In his honor, a scholarship fund was established to enable Special Educators Administrators to attend the International Council for Exceptional Children Annual Convention each year.

Dr. Zabrina Cannady Receives the Lillie Moncus Special Education Administrator of the Year Award

Dr. Zabrina Cannady received the **Lillie Moncus Special Education Administrator of the Year Award** at the G-CASE Fall Conference. This award is the highest honor that an experienced special education administrator in Georgia can receive and is presented to an individual with five or more years of experience as a special education administrator who has demonstrated outstanding leadership and service in the area of special education. The *Lillie Moncus Special Education Administrator of the Year* has earned the respect of teachers, students, parents, and fellow administrators.

Zabrina's colleagues describe her as an advocate for ALL students, spending countless hours making sure the district meets the needs of the whole child. She has worked with disabled adults in a day facility, served as a classroom special teacher, department chair, program coordinator, and assistant superintendent. She began her career as a Men-Technician in the United States



treatment as an educator, classroom specialist, director, superintendent, and her current role with the Air Force

Reserves. She has served as Treasurer of national CASE, President of G-CASE, and President of GAEL. She was a guest author for the *Journal of Special Education Leadership*. She has won the *G-CASE Outstanding New Special Education Director Award*, the *Jim Puckett Outstanding Educator Award*, the *ASPIRE Advocacy Award*, the *Dr. Jimmy Stokes Distinguished Service Award*, and the *Eli Wolf Advocacy Award*. She is the facilitator of the G-CASE Special Education Administrator Development Academy, presents at state and national conferences, and has worked with her team to restore an older elementary school in a community that was in need of revitalization into a student support center available to the entire neighborhood with cooking and technology classes, a food bank, clothes closet with washer and dryer, meals for the community, activities for students in the summer, and many other beneficial supports to help uplift the entire community. Dr. Cannady epitomizes the qualities for this award: resourcefulness, compassion, and professionalism as a leader.

Dr. Jenny Millward, past member of the G-CASE Executive Board and current Executive Director of the National Alliance for Medicaid in Education, led the Breakout Sessions for our ADA participants during the Fall G-CASE Conference. This group of teacher leaders learned Fast Facts and Principles of IDEA, then were joined by Dr. Zabrina Cannady, ADA Facilitator, who led a Leadership Academy based on each participant's results from the StrengthsFinder online assessment.

The next session for the Academy will be January 25th in Houston County. Nationally-known author and School Improvement Consultant (and G-CASE member!) John O'Connor will present GREAT Instruction, GREAT Achievement for Students with Disabilities.

INNOVATIVE PRACTICES

Provide Adequate Funding and Resources for Georgia's Students

- **PROTECT THE INTERESTS OF GEORGIA'S CHILDREN SERVED BY GEORGIA'S PUBLIC EDUCATION SYSTEM** by not expanding the diversion of public funds to private education institutions through vouchers, scholarships, tuition credits, tax exemptions, education savings accounts, and other school choice initiatives that are applied unequally and unfairly to children and without comparable accountability and transparency to the public.
- **MANDATE ACCOUNTABILITY AND TRANSPARENCY** of private education institutions who accept public taxpayer funds by mandating accountability and transparency equivalent to public schools.
- **COMMIT ANNUAL STATE SUPPORT TO INCREASED SCHOOL, STAFF, AND STAKEHOLDER SAFETY** by adding an annual categorical grant in the QBE system allotment for school safety initiatives and expenses.
- **CREATE A MULTI-YEAR PLAN FOR INCREASED PUPIL TRANSPORTATION FUNDING TO LOCAL BOARDS** in order to fairly address the dramatically growing gap between local cost burdens and stagnated state funding.
- **PROVIDE PROFESSIONAL DEVELOPMENT AND TRAINING FUNDING FOR GEORGIA'S EDUCATORS** for literacy, safety, workforce development, STEM/STEAM, and other state-mandated priorities by restoring funding percentages for Professional Development to pre-2003 levels.
- **RESTORE RECESSION-ERA AUSTERITY CUTS TO ALL RESA ORGANIZATIONS** that provide essential professional development services to Georgia's educators and essential support for rural school systems throughout Georgia.

Support the position statements and priorities of the Georgia Association of Educational Leaders (GAEL) Affiliates/Associates.

