Bullying Prevention Month

In support of Bullying Prevention Month, RCPS School Psychologist, Kathy Zehr Rhodes, along with the RCPS guidance counselors, led multiple school-wide initiatives to increase awareness on the importance of bullying prevention and promoting acts of kindness throughout the month of October. Activities that were held throughout the month included spirit weeks and team building games. In addition, the Peer Mentors from the high school visited with the elementary students on several occasions to share lunch and engage in a variety of fun games to promote a culture of connectedness.
