There's *practice* and then there's **practice**. Like many other schools, RLOACS provides every student free access to Study Island: an online software filled with class-specific lessons and practice tests for grade levels K-12 and beyond. The program allows students to watch videos about, re-

view examples of and quiz themselves on content taught in their classes. Grade 5 students, between August 1 and October 1, logged a massive 949 practice sessions, totaling 56 hours and 33 minutes of additional practice time. Student Luis Chavira-Gonzalez, pictured right, completed 438 practice questions in that time, nearly *twice* as many as any other student in the group. Way to go Luis! Way to go grade five! Keep working hard!
