## **Use of Tobacco, Alcohol or Drugs**

For the purposes of this policy, "drugs" include all controlled substances as defined by law, substances used for mind-altering effects, all alcoholic beverages, tobacco products, materials/substances represented to be a drug or controlled substance. Students who use prescription drugs authorized by a licensed physician do not violate this policy if they conform to appropriate school policy.

The District is committed to working diligently toward a drug-free school community. Alcohol, tobacco and other drug use by students is illegal and harmful. Students have the right to a safe and healthy drug-free learning environment.

To insure the high standards of learning, and enable students to develop to their full potential, the District will provide a comprehensive program which provides information and activities to decrease student substance use and the associated problems. This program will encompass appropriate prevention, intervention, and disciplinary consequences.

It is the intent of the District to act as an educator, identifier, referring agent, and coordinator in a cooperative effort with students, parents, and the community. In this way the District hopes to decrease student drug involvement and promote the safety, health, and well-being of the students.

If possession, use, distribution or sale occurred near District grounds, disciplinary action will include removal from any or all extracurricular activities and/or denial or forfeiture of any honors or privileges (e.g., valedictorian, salutatorian, student body, class or club office positions, prom, etc.).

A referral to community resources and/or cessation programs designated to help the student overcome tobacco, alcohol or unlawful drug use may also be made. The cost of such programs are the individual responsibility of the parent and the private health-care system.

### **Use of Tobacco, Alcohol or Other Drugs**

Students will not:

1. Sell illegal drugs/substances;
2. Possess illegal drugs/substances;
3. Use any illegal drugs/substances;
4. Distribute any form of illegal drug/substances;
5. Possess paraphernalia used in illegal drug consumption.

The District recognizes that substance abuse is a serious problem with legal, physical, emotional and socioeconomic implications for the entire school community. Because of this, it is the District's policy to prevent and prohibit the possession, use, sale, distribution, and/or intent to distribute any illegal or controlled psychoactive chemical, medication, look-alike drug, or abused chemical on District property, or at school-sponsored activities. Individuals in violation of this policy will be dealt with in accordance to the established disciplinary procedures of the District.

These guidelines govern students of the District while in normal attendance at all District schools and extends to all functions supported by the school (on/off campus) by participation in these functions.

The District endorses procedures which will support this policy, and which reflect:

1. A "no drug" use/abuse position;
2. A desire to identify using or "at risk" students and refer to the appropriate community agency.

Unlawful delivery of a controlled substance to a student or minor within 1,000 feet of District property is a Class A felony. Punishment is a maximum of 20 years imprisonment, \$100,000 fine, or both.
