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**You are their Superman:** Every child needs to feel secure. As their Dad, they look to you to provide that feeling at all times. When those little eyes look up at you, they see Superman. Live up to the hype.

**Open your heart:** In society, men are expected to be strong. This is a good thing. However with your children, open all of yourself to them. Show them compassion, sympathy and forgiveness. They will, in turn, do the same with their kids when they grow up.

**Love and respect your partner:** Your children will learn how men should behave from you. Treat your partner with gentle care and the utmost respect. You can't love your partner perfectly, but your kids should never doubt your love for her. If your children are raised in a loving family, they have a great model for future relationships.

**The bedtime story:** Young children like nothing more than to be read a story. It lights up their imaginations and gets them time with you. They also love it when you take it a step further and add sound effects and funny voices. There is no sweeter sound than the pure laughter of your own children.

**Understanding:** No matter how much of a "chip off the old block" he may be, your child has his own unique personality. Take the time to learn your child and understand him. What makes him tick? What makes him sad? What is his dream? Everything. Children want your acknowledgement of who they are.

**Bear hugs and more:** The glow on a child's face when his dad picks him up with strong arms is an awesome sight to see. Never be ashamed to hug your child, kiss your child and say I love you. This comes hard for some men. Have you seen the commercial of the hockey player singing Itsy Bitsy Spider to his daughter on the phone? That's your role model.

**Professor Dad:** Teach your kids the life-skills they need. Sometimes parents assign tasks and just assume a child knows how to do it. And when things pop up that you are not great at, learn them together. Be humble and clear and give your kids all they need to be successful.

**The dinner table:** It sure is a busy world we live in. Very easily dinner time gets scattered, covered and smothered. When at all possible, make sure your family sits down at one table and shares meals together – television off. You will never learn more about your child in any other setting than at a dinner table.

**Show them how to live:** One of the biggest parenting mistakes is losing yourself in the process. Let your children see all the things about you that make you wonderful. Remember, your parents had hopes and dreams for you as well! They do not have to die just because you're a parent. The family always comes first, but your fulfillment journey does not end. When they see their Dad living a full and awesome life, they will most likely do the same when they are adults.

This is not 1950: Once upon a time, a world existed where the husband worked and the wife raised the family. He made the money, she ran the house. But, times are changing and a man needs to do his share around the house, while the woman may need to make some extra money. Be a man who can hold his own in a kitchen. A man that can keep a baby all day by himself. This is a complicated world and your children need to be as versatile and diverse as you.



### Lowe's Welcomes Head Start/Pre K Children



Head Start/Pre K teacher Jennifer Royster brought her preschool children on a field trip to Lowe's Home Improvement Warehouse to participate in an ongoing program of collaboration between Lowe's and RESA 8 Head Start/Pre K. Lowe's has partnered with RESA 8 Head Start/Pre K for three years providing programs for both our children and their families. In an effort to increase male involvement with

their children, Diane Ansari, Director of Head Start/Pre K, approached Lowe's to coordinate the partnership. When asked about the collaboration that has developed with Lowe's, Head Start/Pre K Director, Diane Ansari stated, "that it has been amazing! Lowe's interest in reaching out to families is indeed exemplary. RESA 8 is truly grateful to have Lowe's as a community partner."

Each year Lowe's provides Head Start/Pre K's over four hundred children an educational hands-on activity that includes the use of child sized hammers, goggles, nails and a kit to build, complete with pictured instructions for the child to follow. The projects that the children work on with the assistance of their parent or guardian provides them with a variety of skills needed for their development. These include following directions, prereading, fine motor development, tool safety as well as cooperation and social skills.

### **Kindergarten Readiness**

Kindergarten registration will be coming soon. Be sure to watch for flyers with dates and information. It is important to make appointments for registration. When you do, be sure to let them know that your child is in Head Start/Pre-K so they know that your child is already in the computer system. To register your child, you will need a birth certificate from the State Department of Vital Statistics where your child was born. A county or hospital certificate will not be accepted. Please contact your child's teacher if you need help getting this. You will also need updated immunizations and proof of residence. What you need for your county will be coming soon with registration dates.

Remember this summer can be used to start new routines that you can carry into the school year. Getting a good schedule and enforcing bedtimes and early wake-up may seem silly in the summertime, but if you can establish the habit, you will find those first days of school a lot less stressful.

Preparing for the first day of school:

- Get supplies recommended by the school
- Start an 'early to bed' routine about two weeks before classes begin
- Help your child pick out clothes for the next day the night before If you make this a habit there won't be a struggle when you try to get this done when school starts!
- Locate a place for your child to collect things (s)he'll need in the mornings (backpacks, shoes, jackets)

As for skills, your children have been learning to stay on task, follow instructions, and take care of personal needs such as zipping coats, tying shoes, snapping pants and washing hands. They are also identifying colors, recognizing their names and identifying some letters and numbers.

Different schools will send home materials for you to work on with your child. Go over these activities and enjoy them. Do not put too much pressure on your child, but get them started on practicing these skills. It will make those first days much easier and the transition more comfortable.

Kindergarten is a time of change. You need to prepare yourself and your child. The "big" school has different expectations and responsibilities from those at Head Start/ PreK. You need to reassure your children that different isn't scary. Let them know what to expect in positive terms. Some of the differences for your children are:

- 1. Buses don't have harnesses so children will be seated without restraints.
- 2. Children get their meals on trays after waiting in line and they carry their trays around to get to their seats.
- 3. Children have desks to keep their things and they are expected to sit at their desks and keep them neat.
- 4. Recess is multiple classes outside at the same time so children have many children to play with outside.
