RAPP SCHOLASTIC BOWL ROCKS! Thank you, Mr. Nasar, for sharing an update:

At the UVA Cavalier Classic in November, the Panther Scholastic Bowl team qualified for SSNCT, a national tournament for small public high schools to be played in Chicago in May. We are exploring sources of funding to go there and play for a national title. On Monday, Dec. 3 Rapp extended its winning streak to 4-0 with big wins over Central and Strasburg. The Panthers pulled ahead quickly against Central with 85-10 in the first period and never looked back, outscoring them by 110-30 in period 2, and 120-10 in period 3 for a final of 315-50. Lauren Petty, the junior captain scored 110 toss-up points, while Alec Petty scored 50 but only played one round. Bryce Jones contributed 30 and Agustin Garcia scored 20 toss-up points. In the Strasburg match, Garcia, Jones, and the two Pettys started and led by 115-30 at the end of period 1, while round 2 was evener. In round 3, Daniel Dalle Luca replaced Garcia, scoring 10 points and Rapp outscored Strasburg by 35 in the last round for a final score of 290-160, the second trouncing of Strasburg in as many weeks. Lauren Petty scored 70 toss-up points and Alec Petty scored 90, with 20 for Jones. The team has built up its competence on the buzzers and is confident about remaining undefeated going forward.
