 of the School District of Osceola County, SDOC-14-P-065-LH, all related addenda and other current
 bids included above; as well as all applicable federal, state and local statutes, regulations, and
 ordinances and member purchasing policies and procedures.
- Differentiate bid and market items on orders in a manner that aids identification of the market items for audit purposes. (<u>Best practice</u>: non-bid and market items should be on a separate invoice for audit purposes.)

- Pay all distributor invoices per the contract terms for food and supplies received. Distributor and member will work to resolve disputed invoices to facilitate timely payments.
- Cooperatively contribute time and expertise (of one or more staff members as appropriate) to price solicitation development, product testing and evaluation to improve the product pricing for the benefit of all members.
- Provide the distributor with all cycle menus for Breakfast, Lunch, Afterschool Snacks and Supper programs, as applicable, and provide advance forecasts of food and supply items for future orders as requested by the distributor.
- Provide accurate and complete information (including surveys, votes, required forms and website

This Amendment:

- Revises Section entitled "WHEREAS", first and third paragraphs;
- Revises Section II., A., Overview, first paragraph;
- Revises Section II., B., Department's Responsibilities, numbers 6 and 7;
- Revises Section II., C., Agency's Responsibilities, numbers 1 and 2;
- Revises Section IV., AGREEMENT MANAGEMENT, paragraphs A. and B.; and
- Adds Section X., PREA, entire paragraph.

In accordance with Section V., REVIEW AND MODIFICATION, the following changes are hereby made:

1. Section entitled "WHEREAS", first and third paragraphs are hereby revised to read:

WHEREAS, the Department houses inmates at Liberty Correctional Institution (LCI) – Quincy Annex and Gadsden Re-Entry Center.

WHEREAS, this MOA is entered into for the purpose of establishing a means to transport Department inmates housed at Quincy Annex and Gadsden Re-Entry Center using Agency buses during an actual or anticipated emergency, including prior to, during, or immediately after a Hurricane or other Natural Disaster. The use of the buses described in this agreement may be limited by an Executive Order from the Division of Emergency Management that would take precedence over the terms of this Agreement.

2. Section II., A., Overview, first paragraph is hereby revised to read:

II., A., Overview

The parties shall work together to effect transportation of the LCI - Quincy Annex and Gadsden Re-Entry Center inmates during an actual or anticipated emergency using the Agency buses.

3. Section II., B., **Department's Responsibilities**, numbers 6. and 7., are hereby revised to read:

II., B., Department's Responsibilities

- 6. Provide repairs for any damage to buses incurred while on loan to LCI Quincy Annex and Gadsden Re-Entry Center for the transportation of inmates.
- Wash and thoroughly clean buses used to transport LCI Quincy Annex and Gadsden Re-Entry Center inmates prior to returning buses to Agency's designated pick-up location.

4. Section II., C., Agency's Responsibilities, numbers 1 and 2., are hereby revised to read:

II., C., Agency's Responsibilities

- Upon the LCI's Quincy Annex and Gadsden Re-Entry Center request, the Agency shall approve use of its buses by LCI and Gadsden Re-Entry Center for transportation of inmates during an actual or anticipated emergency subject to operational constraints, unless such use is limited by Executive Order from the Division of Emergency Management that takes precedence over the LCI's – Quincy Annex and Gadsden Re-Entry Center use.
- The Agency shall designate a pick-up location, which shall also be the return location, for buses to be used in transportation of LCI's – Quincy Annex and Gadsden Re-Entry Center inmates.
- 5. Section IV., AGREEMENT MANAGERS, paragraphs A., and B., are hereby revised to read:

A. Department's Agreement Administrator

The Agreement Administrator for the Department is responsible for maintaining the official Agreement file, processing any amendments or termination of the Agreement, and for maintaining records of all formal correspondence between the Department and the Participating Entity regarding administration of the Agreement.

2014-2015 Dual Enrollment Articulation Agreement Gadsden County Schools and Florida A&M University Board of Trustees

I. Introduction

Section 1007.271, Florida Statutes specifies the development of a dual enrollment articulation agreement between district school superintendents and state universities within their respective school districts and service areas for the purpose of jointly developing and implementing a comprehensive articulated acceleration program that serves the school district. This Agreement is made by and between the Florida A&M University Board of Trustees, hereinafter referred to as FAMU on behalf of the College of Agriculture and Food Sciences (CAFS), and the District School Board of Gadsden County, hereinafter referred to as the School Board. This agreement is intended to implement 1007.271, Florida Statutes, and State Board of Education Rule 6A-10.024.

The term of this agreement shall commence upon signing and shall end June 30, 2016. Either party may cancel this Agreement upon thirty (30) days written notice to the other party with or without cause. In the event of a termination, both schools agree that students who are currently in post-secondary courses working toward fulfilling the competencies or who are in their first semester at FAMU will be allowed to complete the articulated credit. This Agreement may be amended only by written communication signed by the Superintendent of the District School Board of Gadsden County and the President of Florida A&M University.

FAMU agrees to permit high school students enrolled in a public high school in Gadsden County, who have been certified by their principals as qualified, to dually enroll in regularly offered courses listed and described in FAMU's undergraduate catalogue as satisfying general education/liberal arts requirements, under the provisions of Florida Statutes, applicable state, Board of Governors, and University, rules or regulations, and courses listed herein and the following terms and conditions:

A. Composition and Roles of Articulation Committee

Two committee members from the School Board will be appointed by the Superintendent of the School Board or designee. Two committee members from FAMU will be appointed by the President of FAMU or designee. If the chair of the Articulation Committee is from the School Board, then the co-chair will be from FAMU and vice versa. A Secretary will be appointed from amongst the committee members to record the minutes of the meeting. Ex-officios include the Dean of CAFS and Chair of Gadsden County School Board. The meeting time and location of the committee shall be determined mutually by representatives of both parties.

The role of the Articulation Committee is to work collaboratively to develop and review the progress of the Dual Enrollment Articulation Agreement that exists between

FAMU/CAFS and the School Board. An Annual Progress Report will be prepared by the Articulation Committee and submitted to the Dean of CAFS and the Chair of Gadsden County School Board.

B. Ratification of Articulation Agreements between FAMU and the School Board This agreement replaces any existing agreement with FAMU/CAFS and the School Board regarding the Inter-institutional Articulation Agreement.

II. Procedures to Notify Students and Parents about the Option to Participate

It is the responsibility of the high schools in the district to inform students of the availability of the dual enrollment program requirements and currently offered courses through educational planning and guidance process. Each high school will advertise dual enrollment through a variety of methods. High school personnel will direct students to meet with their high school guidance counselor if they are interested in learning more about participation in dual enrollment. High school guidance counselors will review with the student criteria for participation in the dual enrollment program. Information will also be available to students and parents on FAMU's and CAFS' websites.

