



Classical Education



A Classical Education enables students to develop, form, and strengthen their minds. The end of this educational process is wisdom. Man desires by nature to know, and that means we want to have not only the facts, but the reasons for the facts. We want to think about the most noble and interesting things. Therefore, the goal of education is to teach children how to think—to help them “learn the art of learning.” If children learn how to learn, they will be able to master any subject. In large measure, the role of the teacher of both Grade School and High School children is this: teaching the students to think.

Saint Therese Carmelite School is faithful to the doctrine and teaching of the Catholic Church, which enlightens and informs all the areas of the curriculum. It is not the number of facts children are acquainted with that measures their educational success, but it is instead what they are able to do with those facts, such as make distinctions, follow an argument, make reasonable deductions from the facts, and finally, to have the right judgment about the way things are.

The ultimate end of Classical Education is to enable the students to better know and glorify God. Classical education teachers ask God to use their teaching, dispositions, and actions as instruments in His hand to cultivate the students' souls toward holiness. In this sense, learning is a means of grace.

To fulfill a good of a lower order, one must proceed to the good of the next highest order (e.g., to fulfill the good of finishing homework, the student must proceed to the slightly higher good of trying to get a good grade; to rightly gain food and shelter, we must seek first the Kingdom of God and His righteousness; to get into the most appropriate college and to do well when we get there, we must seek wisdom and virtue). Failure to recognize this principle in every area of education and life leads to a disordered soul and a school that cannot succeed in what it values most highly. To nurture rightly-ordered souls requires the cultivation of the moral imagination.

The knowledge, insights, or experiences we are given lay on each of us the duty of stewardship. “To whom much is given, much will be required.” What we do with what we are given is the principle of our accountability.

Mission and Philosophy

Saint Therese Carmelite School was founded in 1926 and has traditionally served students in Kindergarten through Eighth Grade. Deeply rooted in Carmelite spirituality, Saint Therese Carmelite School, united with our parents who are the primary educators of their children, seeks to form students in faith, academics, and virtue through a Classical education.

Saint Therese Carmelite School is first and foremost a Catholic school. We cultivate Catholic values and spiritual formation of the school community through daily prayer, weekly school Masses, recitation of the Rosary, praying the Stations of the Cross, May Crowning, and the Sacraments. Carmelite spirituality is fostered through the teaching and example of the Carmelite friars and sisters. Every classroom has a Carmelite patron saint. We entrust our school to our Loving Savior, His Blessed Mother, our patroness Saint Therese of Lisieux, and all the Carmelite saints. By teaching our students to imitate the virtues and lives of the saints, we aim to form students who fulfill their destiny of becoming saints.



Saint Therese Carmelite School educates students through the Catholic classical model of education to equip our students with the logic, critical thinking, and language skills necessary to succeed throughout their lives. We seek to give students the necessary tools of learning and to foster a deep sense of wonder and love for all that is genuinely true, good, and beautiful. We emphasize classical learning, not only because we want our students to read well, speak well, and think well, but ultimately because truth, beauty, and goodness are desirable in themselves and for their own sakes.

We seek to incorporate within our students the wisdom of two thousand years of Catholic thought, history, culture, and the arts so that they might understand themselves and their world in the light of that Truth, and acquire the character to live happy and integrated lives in the service of God and others.

SCHOOL HISTORY

In February 1926, the pastor of St. Therese Church, Fr. Malachy Cranfield, OCD, was authorized to have a church-school combination building erected, and an architect, Ross Montgomery, was hired. The groundbreaking took place on June 1, 1926, and the building was completed in time for the first school year to begin in September. The school portion of the building was on the ground floor, and the church on the upper level. In its first year, beginning September 1926, the school enrollment was fifty-three children. By 1927, because many more people had relocated to Alhambra to take advantage of the new school, the enrollment had grown to 185, with two grades per class.



The Dominican Sisters were hired to staff the school and were here until 1930, at which time the Archbishop moved them to a school in Anaheim. It was the responsibility of Fr. Gerard Houlihan, the pastor appointee in December of 1927, to find a new order of Sisters. After an extensive search, the Sisters of St. Mary of the Woods in Indiana (Sisters of Providence) consented to staff the school. In 1960, because of increased school enrollment, Fr. Gerald Winters, the new Pastor that year, oversaw the demolition of the old school and hall and the construction of the present school classrooms and Parish Hall, which were completed in 1963 (the hall is now officially known as the Fr. Gerald Winters' Auditorium).

Gradually through the 1970's, the Sisters of Providence left and were replaced with lay teachers. By the mid-1980's, the school was solely staffed by lay persons. The first lay principal, Paul McLaughlin, was hired in the mid-1980's. Following him were Grace Walker (August 1993 – January 2000), Michael Cantu (August 2000 – June 2004), Christopher Heygood (August 2004 – June 2005), Christina Buckowski (August 2005 – June 2010), Carmela Lovano
