BHS advances in playoffs

Bulldogs to take on No. 2 Saint Luke's Friday

J.U. Blacksher reasserted itself as a playoff team Saturday when the **Bulldogs** defeated Fruitdale 6-2 and 10-0 in the first round of the AHSAA, Class 1A state baseball playoffs at Uriah.

Blacksher, 10-10, saw its first playoff action in three seasons - but its 17th consecutive playoff appearance in Class 1A. Blacksher made 16 straight appearances, including two quarterfinals and a semifinal showing, before jumping to Class 2A in the 2010-11 season.

It was also head coach Justin Mixon's first appearance in the state playoffs as the Bulldogs' head coach. He replaced Skip Bell, who led the school to 16 straight playoff appearances before resigning at the end of the 2009-10 sea-

Mixon, and assistant coach John Bohannon, may have the youngest team in the state playoffs with two eighth-graders and three freshmen in the starting lineup along with two juniors and two sen-

Blacksher now advances to the second round against No. 2ranked Saint Luke's Episcopal School of Mobile. Two games of the best-of-three-games series

Alabama Southern's men's basketball coach Trent Eager didn't have to look far to find his first three recruits for the 2013-14 season.

Eager has signed, from left, seated, Monroe County High School standouts Niles Davis, Anton Montgomery and Deveon Kimbrough, who is also The Journal's Player of the Year.

Kimbrough averaged 10.3 points, 2.3 rebounds and 1.9 steals this season. Davis averaged eight points and four assists per game. Montgomery averaged 9.6 points, nine rebounds and

1.7 blocks per game. "These young men were a huge parts of their team during their careers at MCHS and are proven winners," said Eager. "It's a great day for ASCC when we can get players of their abilities. I believe each one of these young men could have a huge impact on our success and what we are trying to do as a basketball program.

"With the addition of these young men, I'm very excited about the direction of our program. We will be able to keep some exciting basketball and players right here at home!"