III. Courses and Programs Available to Eligible Dual Enrollment Students

Section 1007.271(1). Florida Statutes establishes that "the dual enrollment program is the enrollment of an eligible secondary student in a postsecondary course creditable toward high school completion and a career certificate or an associate or baccalaureate degree". A student who is enrolled in postsecondary instruction that is not creditable toward a high school diploma may not be classified as a dual enrollment student. Physical education skills courses and college preparatory instruction are not eligible for dual enrollment.

Students enrolled as dual enrollment, early admission, or career dual enrollment shall be exempt from the payment of registration, tuition, and laboratory fees. The District will assume responsibility for cost of textbooks and students will assume responsibility for the cost of lab fees. Students enrolled as dual enrollment, early admission, and career dual enrollment will be eligible to participate in both high school and university activities as appropriate including graduation and other extracurricular activities. Participation in all university activities must be approved by the Dean of CAFS.

A. College Credit Courses Offered on the High School Campuses

Section 1007.271 (8), Florida Statutes established that "District school boards shall annually assess the demand for dual enrollment and provide that information to each partnering postsecondary institution". FAMU and the School Board will work

collaboratively to ensure students eligible for dual enrollment in CAFS at FAMU and also on the high school campus, and/or through distance learning, as appropriate.

Faculty in CAFS who wish to teach college credit courses that are offered on the high school campuses must complete a FAMU application and all other procedures required by FAMU's Human Resources and Academic Divisions. Applicants must be recommended for hire by the Dean of CAFS. Faculty must also adhere to the following guidelines (Florida Statutes, 1007.271 (5)(a):

- Meet the qualifications required by FAMU/CAFS as identified in the FAMU
 Faculty Credentials guidelines. The qualifications apply to all faculty
 members regardless of the location of instruction.
- Provide FAMU/CAFS with an official copy of the teaching candidate's postsecondary transcript.
- 3. Provide a copy of the syllabus for each course taught to the discipline chair or department chair of the postsecondary institution before the start of each term. The content of each syllabus must meet the same standards required for all college-level courses offered at FAMU/CAFS.
- Adhere to the professional rules, guidelines, and expectations stated in FAMU's Faculty Handbook.
- 5. Adhere to the rules, guidelines, and expectations (which apply to faculty members) that are stated in FAMU'/CAFS' Student Handbook.

Dual enrollment courses taught on the high school campus must meet the same competencies required for courses taught on the FAMU campus. To ensure equivalent rigor with courses taught at FAMU/CAFS, the high school instructor will provide a comprehensive, cumulative end-of-course assessment or a series of assessments of all expected learning outcomes to the appropriate Dean or designee. The completed and scored assessments must be returned to FAMU/CAFS and held for one year (Florida Statutes, 1007.271 (6)(a)).

Based on need and faculty availability, FAMU/CAFS will decide what courses can be offered on the high school campus. Advanced Placement (AP) students who do not take or pass the AP examination are not permitted to earn postsecondary credit for the AP course via dual enrollment. Per Section 1007.272, Florida Statutes, no student will be allowed duplicate credit based on enrollment in a joint AP/dual enrollment course. Dual enrollment courses taught on a high school campus may not be combined with any non-college credit high school course, per Section 1007.271 (6)(d), Florida Statutes.

Dual enrolled students taking courses on the high school campus must follow the same enrollment and registration procedures as the students taking courses on FAMU's main campus.

B. Early Admission Dual Enrollment

Early Admission shall be a form of dual enrollment through which eligible secondary students enroll in CAFS at FAMU on a full-time basis (minimum of 12 credit hours and maximum of 15 credit hours) in courses that are creditable toward the high school diploma and the associate or baccalaureate degree. Early admitted students will be exempt from the payment of registration, tuition, and laboratory fees. Both the high school and FAMU/CAFS must approve Early Admission for a high school student each semester.

C. Career Dual Enrollment

Career dual enrollment is a curricular option of elective credits toward earning the high school diploma and completing a career-preparatory certificate program (PSAV). Career dual enrollment is not intended to enable students to take isolated courses unrelated to a program.

IV. Procedures for Participation in Dural Enrollment Courses

The Dean of CAFS at Florida A&M University must designate a Dual Enrollment Advisor who will be responsible for collaborating with the District's high school counselors and officially enrolling students at FAMU/CAFS.

A. Application Process for New Students

Step 1: Review the FAMU dual enrollment packet. (The student must have completed tenth grade.)

Step 2: Meet with high school guidance counselor to discuss testing options. High school students are allowed a maximum of two attempts on P.E.R.T. but may demonstrate college readiness through concordant scores on the ACT and/or SAT.

Step 3: Complete the dual enrollment application form with high school guidance counselor.

Step 4: Turn in the completed enrollment packet which includes test scores, high school transcript and a copy of the latest report card to the FAMU Dual Enrollment Advisor.

Step 5: Meet with the FAMU/CAFS Enrollment Advisor to register for courses. The FAMU/CAFS Dual Enrollment Advisor is the only person allowed to register dual enrollment students.

B. Application Process for Early Admission Students

High school students seeking early admission must follow the same enrollment procedures as Dual Enrollment students. Early Admission Students are those students seeking to take dual enrollment courses to complete high graduation requirements and university degree and/or industry certification requirement.

C. Withdrawing from Classes and Schedule Changes

Dual enrollment students must comply with the drop/add and withdrawal policies and deadlines published by FAMU. In addition:

- To withdraw, add, or drop from a course(s), students must provide a written
 request from the high school guidance counselor verifying that the student has
 permission to withdraw, add, or drop before the withdrawal deadline. The request
 must be submitted to the Dual Enrollment Advisor before the withdrawal deadline.
- To change a student's schedule, the guidance counselor must submit a written request to the Dual Enrollment Advisor before the deadline which is published by FAMU/CAFS...

D. Summer Enrollment

Students are allowed to enroll in summer courses. Enrollment must be approved by the FAMU/CAFS Dual Enrollment Advisor.

Graduating high school seniors will not be eligible to participate in dual enrollment during the summer. They will be categorized as degree seeking college students and will have to pay for summer courses.

E. Maximum Course Loads

Dual enrolled students are allowed a maximum of 11 credit hours each semester. All college courses taken must count towards high school and university credit.

Early admission students are allowed a minimum of 12 credit hours and maximum of 15 credit hours each semester. All college courses taken must count towards high school and university credit. Special permission is required <u>each semester</u> for the early admission program.

