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## Barnett Named Finalist for AL Presidential Award for Math and Science Teaching

SARALAND, AL (July 12, 2018) – Saraland Elementary School teacher, Mrs. Hannah Barnett, was selected as one of three Alabama math teachers named as an Alabama finalist for the Presidential Award for Excellence in Mathematics and Science Teaching (PAEMST). This national award recognizes those teachers who develop and implement a high-quality instructional program that is informed by content knowledge and engages students in the learning process. Awardees serve as models for their colleagues, inspiration to their communities, and leaders in the improvement of Science, Technology, Engineering, and Mathematics or STEM (including computer science) education. Established by Congress in 1983, the President may recognize up to 108 exemplary teachers each year.
