Health Science Academy

Three students selected!

This year, RCHS was able to partner with twelve other school divisions, Valley Health, Shenandoah University, and Lord Fairfax Community College to offer an in-depth learning experience for students with math and science aptitude interested in health sciences. Students spend a week in the summer learning the various types of health science career options available, while receiving hands-on training giving injections to a training muscle, starting intravenous fluids in a training arm, testing blood glucose levels, and learning in an academic setting more about emergency room care, pediatric oncology, anesthesiology and more! To be eligible for this program, students completed a competitive application process and were blind selected based on a specific criteria-oriented rubric. This year's selections were Brooke Athelli, Macy Montgomery, and Kayla Robey! We hope that this experience will provide additional enrichment to guide future career choices for these