F. Testing for Dual Enrollment Eligibility

All students seeking dual enrollment must pass the State's mandated assessment Reading (FCAT 2.0) and the P.E.R.T or obtain appropriate concordant scores on the ACT or SAT. It is the high school's responsibility to provide P.E.R.T. for dual enrollment eligibility and to monitor the number of assessments. Students must provide official score reports to FAMU.

V. Eligibility Requirements

A. Initial Enrollment for Academic Dual Enrollment

Mathematics

As indicated in Florida Statutes, 1007.271, student eligibility requirements for initial enrollment in college credit dual enrollment courses must include a 3.0 unweighted high school grade point average and the minimum eligible score on a common placement test adopted by the State Board of Education which indicates that the student is ready for college-level coursework.

According to Florida State Board of Education Rule 6A-10.0315, the student must submit a <u>copy of test scores</u> (SAT, ACT, P.E.R.T.) to postsecondary institutions seeking to place the student into college-level courses. Scores must be less than two years old.

B. Continued Enrollment for Academic Dual Enrollment

Dual Enrollment students must maintain a minimum 3.0 unweighted cumulative high school grade point average. Additionally, the FAMU/CAFS GPA will be reviewed each semester and students must maintain a 2.5 FAMU GPA. Students will be given a one semester grace period if the FAMU GPA is below 2.5. Dual Enrollment students are only allowed one grace period.

C. Initial Enrollment for Career Dual Enrollment

As indicated in Florida Statutes, 1007.271, student eligibility requirements for initial enrollment in career dual enrollment courses must include a 2.0 unweighted high school grade point average and the appropriate score on the P.E.R.T.

D. Continued Enrollment for Career Dual Enrollment

Students must maintain a minimum 2.0 unweighted cumulative high school grade point average. A high school GPA below 2.0 will result in loss of dual enrollment eligibility.

Additionally, the FAMU/CAFS GPA will be reviewed each semester and students must maintain a 2.0 FAMU/CAFS GPA at the time of review. Students will be given a one semester grace period if the FAMU/CAFS GPA is below 2.0. High school students are only allowed one grace period.

VI. High School Credit Earned for the Passage of Dual Enrollment Courses

College courses as specified in the Florida Department of Education Articulation Coordinating Committee Statewide Agreement for Dual Enrollment Courses- High School Subject Area Equivalency List are eligible for dual enrollment. This list is available at http://www.fldoe.org/articulation/pdf/DEList.pdf. Eligible courses may be taken in any format that FAMU/CAFS offers them unless otherwise specified in the Agreement.

Other courses in the Statewide Course Numbering System, with the exception of remedial courses and physical education skills courses, can be used for dual enrollment credit and count toward high school graduation, including electives, provided these courses are specified in this agreement.

Courses Not Specified on the List-Courses that are not listed in the Dual Enrollment Course-High School Subject Area Equivalency List that are taken through dual enrollment must be identified in the Dual Enrollment Articulation Agreement along with the number of high school credits to be awarded either as an elective or subject area credit.

VII. Procedures to Inform Students and Parents about College-Level Course Expectations

It is the responsibility of the high schools in the district to inform the students and parents about the college-level expectations. FAMU/CAFS will inform students and parents of college-level course expectations through a dual enrollment orientation. FAMU/CAFS will also inform students and parents of college-level course expectations through the use of the course syllabus which is given to each student in each college-level course at the beginning of each semester.

VIII. Procedures for Determining Expectations to Require Grade Point Averages According to Florida Statutes, 1007.271 (3)

According to Florida Statutes 1007.271 (3), "Exceptions to the required grade point averages may be granted on an individual student basis if the educational entities agree and the terms of the agreement are contained within the dual enrollment articulation agreement established pursuant to subsection (21)."

Exceptions to High School Grade Point Averages Terms:

Upon recommendation by the principal or designee, a student with an unweighted GPA of 2.75-2.99 may enroll for a maximum of 6 hours of dual enrollment courses provided that the student has shown evidence of ability to do advanced level work through successful completion of Advanced Placement, Honors, or other advanced courses or supplemental work and provided that the student is in a high school college preparatory program. Continuation of dual enrollment will require satisfactory progress in all college dual enrollment courses.

Exceptions related to serious illness or other extenuating circumstances will be reviewed on a case by case basis and must be approved by both the principal and designated FAMU's administrative staff. FAMU/CAFS will provide a form to the high school that must be completed, signed, and returned to FAMU before students will be allowed to continue in the program. FAMU/CAFS will not make exceptions to the required FAMU grade point average. Students will be given a one semester grace period in which a review will take place to determine continued eligibility. The grace period can only be used once during the student's high school matriculation.

IX. Registration Procedures for Dual Enrollment

Students must complete the dual enrollment registration form with their high school guidance counselor. The form must be completed with all the required information selected courses. The completed registration form will be given to FAMU/CAFS Dual Enrollment Advisor, who will register the student for courses that are available at the time the form is received.

X. Exceptions, if any, to Professional Rules and Guidelines for Instructors Teaching Dual Enrollment Courses

There are no exceptions.

XI. Exceptions, if any, to Rules and Guidelines Stated in the Student Handbook Which Apply to Faculty Members

There are no exceptions.

XII. Responsibilities of the School Board Regarding Determination of Student Eligibility before Dual Enrollment Participation and Monitoring of Student Performance While Participating in Dual Enrollment

The School Board is responsible for determining if the student is eligible to be tested for the dual enrollment program. Students who have a 3.0 unweighted high school grade point average and who have an interest in participating in dual enrollment should be referred to their high school guidance counselor for information regarding eligibility requirements for the program.

It is the School Board's responsibility as well as FAMU/CAFS responsibility to monitor student performance in dual enrollment courses. The School Board and FAMU/CAFS should exchange student transcripts and relevant academic information in order to make sure that students are eligible to continue in the dual enrollment program. FAMU and the School Board shall jointly assume responsibility for the implementation and enforcement of any rights and responsibilities that arise by the creation, maintenance and use of any "records" and "reports" regarding any high school students enrolled in accordance with all applicable law, including but not limited to Sections 1002.22 and 1002.225, Florida Statutes and 20 U.S.C. 1232 (g) – (l). Each shall be responsible for "records" and "reports" maintained, housed or stored by the respective institutions.

FAMU is responsible for assigning grades for dual enrollment courses. When posting dual enrollment information to high school transcripts, the School Board is prohibited from changing any grade that has been assigned by the university.

