In addition to the National Poetry Contest, 7th and 8th graders will be focusing on the types, features, examples, and purpose of informational text. They will reproduce a form on informational text in the structure they deem interesting to them. This will give the students great exposure to the types of informational text. May 6ELA (Reading and Research) test
May 7Mathematics test
May 8Science test for grades 4 and 7, and
Social Studies or Science tests for grades 3, 5, 6, and 8
May 9Social Studies test for grades 4 and 7
May 12-16 Make-up tests

#### What is the purpose of the SCPASS tests?

Palmetto Assessment of State Standards test items measure student performance on the South Carolina Academic Standards. Palmetto Assessment of State Standards test results are used for school, district, and federal (No Child Left Behind) accountability purposes.

#### What are Palmetto Assessment of State Standards performance levels?

The three performance levels are categories that reflect the overall knowledge and skills exhibited by students on each test:

**Exemplary** - The student demonstrated exemplary performance in meeting the grade-level standard.

**Met** - The student met the grade-level standard.

Not Met - The student did not meet the grade-level standard.



### Tips for Parents

Parents can help children with test - taking preparation.

#### Do's:

- Encourage your child to do his/her best.
- Provide a quiet place for studying at home.
- Make sure your child attends school regularly.
- Meet with teachers and ask for activities that you and your child can do at home to prepare for tests.
- Make sure your child gets adequate sleep. A tired child is less able to pay attention or handle the demands of testing.
- Give your child well balanced meals. Rest, exercise, and eating well are important for test taking.

#### Don'ts:

- Get upset because of a single test score. Test scores are not perfect measures of what your child can do.
- Place so much emphasis on your child's test scores. Too much pressure can upset your child and influence test performance.
- Schedule appointments during testing week.
