****Answer one or 2 questions a day. Use a different color/or mark to get BINGO multiple ways. **The answer to these questions should be written down when possible. Those answers should be at least 2-4 sentences depending on the grade level and story length and details. For younger learners, drawing or talking about the story is a great way to answer the questions. Also for the younger grades, you may have to ask more questions to help your child to understand the concept. If you do not have books your child can listen to a story you are reading or one they have listened to on one of the reading websites. The questions can apply to either. Parents can talk about a book they are reading too or answer the questions about the same story as well.**
