized on the website and during professional development activities.



## ALL ALABAMA ACADEMIC TEAM

Alabama Southern students Roshani Patel and McKenzie Dungan were selected to the All-Alabama Academic Team for the 2011-2012 academic year. The Alabama College System's All-Alabama Academic Team is an enhancement to the All-USA National Academic Team Recognition Program, which is sponsored by Phi Theta Kappa Honor Society, *USA Today* and the American Association of Community Colleges.

- ◆ Alabama Southern offers an honors option for most transfer classes. By selecting to participate in the **Honors Program**, students will be qualified to graduate with Honors Distinction, transfer honors credits to the University of Alabama, and participate in a number of exciting learning experiences.
- ◆ Alabama Southern Ambassadors serve as official hosts for college-sponsored events, lead tours of the campus, and serve as student recruiters.

- ♦ Alabama Southern Student Government Association helps students earn valuable experience in leadership and teamwork.
- ◆ The mission of **Circle K** is to develop college and university students into a global network of responsible citizens and leaders with a lifelong commitment to service. Circle K members work with the local Kiwanis club in Monroeville to provide service to the college and community.
- ◆ Alabama Southern's **Exposé** musical group performs at local high schools, civic, and community events, and our **Art Club** offers emerging artists venues for displaying their work.
- ◆ ASCC's chapter of **Technical Association of the Pulp and Paper Industry** (**TAPPI**) is one of only two chapters in the state. TAPPI membership provides these members a world of flexible benefits and opportunities to create solutions through information sharing, knowledge development, and interaction with other members.

#### **ATHLETICS**

- ◆ The Eagles Baseball team finished third in the ACCC southern division and earned a spot in the ACCC state and Region XXII baseball tournament in Ozark, AL making it to the third round. Two players were named to the All-Region 22 team and eight were named to the first or second All-Conference teams. Turner Lee became the team's 8th player in the last seven years to be selected as a NJCAA All-American. Six of the seven sophomores graduated with their associates degree and received scholarships to continue their careers at four year colleges. Four of the six signed with Division 1 programs.
- ♦ The Eagles Men's Basketball team finished second in the ACCC Southern Division and earned a spot into the ACCC state and Region XXII basketball tournament in Tuscaloosa, AL making it to the second round. All three of the team's sophomores earned scholarships to continue their careers at four year colleges. The team had one player selected to All-Region Team and five selected to All-Conference team.
- ♦ The Eagles Women's Basketball team finished 3rd in the ACCC Southern Division and earned a spot into the ACCC state and Region XXII basketball tournament in Tuscaloosa, AL making it to the second round. Two of the three sophomores earned scholarships to continue their careers at four year colleges with one of them signing with a Division I school. Three players were selected to All-Region and All-Conference teams, with Nakiya Smith being selected as co-conference player of the year.
- ◆ The Eagles Softball team finished 4th in the ACCC Southern Division and earned a spot in the ACCC state and Region XXII softball tournament in Tuscaloosa, AL. Three sophomores signed scholarships to move on to continue their careers at fouryear colleges.
- ◆ For the first time in more than ten years, ASCC welcomed a **co-ed cheerleading squad**. The team held tryouts during the summer and began cheering during basketball games.

 The Alabama Southern Community College Foundation was formed in 1991 after Patrick Henry State Junior College in Monroeville and Hobson State Technical College in Thomasville merged to form Alabama Southern Community College. The Foundation existed as the Patrick Henry State Junior College Foundation prior to the merger. The Foundation was organized exclusively for education, scientific and charitable purposes, and specifically to assist Alabama Southern Community College, a public education instrumentality of the State of Alabama, in fulfilling and performing its educational and public service programs and activities. - ◆ In April 2012, ASCC held the 2nd Annual Alabama Southern Foundation Scholarship Golf Tournament. The tournament raised funds for ASCC Returning Student Scholarships.

## **ECONOMIC & WORKFORCE DEVELOPMENT**

- ◆ ASCC unveiled a new training facility for welding and industrial maintenance dual enrollment classes offered to high school students in Monroe county. More than 25 students enrolled in the Basic Welding and Industrial Maintenance dual enrollment classes, providing an opportunity for students to earn both high school and college credit and get started on a college certificate in Welding or Industrial Maintenance.
- ♦ ASCC launched the **Ready to Work Program in Wilcox County** to help men and women in the area acquire the skills they need for employment. More than 75 students have enrolled in the 6-week program that teaches entry level skills like problem solving, computer skills, job acquisition skills, workplace behaviors,
- manufacturing skills and work ethic. At the end of the program students earn an "Alabama Certified Worker" (ACW) Certificate and a State of Alabama "Career Readiness Credential" (CRC). Plans are underway to open a second Ready to Work Program in Wilcox County. In September, ASCC honored the first group of Ready to Work graduates at an awards ceremony held at Pine Hill City Hall.
- ◆ ASCC offered two new Adult Education programs in Pine Hill and at Gees Bend Ferry Terminal that help any resident of Wilcox County work towards obtaining his or her GED. Current enrollees are also eligible to participate in free welding classes offered by ASCC in the evenings.





## **COMMUNITY**



- ♦ The Alabama Writers Symposium celebrated its 15th anniversary in Monroeville on April 26-28, 2012. The event was themed Write Out of Place and explored how Alabama authors often find themselves in relation to their home. Fannie Flagg, Brad Watson, Allen Tulles, Wayne Flynt, Irene Latham, Trudier Harris, Rachel Hawkins, Kerry Madden, Jeanie Thompson, Abraham Smith, Mary Murphy and Kathryn Scheldt were just a few of the celebrated writers and scholars who led discussion sessions, readings and workshops. Nelle Harper Lee made a surprise visit and was presented with her own Harper Lee Award by George Landegger.
- ◆ Kids College camps were offered during Summer 2012 on the Gilbertown, Thomasville and Monroeville campuses in areas of interest such as cupcake decorating, spa day (cosmetology), baseball, boys' and girls' basketball, cheerleading, painting, jewelry making, and library camp. The camps were a big success with many local children enjoying their Alabama Southern experience.

- ◆ The Paper and Chemical Technology labs on Thomasville's campus were turned into **Dr. Jekyll's Haunted Lab** on October 30 for an event opened to the community.
- ◆ In November, Exposé and the Art Department presented a fall concert and art show for the community. A variety of art was displayed, and Dr. Jeff Gilbreath led Exposé in popular music styles from the past and present as well as gospel and holiday music.
- ◆ The ASCC Kathryn Tucker Windham Museum and Library in Thomasville hosted an event to unveil a personal collection of Windham's items donated by the beloved storyteller's family.


