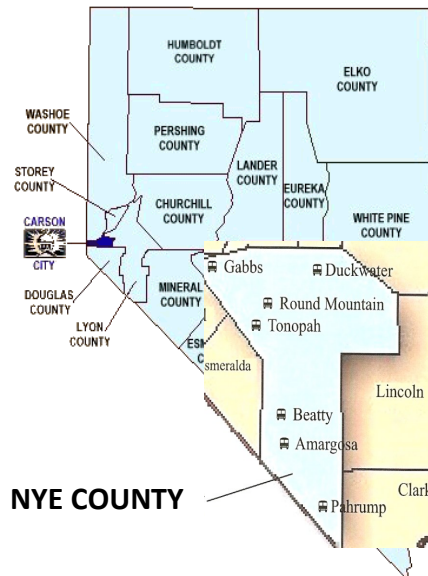

motive Technology, Business & Marketing Education, Culinary Arts, Family & Consumer Sciences, Foods & Nutrition, Furniture & Cabinet Making, Graphic Design, Photography, Video Production, and Welding Technology.

- ◆ Teachers and administrators are held to the high standards of the Nevada Educator Performance Framework to give ALL students the opportunity and support they need to be successful.
- ◆ To ensure excellent instruction for every student in every class every day, the district supports collaborative professional learning communities to develop and retain high quality teachers and administrators who implement the guaranteed curriculum and plan for intervention and enrichment