XIII. Responsibilities of the Florida College System Institution Regarding Transmission of Student Grades in Dual Enrollment Courses to the School Board

FAMU will transmit student transcripts to the high schools at the end of each semester in accordance with applicable law.

XIV. Responsibilities for Funding that Delineates Costs Incurred by the School Board and FAMU

Dual enrollment students shall be exempt from paying registration and matriculation. Textbooks will be provided by the School Board. Textbooks purchased by the School Board shall remain the property of the School Board as specified in Section 1007.271 (17), F.S. The costs of ADA accommodations for dual enrollment students with disabilities taking courses on FAMU's campus will be covered by FAMU. The costs of ADA accommodations for dual enrollment students with disabilities taking courses on the high school campus will be covered by the School Board.

XV. Responsibilities for Student Transportation

Students and/or parents shall provide all student transportation to and from courses taken on FAMU's campuses and sites and shall assume any liability incurred thereby.

XVI. General Provisions:

FAMU and the School Board shall continue to carry out established articulation procedures to ensure close communication and effective planning. In addition, FAMU and the School Board shall establish budgetary policies to support specialized dual credit enrollment programs as The President of FAMU and the Superintendent of Schools will publicize this agreement and take whatever actions necessary to effect the implementation of said agreement within their respective organizations. The parties shall not discriminate against any employee or participant in this program because of race, age, religion, color, gender, national origin, marital status, or disability. Each party agrees to be fully responsible for its acts of negligence or its agent's acts of negligence when acting within the scope of their employment and agrees to be liable for any damages resulting from said negligence to the extent permitted by the laws of Florida. Nothing herein is intended to serve as a waiver of sovereign immunity by any agency or political subdivision of the State of Florida to be sued by third parties in any matter arising out of any contract. This Agreement sets forth the entire understanding between the Parties with respect to the subject matter hereof and shall govern the respective duties and obligations of the Parties, superseding any other written or oral representations, statements, negotiations, or agreements to the contrary.

Distribution of Charter School Capital Outlay Funds for 2014-15 Fiscal Year

Section 1013.62, Florida Statutes (F.S.), establishes eligibility criteria for charter school capital outlay funding, specifies the purposes for which charter school capital outlay funds may be expended and directs the Commissioner of Education to establish procedures for the submission and approval of charter school capital outlay plans.

Charter school capital outlay plans must be submitted to the Florida Department of Education online by May 15, 2014, and the sponsoring district must review and recommend the plan by June 13, 2014. The Commissioner will make the final determination of eligibility following submission of the capital outlay plan and district recommendation. The online application allows the sponsor to view a charter school's plan and provide comments that will be considered by the Commissioner in determining eligibility. In the event that additional information becomes known during the 2014-15 fiscal year that may affect charter school eligibility, the district and charter school are requested to forward such information to the Commissioner.

The 2013-14 appropriation for charter school capital outlay is \$90,604,553, pursuant to Specific Appropriation 18, Chapter 2013-40, Laws of Florida. Information about capital outlay funding for the 2014-15 fiscal year will be forwarded following the close of the 2014 legislative session and subsequent budget action by the Executive Office of the Governor. 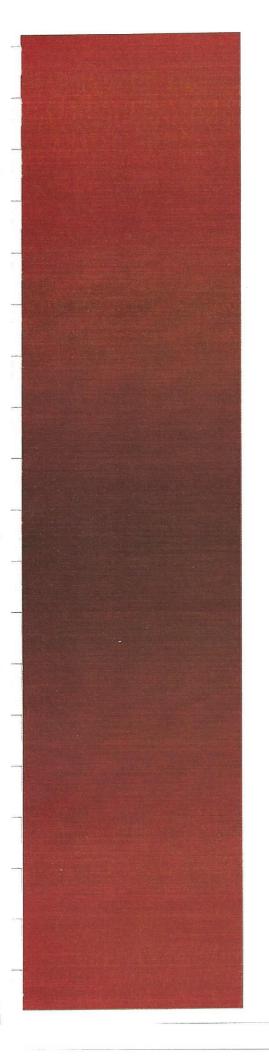

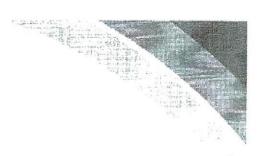

THIS AGREEMENT entered into entered in between Progressive Communications, Inc. ("PROGRESSIVE") and GADSDEN COUNTY SCHOOL SYSTEM ("SCHOOL") on this 27th day of February, 2014;

WHEREAS PROGRESSIVE is a service provider capable of creating, installing and operating local area networks (LANS), wide area network systems ("WANS") and providing basic maintenance of internal connections;

WHEREAS SCHOOL owns or operates a "school" [as defined in the "No Child Left Behind Act of 2001"] (20 U.S.C. § 7801(18) and (38)) or a library as defined in the "Services and Technology Act" (Pub. L. # 104-208);

WHEREAS SCHOOL has developed a "technology assessment" and a "technology plan" in anticipation that SCHOOL will be entitled to participate under the "Schools and Libraries Program of the Universal Service Fund" (commonly referred to as "E-Rate"), through which telecommunication services and/or internet services are provided through differing levels of support dependent upon the level of poverty and the urban-rural status of the population served;

WHEREAS SCHOOL has submitted its technology plan for approval, and has also filed a "Form 470" by placing it on Universal Service Administrative Company's website, which form describes the specific services or functions sought;

WHEREAS PROGRESSIVE has submitted a "bid" to provide services to SCHOOL and has been deemed by SCHOOL to be the best and most desirable bidder;

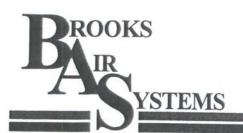

I. PROGRAM TITLE

Panhandle Area Educational Consortium's Add-On Certification Program English for Speakers of Other Languages (ESOL) Endorsement

II. PROGRAM RATIONALE AND PURPOSE

Florida school districts, including two of the largest in the nation, educate over 250,000 English Language Learners (ELLs), with 230 different languages spoken among them. These demographics reflect a continued increase of ELLs throughout Florida. The Florida Department of Education's Bureau of Student Achievement through Language Acquisition (SALA) assists schools and districts, while ensuring ELLs receive comprehensible instruction. In addition, the Bureau monitors schools and districts for compliance with state and federal rules, regulations, the 1990 League of United Latin American Citizens (LULAC) et al. v. the State Board of Education (SBE) Consent Decree, and the 2003 Modification of the Consent Decree.

District Add-on Certification Programs for English for Speakers of Other Languages (ESOL) Endorsement must reflect the new State Board of Education approved **FLORIDA TEACHER STANDARDS for ESOL ENDORSEMENT**; Rule 6A-4.02451.