Provide Qualified Teachers and Leaders to Serve Georgia's Students

- **ENCOURAGE TEACHERS TO REMAIN IN GEORGIA AND IN THE PROFESSION** by supporting and strengthening Georgia's Teacher Retirement System (TRS) and state salary schedule.
- **EXPAND EFFORTS TO RECRUIT AND RETAIN TEACHERS AND LEADERS** to address the growing shortage of quality applicants needed by our children.
- **REDUCE THE CRITICAL SHORTAGE OF TEACHERS** in Georgia classrooms by permitting retired educators in high-needs areas that are designated annually by individual school systems to return to work full time for children without losing their retirement benefits.
- **ENSURE FAIR ACCOUNTABILITY** for teachers and school leaders through valid, reliable, and effective measures.

Support Local School Board Authority

- **STAND FOR LOCAL GOVERNANCE BY COMMUNITY BOARDS OF EDUCATION** by ensuring that legislation is aligned with constitutional provisions regarding public school governance.
- **ENSURE THAT SUPERINTENDENTS SERVING CHILDREN CONTINUE TO BE APPOINTED** by locally elected boards based on a leader's training and expertise.

G-CASE Legislative Committee Co-Chairs Represent You!

G-CASE Legislative Co-Chairs Sean Cooper and Greg McElwee represented G-CASE on the GAEL Legislative Priorities Committee this Fall. They joined educational leaders from the *Georgia School Superintendents Association*, *Georgia Association of Elementary School Principals*, *Georgia Association of Middle School Principals*, *Georgia Association of Secondary School Principals*, *Georgia Association of Curriculum and Instructional Supervisors*, *Georgia Association of School Personnel Administrators*, *Georgia Education Leadership Faculty Association*, and the *Student Support Team Association of Georgia* to craft a final list of mutually-agreed upon priorities necessary to improve outcomes for all public school students in Georgia. This final list, which includes adequate funding and resources for students, teachers, administrators, and school boards, will be shared with all Georgia legislators during the upcoming legislative session and will be used as our guide as we lobby and speak to bills that reflect these important needs.

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

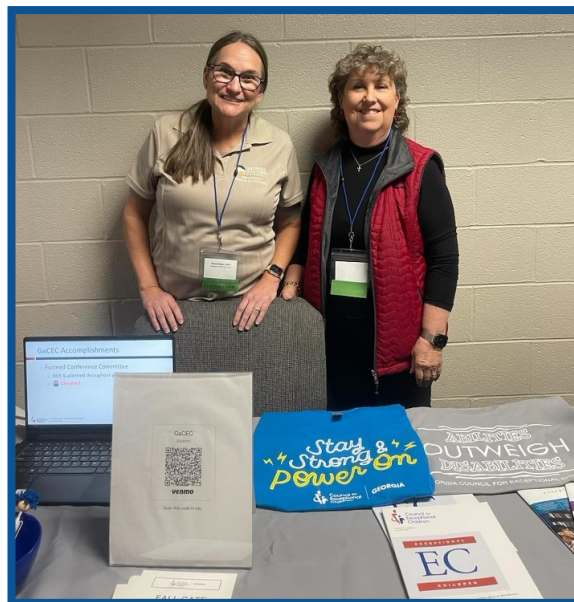

A Great IDEA from Bleckley County!

SEA Hosts Special Needs Day at Greene Acres Farm

When Bleckley County Elementary School teacher, Riley Troili, started the SEA “Special Educators Alliance” on Facebook with the motto, “Catch the Wave to Excellence” she had no idea that excitement to build a community of self-contained special needs teachers would be shared by so many.

Troili’s desire was to keep the alliance rather small with educators from about five or so counties involved so that the members would be more likely to post and get to know each other. In less than a month the alliance has grown to close to over 50 members from about 15 different counties in the middle Georgia area.

The alliance is in the beginning stages, but members are posting and sharing ideas. Troili stated that she hopes others are enjoying this alliance as much as she is. She added that she has gained ideas from other’s posts that she is already implementing in her own classroom.

It is Troili’s hope that members will become more comfortable with sharing ideas and will be able to occasionally gather for field trips and community events. Alliance members from 8 counties recently met at Greene Acres Farm in Bleckley County with over 160 students from pre-k through high school attending a “Special Needs Day.” Troili is looking forward to future similar events and also plans to host individual groups at her own school’s sensory garden which her class started and maintains.

Setting goals, reaching for the stars, and doing what it takes to make dreams come true is what Troili hopes she inspires others to do. She says she is enjoying “riding the wave in this SEA and is so appreciative!”
