VSBA VIDEO CONTEST Focus on Workplace Readiness



Rappahannock County High School participated in the Virginia School Boards' Association (VSBA) yearly video contest. This year's contest asked students to express their thoughts and ideas around the theme Workforce Readiness. Videos are judged on how well students address the topic within a thirty second period, as well as, the quality of the production and the creativity of the video. The Design, Multimedia, & Web Technologies class, taught by Linda Petty, took on the competition representing Rappahannock County High School.

Working in small groups, students learned the basics of producing a movie such as: brainstorming ideas, planning what they wanted to say and how they wanted to say it visually, how to film the video, take the pictures and upload them, creating a storyboard and finally how to use the program to create the video. Each video submitted was judged by an impartial committee. The finished movies were presented on the large screen in the high school auditorium and each team narrated their creative work. With the announcement of the winning video, created by Sydney Murphy, Amber Smoot, Sebastian Vonsteinner, and Karley Wharton, the class was treated to an ice cream social provided by Technology

Director, Robin Bolt who offered her technological expertise to the students.

The selected video, entitled *Workforce Readiness*, has been submitted to the Virginia School Boards' Association for competition. VSBA will select their top three videos which will be shown during the

The Olweus Bullying Prevention Team at RCES has been busy planning activities for our students to promote a month-long anti-bullying campaign. The students will engage throughout the month in fun activities that promote cooperation and teamwork while earning prizes that will reinforce the message that we respect each other. Planned activities include a new kick off for the "Road to Character" program that recognizes positive character virtues exhibited by our students. Each week, students will receive prizes for actions reflecting Trustworthiness, Respect, Responsibility, Fairness, Caring, and Citizenship. RCHS CELEBRATES WATERSHED FIELD DAY RappFLOW Event a Success

On Thursday, September 22, the RCHS chemistry and horticulture classes visited the Link in Sperryville to view and participate in the Watershed Field Day. Sponsored by the Rappahannock Friends and Lovers of Our Watershed, better known as RappFLOW, the event provided exposure to real life science in the field as well as networking opportunities with student representatives from other county schools. Our budding scientists, along with those of neighboring schools, were able to enrich their knowledge with relevant hands-on exercises conducted by practicing scientists and naturalists. It was a morning filled with the demonstration of important ecological principles and practices that benefit Rappahannock County as well as all others downstream, since Rappahannock County is located at the headwaters of the watershed.

Mr. Naser's chemistry class learned about water quality testing methods from Virginia Master Naturalist, Donald Hearl, Vice President of Environmental Systems Solutions. Performing the same procedures utilized by the Culpeper Soil and Water District, students tested the waters of the Thornton River for nitrate, phosphate and dissolved oxygen. Mr. Naser's class will be incorporating this knowledge into their own project based learning explorations about water quality later in the semester.

On the botanical side of this science field trip, Mrs. Waddell's class was able to experience three different presentation stations that focused on plant taxonomy, grass management, and rain gardens. Key characteristics on identifying plants were explored with taxonomy handouts distributed to students for placement in their class notes folder for future use. The nine-hole golf course adjacent to the Link served as the ideal laboratory in which the different methods of cutting, watering, and fertilizing were demonstrated by grounds crew workers.

The final horticulture demonstration showcased rain

gardens as buffer zones to help purify the water flowing into our streams and rivers. Noting the additional benefits of erosion control, the flora make-up of rain gardens was discussed with a focus on the importance of using native plants. As part of the presentation, watershed friendly backyard management information for homeowners was discussed, with information sent home for students to share with parents. After an action packed morning, RCHS students returned to the high school in time for lunch, each with a new appreciation for the environmental processes that lead to the food on our tables.