The Panhandle Area Educational Consortium (PAEC) is composed of fourteen small and rural school districts in the northwest part of the state. Although these districts traditionally have few students who speak other languages, the number of students categorized as English Language Learners (ELLs) is increasing. While significant progress has been made toward ensuring that teachers needing ESOL training have received appropriate professional development, the need to provide this professional development support continues to grow as a result of increasing numbers of English Language Learners locating throughout the consortium-served area.

With this in mind, PAEC offers a viable solution, using twenty-first century technology for training teachers, administrators and guidance counselors in an exemplary fashion to employ research-based practices, proven effective with English Language Learners. No matter the location, districts and their teachers will find it convenient to access the high-quality online courses, available 24/7, by utilizing the electronic Professional Development Connections (ePDC).

Each PAEC online ESOL course is designed so that participants can have continual online interaction with the course facilitator. Through the ePDC's online course system, facilitators and participants discuss course content, implementation, follow-up and evaluation. The course facilitator is essentially the gatekeeper for quality control. If a participant's response is faulty, not detailed enough, or lacks the superior quality required, the facilitator responds and requires elaboration or justification from the participant. It is through this meaningful dialogue that learning is demonstrated and quality is maintained for all online course participants.

When a participant in a PAEC-offered online ESOL course successfully completes the course requirements, the number of credit hours is posted to the participant's transcript, housed within the ePDC. Completion records and other reports, tailored to district needs, are available to appropriate district personnel at any time, upon request.

Note: Each district is the authorizing body for approval of individual ESOL courses for endorsement, certification, or to meet Categories I, II, III and IV professional development requirements.

Certification Requirements

The certification requirements for teachers of ESOL include general and professional preparation as specified in State Board Rule 6A-4.0244. ESOL may be added to a standard coverage through the earning of college course credit, district add-on program using in-service points, or a combination of in-service and course work. The in-service requirements for ESOL are referenced in State Board Rule 6A-6.0907. This PAEC Add-on Program deals only with in-service and/or the combination of in-service with college credit. College course credits may be reported directly to the state teacher certification office if the endorsement is to be granted using college coursework alone. Statutory Authority Reference: Florida Statutes, 1001.02, 1012.55, and 1012.56.

Purposes

The purposes of the PAEC ESOL Add-On Endorsement Program are:

- 1. to ensure that English Language Learners have appropriately qualified teachers;
- to develop competencies of teachers, guidance counselors, and school administrators, enabling them to effectively meet the academic, social, and emotional needs of English Language Learners;
- 3. to assist educators in obtaining or renewing certification; and,
- 4. to provide high-quality professional learning opportunities that are flexible and respectful of time and resources.

Current teaching credentials of each teacher participating in this program will be evaluated on an individual basis by the district certification contact and/or professional development director to determine which portions of the program must be completed. The in-service components are also appropriate for any teacher seeking renewal of certification, providing the component has not been previously completed.

III. PROGRAM CONTENT/CURRICULUM

This professional learning program focuses on topics of study reflected in the DOE/META Agreement and State Board Rule 6A-4.0244-Specialization Requirements for Adding English for Speakers of Other Languages Endorsement to a Florida Educator's Certificate. The following Domains have been approved by the Florida Department of Education for ESOL Endorsement Programs:

- Domain 1: Culture (Cross-cultural Communications)
- Domain 2: Language and Literacy (Applied Linguistics)
- Domain 3: Methods of Teaching English to Speakers of Other Language (ESOL)
- Domain 4: ESOL Curriculum and Materials Development
- Domain 5: Assessment (ESOL Testing and Evaluation)

A. PROFESSIONAL EDUCATION STUDIES

The Florida Professional Standards for Endorsement are organized around domains, standards within each domain, and performance indicators for each standard. A domain can be seen as an overarching category of study that identifies a broad conceptual area. For the purpose of this document, each domain is considered synonymous with the use of the term 'area' as used in the Florida Consent Decree Section IV, A1(3). Each domain is defined by its standards which identify the core knowledge, skills, and dispositions that must be addressed within each domain. For each standard, the document lists a set of key performance indicators, which provide specific criteria for demonstrating mastery of the standards.

B. NATIONALLY RECOGNIZED GUIDELINES

The Florida Professional Development Standards for Endorsement of teachers providing basic ESOL instruction to English Language Learners (henceforth, the Florida ESOL Endorsement Standards) drew significantly from the revised draft Standards for the Recognition of Initial Teacher Preparation in P-12 ESL Teacher Education developed by Teachers of English to Speakers of Other Languages Inc. (TESOL), (TESOL, 2008; henceforth TESOL Teacher Standards). These standards are available at

IV. INSTRUCTIONAL DESIGN AND DELIVERY

Domains and standards taken into consideration for the development of the PAEC ESOL Add-On Endorsement Program are listed below.

A. INSTRUCTIONAL STRANDS

Domain 1: Culture (Cross-Cultural Communications)

Standard 1: Culture as a Factor in ELLs' Learning

Teachers will know and apply understanding of theories related to the effect of culture in language learning and school achievement for ELLs from diverse backgrounds. Teachers will identify and understand the nature and role of culture, cultural groups, and individual cultural identities.

Domain 2: Language and Literacy (Applied Linguistics)

Standard 1: Language as a System

Teachers will demonstrate understanding of language as a system, including phonology, morphology, syntax, semantics and pragmatics; support ELLs' acquisition of English in order to learn and to read, write, and communicate orally in English.

Standard 2: Language Acquisition and Development

Teachers will understand and apply theories and research on second language acquisition and development to support ELLs' learning.

Standard 3: Second Language Literacy Development.

Teachers will demonstrate an understanding of the components of literacy, and will understand and apply theories of second language literacy development to support ELLs' learning.

Domain 3: Methods of Teaching English to Speakers of Other Languages (ESOL)

Standard 1: ESL/ESOL Research and History

Teachers will demonstrate knowledge of history, public policy, research and current practices in the field of ESL/ESOL teaching and apply this knowledge to improve teaching and learning for ELLs.

Standard 2: Standards-Based ESL and Content Instruction

Teachers will know, manage, and implement a variety of teaching strategies and techniques for developing and integrating ELLs' English listening, speaking, reading, and writing skills. The teacher will support ELLs' access to the core curriculum by teaching language through academic content.

Standard 3: Effective Use of Resources and Technologies

Teachers will be familiar with and be able to select, adapt and use a wide range of standards-based materials, resources, and technologies.

