Furthering the Pursuit of Early Detection

Dr. John McDonald Ovarian Cancer Institute - Atlanta, GA

In 2014, LCBF was a primary funder of Dr. McDonald's initial research to develop a novel, early diagnostic test for ovarian cancer. The test, which detects metabolites in the blood, was highly successful in both sensitivity and specificity of detecting early stage ovarian cancer. In 2018, LCBF provided additional funding to further evaluate the test's efficacy in a greater sample size of early stage ovarian cancer tumors.

Educating the Community on GYN Cancers

LCBF staff and volunteers work throughout the year to increase awareness across the state and educate communities on prevention, risk factors, and signs and symptoms. In September, we ramp up our efforts in recognition of GYN Cancer Awareness Month. In 2018, we reached thousands of Alabamians through a variety of strategies, including:

- Teal lighting of more than 100 buildings and landmarks
- Radio advertising
- Digital billboards
- Hundreds of yard signs, posters, and teal ribbons
