# **Early Head Start Friends Have Been Busy!**



Our Early Head Start friends have been busy this month. We experimented with color by dying dry pasta noodles with food color. After the noodles were dry, we strung them onto yarn to make necklaces. Many of the children wore their necklaces proudly! We also spent a lot of time during our home visits making "stain-less glass". The children used scissors to cut squares of tissue paper. They then used glue sticks to glue the paper onto plastic wrap that was hung in the window. These activities developed their fine motor skills and deepened their understanding of cause and effect.



# **Read to Me Everyday**

It is time to kick off our Read to Me Everyday Program for this school year! Each week your child will bring home a red book bag with 5 books for you to share. A journal is included in the book bag so you and your child may share comments or pictures with his or her teacher.

Reading to your child can create not only life-long memories but also build a love for reading. It is best if you have a special place to read to your child, be it in bed, a comfy chair or even at the kitchen table. Turning off the TV and radio helps to set the mood and limit distractions. Have your child sit in your lap, or very close to you, while you read. Allow the child easy view of the pictures in the book. Explain words they do not know as they appear in the story. Stop to ask questions such as "What do you think will happen next?" "Why did they do that?" Making your questions open ended will encourage deeper thinking and a more meaningful conversation. If the book has too many words for your child's attention span, shorten the story into your own words.

Make reading a part of your everyday routine and both you and your child will share many wonderful memories.



As the above bar graph shows, reading to children only once or twice a week does little or nothing to improve vocabulary, but reading three to five times a week helps a lot, and reading to children everyday makes a very big difference in their vocabulary development. This graph was from a one year study of the effects of reading on Head Start Children

# TRI-COUNTY

The parent interest surveys are back and the results have been tallied for the program. The results vary across the program but we would like to present the top 10 choices/ interests for the parents whose children attend a Berkeley County classroom.

- Nutrition and cooking 62 parents voted for information on this topic
- Child discipline 55 parents would like more information
- Weight loss/ exercise 47 parents would like more information
- Job search/employment skills 42 parents would like information or assistance
- Stress management 41 parents would like information on how to control stress
- Money management 37 parents would like information on money management
- Going to college 31 parents would like information or assistance in this area
- Getting a home 30 parents would like information on purchasing a home
- Quitting smoking 28 parents would like information on how to quit
- Health care 28 parents would like information on health care

The times that parents would like to attend parent meetings was very close to being even for the three choices. We would like to offer meetings at different times of the day during the year to help accommodate a variety of schedules. The results were:

- 47 parents would like evening meetings
- 41 would like afternoon parent meetings
- 37 would like morning meetings

We encourage parents to participate in the parent meetings that we have throughout the year. Parent involvement is important for a child's development and it promotes their interest in learning. Hosting parent meetings and trainings are a requirement of our program and we hope that you can join us as much as possible. Meetings are held at different times and locations throughout the year. You will always be given notice of the events at least two weeks in advance. At most meetings we provide childcare and light refreshments or sometimes a meal!!

Family Services is starting a walking group called, "Walk it off". The first meeting which is an information session about the group will be held Tuesday, October 11th, at the Berkeley Heights Center. The group is open to all HS, EHS, and Pre-K parents. # Protect Your Preschoolers From the Number One Killer Article Courtesy of the N.F.P.A.

House fires are frightening no matter how old you are, but children are often victims because they don't understand what to do. Instead of heading immediately outside, they often hide in closets or underneath beds, and they can be as afraid of fire fighters in full fire gear as they are of the fire itself.

#### **Fire Prevention**

To hold children's interest when talking about fire safety, enlist them as part of your fire-safety patrol. Let them help you search for fire hazards in your home, such as the ones given in this section. Also, ask them to tell you right away if they see any in your home, a caregiver's home, or a grandparent's home.

#### General Home

Keep matches and lighters out of children's reach. Children are intrigued by fire, so teach them that matches and lighters are tools for adults, not toys.

Never let children light candles on cakes, and supervise children until the candles are extinguished.

Rearrange heavy objects so doors and windows are not blocked.

Plug only one heat-producing appliance into an outlet at a time. Overloading outlets or extension cords can cause fires.

#### Bedroom

Never smoke in bed, and stop smoking if you feel sleepy. Be sure to wet ashes before dumping them in the trash. Use large ashtrays that will not tip; keep them out of children's reach.

#### **Family Room**

Never run electric cords under rugs or close to long drapes. Be sure to repair or discard worn cords.

Keep items that can burn at least three feet away from fireplaces and space heaters. Never leave children unattended near a working fireplace, wood stove, or space heater. Have chimneys inspected once a year. Use only dry wood to prevent the buildup of creosote.

#### Kitchen

Establish a three-foot safety zone around the stove or other heating appliances. Do not allow children and pets to play in this area.

Your cooking area should be clear of all combustibles, such as pot holders and dish towels.

Keep appliances clean. Grease buildup catches fire easily.

Never leave the area while anything is cooking. When you leave the kitchen or the house, turn off the stove and appliances.

Turn pot handles inward. Handles that stick out can be easily bumped or grabbed by children.

Unplug toasters and other electrical appliances when they are not in use.

If a cooking fire starts, turn off the burner and use a kitchen fire extinguisher to put out the fire (one rated 2—B:C that's intended to fight grease and electrical fires).

# Fire Safety Activities for Preschoolers

#### **Practicing 9-1-1 and Street Address**

Use a play phone to practice dialing 9-1-1 with your child. Have your child tell you what they might say to the dispatcher if there were a fire or another emergency at your home. Work with your child so that they know their address.

#### Remembering 9-1-1

If your child is young, and has trouble remembering the correct sequence of 9-1-1 - Place a small red circle sticker on the 9, and 2 small green circle stickers on the 1 - Practice saying "red, green, green" with your child. Sometimes it is easier for them to remember their colors than it is to remember numbers!

#### Stop, Drop, and Roll

Stop, drop, and roll is easy and fun to practice.

Stop: Stop where you are. Don't run!

**Drop:** Drop to the ground.

Roll: Cover your face with your hands to protect it from flames

and roll over and over to smother the flames.

#### Toys versus Tools

Have the children collect pictures from magazines of things that are safe to play with, such as bikes and balls, and things that are not, such as matches, lighters, and cars. Put the cut-out pictures in a box, draw them out one at a time, and have the children say if the object is safe or unsafe.

Practice fire safety techniques such as "get low and go under smoke" and "stop, drop, and roll if your clothes catch on fire".