Domain 4: ESOL Curriculum and Materials Development

Standard 1: Planning for Standards-Based Instruction of ELLs

Teachers will know, understand, and apply concepts, research, best practices, and evidenced-based strategies to plan classroom instruction in a supportive learning environment for ELLs. The teacher will plan for multilevel classrooms with learners from diverse backgrounds using a standards-based ESOL curriculum.

Standard 2: Instructional Resources and Technology

Teachers will know, select, and adapt a wide range of standards-based materials, resources, and technologies.

Domain 5: Assessment (ESOL Testing and Evaluation)

Standard 1: Assessment Issues for ELLs

Teachers will understand and apply knowledge of assessment issues as they affect the learning of ELLs from diverse backgrounds and at varying English proficiency levels. Examples include cultural and linguistic bias; testing in two languages; sociopolitical and psychological factors; special education testing and assessing giftedness; the importance of standards; the difference between formative and summative assessment; and the difference between language proficiency and other types of assessment (e.g., standardized achievement tests). Teachers will also understand issues around accountability. This includes the implications of standardized assessment as opposed to performance-based assessments, and issues of accommodations in formal testing situations.

Standard 2: Language Proficiency Assessment

Teachers will appropriately use and interpret a variety of language proficiency assessment instruments to meet district, state, and federal guidelines, and to inform their instruction. Teachers will understand their uses for identification, placement, and demonstration of

language growth of ELLs from diverse backgrounds and at varying English proficiency levels. Teachers will articulate the appropriateness of ELL assessments to stakeholders. Standard 3: Classroom-Based Assessment for ELLs

Teachers will identify, develop, and use a variety of standards- and performance-based, formative and summative assessment tools and techniques to inform instruction and assess student learning. Teachers will understand their uses for identification, placement, and demonstration of language growth of ELLs from diverse backgrounds and at varying English proficiency levels. Teachers will articulate the appropriateness of ELL assessments to stakeholders.

B. TRAINING COMPONENTS

ESOL ENDORSEMENT OPTIONS, CORRELATION OF INSTRUCTIONAL STRANDS, AND MAJOR TOPICS

While any certified teacher may opt to add on the ESOL Endorsement; Category I teachers (Primary Language Arts/English, Developmental Language Arts, Intensive Reading, Reading, Developmental Language Arts or Reading to English Language Learners) are required to obtain the ESOL Endorsement/Certification. Options A – C provide an approved means to fulfill this requirement under the PAEC ESOL Add-On Program.

OPTION A

Participants, selecting this option, will complete each of the five, 60-hour online courses listed below through PAEC's electronic Professional Development Connections, for a total of 300 credit hours. See Table 2 for appropriate instructional strands and major topics.

ESOL: Methods of Teaching English to Speakers of Other Languages (ESOL) Online Course (Course One)

ESOL: Applied Linguistics Online Course (Course Two)

ESOL: Testing and Evaluation of ESOL Online Course (Course Three)

ESOL: Curriculum and Materials Development Online Course (Course Four)

ESOL: Cross-Cultural Communications Online Course (Course Five)

^{**}Note: Participants are encouraged to complete ESOL: Methods of Teaching English to Speakers of Other Languages (ESOL) Online Course first, followed by ESOL: Applied Linguistics Online Course. The other courses may be taken in any order, although the course numbers correspond to the suggested order.

OPTION B

Some participants may choose to combine components from Option A with college credit. This is permissible provided all performance standards, for each of the five domains, are met and the total number of ESOL in-service hours equals at least 300. Participants, electing to use college credit to fulfill a portion of the ESOL Endorsement requirements, must provide a college transcript and course description to the appropriate district-level personnel. It will be the responsibility of the appropriate district-level personnel to review the course description(s) and make the determination regarding whether or not the college credit will be counted toward the inservice requirement for the ESOL endorsement.

ESOL In-service or Coursework must include all of the following areas:

- · Cross-Cultural Communications
- Applied Linguistics
- Methods of Teaching English to Speakers of Other Languages (ESOL)
- ESOL Curriculum and Materials Development
- Testing and Evaluation of ESOL

Note: See Table 2 for appropriate instructional strands and major topics.

OPTION C

Some participants may choose to combine components from Options A, college credit, district-provided, and/or ESOL courses from district-approved providers. In addition, for teachers who earned ESOL inservice credit while teaching in a school district not covered under the PAEC Add-On ESOL Endorsement Plan (within or outside the State of Florida), the district will assume responsibility for completing a careful review of the course description and/or course requirements and determining whether the inservice meets the performance standards required in order to use the inservice credit toward the ESOL endorsement.

Elements addressed in option C are permissible, provided all performance standards for each of the five domains are met and the total number of ESOL in-service hours equals at least 300. An individual plan of study form must be developed and approved by appropriate district-level personnel for all participants who elect to pursue this option.

Category II Teachers

Activities:

In addition, participants must complete the reading selections embedded within each module, access online reading assignments, answer specific questions pertaining to each module, and complete individual assignments. Some assignments will require participants to implement strategies learned in the course in their current classrooms and reflect on the implementation process. The course facilitator will interact electronically with the participant, providing timely feedback regarding course responses. Online course activities are aligned to the Section C matrix.

Evaluation Criteria:

- 14. Demonstrate knowledge of the indicators of learning disabilities, especially hearing and language impairment, as compared to the process by which students acquire a second language.
- 15. Demonstrate knowledge of the indicators for student identification and participation in gifted programs, regardless of English language proficiency and of the program policies that must be in place in order to actively promote and sustain the participation of ELLs in advanced placement courses.
- 16. Demonstrate knowledge of the school site administrator's role and responsibilities as the instructional leader representative in the school-based ELL committee.
- 17. Demonstrate the ability to communicate with ELLs, their families and the community to assess the relevance of the curriculum and adequacy of student progress toward standards established by the Department of Education and the local school board.

Activities:

The ESOL for School Administrators Online Course requires participants to spend time online at the FloridaLearns Academy's ePDC website interacting with the content presented in various modules. While participating in the online modules, participants will have the opportunity to view various video segments pertaining to the content of the module. In addition, participants must read the reading selections embedded within each module, answer specific questions pertaining to each module, and complete individual assignments. Some assignments require participants to implement strategies learned in the course in their current classrooms. Feedback is provided online by the course's facilitator.

Evaluation for In-Service Credit:

The participant will:

- 1. Demonstrate increased competency of the objectives as determined by the instructor; and,
- 2. Satisfactorily complete assigned activities and assignments.

Evaluation for ESOL Endorsement Credit:

The participant will:

- 1. Demonstrate all competencies of the component; and,
- 2. Satisfactorily complete assigned activities and assignments.

