AP Psychology Summer 2017 Assignment

 - iv. Have you taken other AP courses throughout your high school career?
 - h. How will you manage your time throughout this upcoming school year?
 - i. Anything else should I know about you so that I have insight into you as a person before the next school year begins.

Assignment #2 - "TED, Talk To Me." (8/15)

Draw evidence from informational texts to support analysis, reflection, and research. - a. First paragraph will be a review of the movie plots. Get to the point without many of the psychological details. This is where you would briefly identify the main characters in the movies.
- b. The second/third paragraphs will be your opportunity to connect the movie to psychology. Each film is filled with psychological topics. You may need to conduct some minor psychological research in fully comprehending the topics discussed. Utilize these paragraphs to compare and contrast the themes in each film. You must discuss at least two topics, so choose wisely.
- c. The final paragraph will serve as your conclusion and closing paragraph. In this paragraph, you are to give your opinion of the films. Did you like the films? Why, why not? Also, within this last paragraph, discuss the psychological importance of these films, in an attempt to persuade next year's students to view these films on their own.
