SANDERS UNIFIED SCHOOL DISTRICT INDIAN POLICIES AND PROCEDURES 2017-2018 School Year

It is the intent of Sanders Unified School District that all Indian children of school age have equal access to all programs, services and activities offered within the school district. To this end, Sanders Unified School District will consult with local tribal officials and parents of Indian children in the planning and development of Indian Policies and Procedures (IPPs), general education programs, and activities. These policies and procedures will be reviewed annually and revisions will be made within 90 days of the determination that requirements are not being adequately met.

ATTESTATIONS

Sanders Unified School District attests that it has established Indian Policies and Procedures (IPPs) as required in section 7004 of the Impact Aid law for any children claimed who resides on eligible Indian lands. The IPPs have been adequately disseminated to the tribes and parents of children residing on eligible Indian lands. A copy of the current policies and procedures was attached to the FY 2019 Impact Aid application.

Sanders Unified School District attests that it has provided a copy of written responses to comments, concerns and recommendations received from tribal leaders and parents of Indian children through the Indian Policies and Procedures consultation process and disseminated these responses to tribal leaders and parents of Indian children prior to the submission of their FY 2019_ Impact Aid application.

Indian Policies and Procedures

The following Indian Policies and Procedures become effective upon school board approval.

POLICY 1:

The LEA will disseminate relevant applications, evaluations, program plans and information related to the LEA's education program and activities with sufficient advance notice to allow tribes and parents of Indian children the opportunity to review and make recommendations. [34CFR222.94 (a)(1)]

PROCEDURES

Sanders Unified School District will disseminate information and seek timely input regarding the following programs on its educational program (including, but not limited to): Title I, Part A, Title I, Part C, Title I, Part D, Title II, Part A, Title III, Part A, Title IV, Part A, Title IV, Part B, Title V, Part B subpart 2, Title VI, Part A, subpart I, Title VII-Impact Aid programs, Title VII-Indian Education, and Johnson O'Malley programming.

The completed applications, evaluations, and program planning will be made available to parents of Indian children, tribal officials, and the public a summary will be prepared and disseminated at least two weeks in advance of public hearings held in December and June to afford all interested parties the opportunity to review the documents with sufficient time to provide thoughtful input at the public meetings. These hearings will be publically advertised by School Messenger to allow all interested parties to attend. In addition, representatives from the district will schedule meetings with the tribal representative to seek input.

Parents of Indian children, tribal officials, and the public can review assessment data to help develop or modify educational programs and services allowing for the participation of Indian students on an equal basis in the district.

Minutes from the public meetings will be posted on the district's website for all patrons and tribal officials to review. This will allow for ongoing dissemination of information.

POLICY 2:

Sanders Unified School District will provide an opportunity for the Navajo Nation and parents of Indian children to provide their views on the district's educational program and activities, including recommendations on the needs of their children and on how the district may help those children realize the benefits of the educational programs and activities.[34CFR222.94(a)(2)]

- i. SUSD will notify the Navajo Nation and the parents of Indian children of the opportunity to submit comments and recommendations, considering the tribe's preference for method of communication, and
- ii. Modify the method of method and time for soliciting Indian views, if necessary, to ensure the maximum participation of tribes and parents of Indian children.

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PROCEDURES

The Indian Education Committee and the Parent Advisory Committee of Sanders Unified School District will meet monthly for the purpose of addressing comments and concerns of parents of Indian children regarding the district's educational programs and activities. The meeting agendas are posted and all meetings are open to the public allowing for tribal officials as well as parents of Indian children the opportunity to submit comments and recommendations for consideration.

A school parent liaison is a non-voting member of the Indian Education Committee and the Parent Advisory Committee. The Parent Liaison is the district liaison is the representative for the school district which oversees both the IEC and PAC. This representation allows for the discussion of the needs of the students and ideas to be brought forward to both the Indian Education Committee as well as the Parent Advisory Committee as well as bringing up any topics that need to have final Governing Board approval.

At each of the monthly school board meetings, a section of time is set aside for communications from the public. This is a time to offer comments and suggestions regarding programming for Indian students. In addition, two public hearings are scheduled in December and June which are specifically devoted to addressing questions regarding federal programs. Based upon suggestions, preferred methods of communication as well as ways to maximize participation from tribal officials as well as parents of Indian children will be seriously considered.

Information will be included in student handbooks/enrollment packets regarding opportunities to provide input to the district.

The district and Indian Education Committee representatives will schedule meetings with the Navajo Nation to discuss ongoing programming goals.

POLICY 3:

Sanders Unified School District will annually assess the extent to which Indian children participate on an equal basis with non-Indian children in the district's education program and activities. [34CFR222.94(a)(3)]

i. SUSD will share relevant information related to Indian children's participation in the LEA's education program and activities with tribes and parents of Indian children; and

ii. Allow tribes and parents of Indian children the opportunity and time to review and comment on whether Indian children participate on an equal basis with non-Indian children.

PROCEDURES

Sanders Unified School District will take the following measures to annually assess the extent to which Indian children participate on an equal basis with non-Indian children in the District's education program and activities.

- A. Sanders Unified School District will monitor Indian student participation in all academic and co-curricular activities.
- B. School district officials will review school data to assess the extent of Indian children's participation in the District's educational program on an equal basis.
- C. Sanders Unified School District will share its assessment of district funding, Indian student participation, related academic achievements and other related data will be shared with the parents of Indian children and tribal officials by posting at tribal offices for public viewing.

POLICY 4:

Sanders Unified School District will modify the IPPs if necessary, based upon the results of any assessment or input described in this document. [34CRF222.94(a)(4)]

PROCEDURES

During the organization meetings of the Indian Education Committee and the Parent Advisory Committee, the Indian Policies and Procedures will be reviewed and revised if necessary. Once this had happened, the document will be forwarded to the Sanders Unified School District Governing Board as well as the tribal officials and parents of Indian children for review and consideration. If necessary, the committees may suggest revisions at other times of the year as appropriate. Any updates will be sent to parents of Indian children and tribal officials within two weeks of adoption by the School Board.

POLICY 5:

Sanders Unified School District will respond at least annually in writing to comments and recommendations made by tribes or parents of Indian children, and disseminate the responses to the tribe and parents of Indian children prior to the submission of the IPPs by the LEA. [34CFR222.94(a)(5)]

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PROCEDURES

Sanders Unified School District will at least annually respond in writing to comments and recommendations made by the Indian Education Committee, the Parent Advisory Committee, tribal officials, or parents of Indian children, and disseminate the responses to all parties by newsletter prior to the submission of the IPPs by the District.

POLICY 6:

Sanders Unified School District will provide a copy of the IPPs annually to the affected tribe or tribes.[34CRF222.94(a)(6)]

PROCEDURES

Sanders Unified School District will annually provide a copy of the current Indian Policies and Procedures to the Navajo Nation by email.