Component Evaluation:

Through the ePDC, the district Professional Development Director will receive notification of course completion. The system requires an online evaluation of the professional learning activity. This evaluation is a part of the ePDC and conforms to the Florida Professional Development System Evaluation Protocol requirements.

D. Instructors

Instructors selected for program options covered under the PAEC ESOL Add-On Endorsement will be given priority based on the credentials and experience listed below:

- a master's degree in TESOL, applied linguistics, bilingual education or allied language field, and successful experience with English Language Learners in the K-12 school system; knowledge of, and experience in content-based ESOL instruction; experience as a trainer/facilitator
- the five endorsement courses and successful experience with ELLs in the K-12 school system; knowledge of and experience in content-based ESOL instruction; experience as a trainer/facilitator
- 3. a master's degree in ESOL or applied linguistics and knowledge of and experience in contentbased ESOL instruction; experience as a trainer/facilitator
- a master's degree in an educational field other than language related and successful experience in language-sensitive content instruction; professional learning aligned with Florida Department of Education ESOL professional learning requirements; experience as a trainer/facilitator
- successful experience with ELLs in the K-12 school system, and knowledge of and experience in content-based ESOL instruction and/or language-sensitive content instruction; professional learning aligned with Florida Department of Education ESOL professional learning requirements; experience as a trainer/facilitator

V. COMPLETION REQUIREMENTS

A. Program Completion

Candidates endeavoring to add the ESOL Endorsement to the Florida Educator's Certificate must earn a minimum of three-hundred (300) inservice points by successfully completing the prescribed set of inservice components included in this program or their equivalent and demonstrate the competencies required for the certification endorsement. Competency demonstration of the performance indicators outlined in **Table 6** will be done through a variety of methods that may include successful completion of projects or products, portfolio, electronic portfolio, case study, pre- and post-assessments, or other method of measure acceptable to the course instructor/facilitator.

Satisfactory completion of individual components for add-on purposes may be demonstrated through:

- 1. Instructor's verification of successful demonstration of all applicable competencies and products within that component of the approved add-on program.
- 2. Verification of successful demonstration of all applicable competencies within a component of another district's ESOL add-on program shall be conducted by personnel from the district's professional development office and will apply when reasonable equivalency between the components can be established through a review of the approved program; or.

3. Successful completion with a grade of "B" or better, of a college or university course documented by official transcript, where reasonable equivalence can be established between the component and the course through a review of the course catalog description and course materials. This review shall be conducted by authorized personnel from the district's professional development office.

B. Competency Demonstration

Candidates must satisfy all of the add-on program requirements for the option approved by appropriate district personnel, including demonstration of knowledge in each of the competencies which are required for the endorsement.

Procedures for evaluation of competency attainment within components will vary with the nature of the competency (see **Table 6**). Valid means of measurement shall include, but not be limited to some of the following:

- Demonstration of the competencies required for the certification coverage/endorsement
- Written test
- Completed projects or products
- Compilation of electronic portfolio
- Portfolio assessment
- Case study
- Other method of measure acceptable to the instructor/facilitator
- Satisfactory completion of individual assignments and activities
- Satisfactory responses to questions posed by the facilitator

C. COMPETENCY VERIFICATION

In rare or extremely extenuating circumstances, a district may choose to allow participants to verify competencies in lieu of taking some of the required training. If this occurs, the district must develop a competency verification system that includes the following parts:

- Competencies general statements of what teachers are expected to be able to do, as a result
 of specific training; or prior training, practice, and experience.
- Assessment Criteria measurable indicators related to identified competencies.
- Appropriate Data Collection Instruments and Procedures methods for collecting sufficient evidence of the teacher's ability to demonstrate the unique set of competencies and obtain a passing score on appropriate state assessment for coverage add-ons.
- Well-Defined Implementation Policies and Procedures written documents designed to
 ensure fair and consistent application of the competency verification system, including
 specification of who, when, how, and under what conditions the verification is done.

VI. PROGRAM EVALUATION

The process for evaluating the efficacy of the ESOL Add-On Endorsement online courses, as outlined in this document, is described in the subsequent sections.

Effect of In-service Education

Those who complete the ESOL Add-On Endorsement courses are typically classroom teachers who interact regularly with students who are English Language Learners (ELL). The effect of the inservice education and training in the educational setting (Rule 6A-5.071(4) (e) 3, F.A.C. will be determined as described in *Florida's Professional Development System Evaluation Protocol* (2010-2014). As stated in Standard 1.4.4, the educator will use summative and formative data from state or national standardized student achievement measures, when available, or other measures of student learning and behavior such as district achievement tests, progress monitoring, educator-constructed tests, action research results, and/or portfolios of student work to assess the impact of professional learning. Additionally, as described in Standard 1.4.5, the educator will use the results of the Independent Professional Development Plan evaluation as part of a continuous improvement process to develop the following year's IPDP, and to revise professional learning goals, as needed, based on student performance results and documented teaching practice.

All of the PAEC online ESOL courses may be considered to be electronic portfolios, through which participants' classroom implementation of appropriate ESOL strategies and techniques, reflections and evaluation of efficacy may be tracked and monitored. Districts, covered by this Add-On Endorsement Plan employ the IPDP as a means of identifying teachers' professional development needs, based on data of the students they teach. The IPDP is then used to determine whether the teacher achieves the stated professional development goals and the impact of the professional development as based on student performance and documented teaching practice.

Evaluation of Implementation - Competency Acquisition

The effectiveness of the program in its attempt to allow participants to acquire the competencies is determined by feedback from program participants. Completion of the feedback survey, Figure 1, as shown, is required before course credit is awarded.

Program Management, Operation, and Delivery

In order to evaluate the efficiency of the management, operation and delivery of this add-on endorsement, as well as its ability to meet the needs of the district and participants, PAEC will place as a permanent agenda item this discussion for all Professional Development Advisory Council meetings. Since PAEC is owned by its fourteen member districts, and since one of its responsibilities is to meet regularly with the curriculum coordinators and professional development directors, PAEC will record the minutes of these meetings and retain discussion of the ESOL add-on Endorsement that takes place at each meeting during the period that this endorsement is in effect.

Annual Review

At the annual September meeting of the Professional Development Advisory Council, data from the evaluation instrument shown in Figure 1, as well as information about the number of teachers completing and currently enrolled in the program will be shared upon request.

ESOL items to be added to the September Professional Development Advisory Council agenda include:

How is the current add-on endorsement meeting the needs of your district? How is the current add-on endorsement meeting the needs of your teachers and students? Is this program cost-effective for your district?

While the evaluation instrument shown in Figure 1 provides some data regarding the carry-over effects of inservice education and training into the educational setting, (Rule 6A-5.071(7), F.A.C.), administrators at each school/district will also make determinations of the effectiveness of the PAEC ESOL Add-On Endorsement inservice training through the teachers' Individual Professional Development Plan final evaluations. Information regarding specific programmatic needs, if indicated, will be reported to the district's representative on the PAEC Professional Development Advisory Council. Curriculum coordinators and professional development directors will analyze the data and direct PAEC to make adjustments to this program as the data indicates the need.

NOTE: A summary report of actual numbers regarding course participation and completion, as well as course evaluations can be made available upon request.

VII. MANAGEMENT

Overall management of this add-on program is the responsibility of each district's assigned staff development/add-on program coordinator or designee. This individual will be responsible for the provision of the training within the District Master In-service Plan framework and program oversight to ensure compliance with State Standards for operation of add-on certification programs. This responsibility will be carried out in coordination with appropriate district certification personnel, ESOL administrative and supervisory personnel, and program instructors.

The Panhandle Area Education Consortium will be responsible for:

- Notifying districts when an applicant has successfully completed a component of the addon program
- Updating and reviewing the courses
- Advertising the availability of the courses to the individual districts
- Providing qualified instructors/facilitators (see part IV, Instructors)

A. CANDIDATE APPLICATION AND ADMISSION

Candidates must receive approval prior to pursuing the Add-On-Program through the office of their district professional development director. It is the responsibility of the staff development office to review the participant's information to ensure the applicant currently holds a valid Florida Professional or Temporary Certificate based upon a bachelor's degree or higher in any ESOL Category I area as identified by FDOE. Any other district personnel are eligible to enroll in the program, on a space-available basis.

The district professional development director or designee will advise the candidate and complete the forms named below. The district staff development director will authorize the candidate's admission into the program.

Forms to Be Completed:

- A. Panhandle Area Educational Consortium ESOL Individual Plan of Study
- B. Panhandle Area Educational Consortium Online Application Form (if PAEC-provided online courses are used)

Participation in professional learning for the purpose of earning an add-on endorsement is limited to individuals who hold a valid Florida Temporary or Professional Educator's Certificate, issued on the basis of a bachelor's degree or higher degree in an academic area.

Any applicant who begins the program based on a temporary certificate must complete the requirements for a professional certificate prior to the district's verification of program completion.

Consideration for admission to the program will be given to individuals currently teaching who meet one or more of the following criteria listed in priority order:

- currently assigned out-of-field in ESOL, assigned to teach English/language arts or intensive reading in a school where ESOL students are currently enrolled and are likely to be assigned as their English/language arts or intensive reading instructor in the future;
- assigned to teach English/language arts or intensive reading in a school where ESOL students
 could be in attendance and could be assigned as their English/language arts instructor in the
 future;
- · seeking renewal of certification; or,
- seeking further professional learning opportunities in order to better meet the needs of students who are English Language Learners and students in general.

Individuals participating in this program have access through the ePDC to their transcript which tracks all individual professional development and serves as official documentation of successful course completion. This transcript is also accessible to the district Professional development directors of member districts.

B. ADVISEMENT

As part of the application process, applicants may be advised of the following:

- Requirements for continued employment in an out-of-field status;
- Requirements for adding the ESOL endorsement to the existing certificate (appropriate area
 of certification, specific courses and timelines required for completion of the add-on
 program, etc.);
- Availability of university or college courses to meet the requirements of the add-on program;
- The requirement that, for individuals holding a temporary certificate, valid Florida Professional Educator's Certificate must be obtained prior to completion of this program; and/or,
- Continuing advisement will be provided by the appropriate district office and PAEC ESOL
 contacts on matters related to certification, add-on offerings, and progress toward
 completion of program requirements.

C. ATTENDANCE

PAEC-provided online ESOL courses are self-paced and completion is not based on attendance. Instead, participants interact with course content and compile an electronic portfolio of responses to assignments, products, and reflections based on classroom implementation. All contents of the electronic portfolio are reviewed and must meet approval of the course facilitator before course credit is granted. For face-to-face workshops, attendance is mandatory unless the absence is excused by the instructor for serious or extreme emergencies. Excused absences and missed assignments must be satisfied through a "make-up" schedule approved by the instructor(s).

The Panhandle Area Education Consortium will report completion of individual components of the add-on program to the district professional development office and to the participant through the electronic Professional Development Connections. It is the participant's responsibility to complete each component within the timelines established by the Florida Consent Decree and School Board Rule 6A-1.0503, Definition of Qualified Instructional Personnel.

D. TRANSFER AND UTILIZATION OF CREDIT

Professional development records for each participant are maintained in the form of an electronic transcript in the ePDC of the Panhandle Area Educational Consortium. Each district's Professional Development Director has access to the electronic transcripts of teachers in his/her district and verification for certification endorsement or for conversion from college credit will be issued from that office, in consultation with the district Certification Office.

Credit earned in college courses (see Options B and C) from an accredited institution of higher education may be considered for transfer of credit to this add-on endorsement program. College courses are converted to in-service points with each semester credit hour equivalent to 20 inservice points. Participants must request an official college transcript from the institution of higher education for courses they wish to transfer.

In-service credit earned for ESOL courses while employed in another district or prior to the district's adoption of this add-on program may be applied to the add-on program, provided the component is of equivalent or higher content rigor. Participants must request an official In-service Transfer Record from the previous employer. The Professional Development Director of the district, in which the participant is employed, will make a determination of the appropriateness of completed components and will transfer applicable credit.

E. CERTIFICATION OF COMPLETION

For those utilizing Option A, when the student transcript in the electronic Professional Development Connections indicates successful completion of all add-on endorsement requirements, the district staff development office will prepare the District Verification Form for Completion of an Approved Add-On Program (CT-115) and submit it to the Florida Department of Education.

For those utilizing Option B, upon completion of all program requirement each participant must submit the following to the district professional development office:

- A completed Request for Verification of Completion form (CT-115)
- · The approved and completed Individual Plan of Study form

Upon completion of all program requirements, each participant must submit the following to the district professional development office if Option B or C is utilized:

- A completed Request for Verification of Completion form (CT-115)
- · The approved and completed Individual Plan of Study form
- Official university transcript for all completed university courses as specified in Options B and C, if applicable

VIII. SCHOOL BOARD APPROVAL

In order for the ESOL Add-On Endorsement Program to receive state approval, it must include a statement signed by the district superintendent and chairman of the School Board stating that it has been approved locally for submission.
