Blessed Epiphanytide, everyone!

How can you tell that someone *really* loves you? By how often they say, "I love you!"? Well, how about this for a way to get a real sense of how much someone loves you: See how much of his or her FREE TIME that person gives you, when he or she could be doing something else. That's how the first disciples in today's Gospel begin to realize how much this new Person in the neighborhood loves them and cares about them, resulting in their entering into a deep, loving friendship with Him. They ask Him, "Where do you stay/abide/remain/hang out?" So He says, "Come and see!" "And they saw where He

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stayed and they stayed with Him that day." All three times, it is the same word in the original Greek! So what did they all actually DO together??? It doesn't matter! What matters is that they spent TIME together, that they hung out together!

Let us also spend extra time this week with Jesus, with the Father, with the Holy Spirit, as well as with our most cherished family members and friends—especially after we receive Him in Holy Communion (spiritual or sacramental Communion).

Quiet Listening Prayer Formation



They say that the soul enters within itself and, at other times, that it rises above itself (2). With such terminology, I wouldn't know how to clarify anything. This is what's wrong with me: that I think you will understand by my way of explaining, while perhaps I'm the only one who will actually understand myself.

I have arready mentioned that these powers are the people of this castle (3), which is the image I have taken for my explanation—have gone outside and have walked for days and years with strangers—enemies of the well-being of the castle. Having seen their perdition, they've already begun to approach the castle even though they may not manage to remain inside because the habit of doing so is difficult to acquire.

But still they are not traitors and they walk in the environs of the castle. Once the great King, who is in the center dwelling place of this castle, sees their good will, He desires in His wonderful mercy to bring them back to Him. Like a good shepherd, with a whistle so gentle that even they themselves almost fail to hear it, He makes them recognize His voice and stops them from going so far astray, so that they will return to their dwelling place.

> And this shepherd's whistle has such power that they abandon the exterior things in which they were estranged from Him and enter the castle (St. Teresa, *Interior Castle*, Mansion IV, Chapter 3, No. 2)

God's voice is always with us, awake or asleep. It swirls around us like fog on a waterfront, enveloping us, gently urging us to wake up, to listen. Awareness of the voice comes first; then willingness to listen; then, in time, the decision to act, to live according to God's word. The stories in today's readings about God's call to Samuel and Jesus' call to the first disciples help us begin to understand the nature of God's call. It is not a work order from a distant God to carry out a specific task, but an invitation to participate in what God is already doing. The journey begins with God's intentions and activity. After the initial moment of the call, God is shown to be actively leading these ordinary people to partner in His work. For ourselves, we might not experience a single or dramatic moment of call. God's call can take many forms.

In today's first reading (1 Samuel 3:3–10, 19), God keeps calling out in the night to a sleeping boy. Twice, the boy Samuel hears the call of

your account.

God but goes to Eli and says, "Here I am". Neither the boy, Samuel, nor his teacher, Eli, understands who is calling. But God's persistence convinces them. At last Eli recognizes that it is God who is calling Samuel. When Samuel hears God a third time, Samuel does not say "Here I am," but "Speak, Lord, for your servant is listening." Samuel is then ready—not ready yet to do anything, but ready to listen. We can see a subtle shift as Samuel moves away from announcing his intention to serve and more clearly opens himself to God's voice. Samuel allows God to take the initiative, and attends first to God's intentions rather than his own.

Samuel's story helps us to remember that accepting God's call is not only about a new chapter in our personal story. Our acceptance is, more profoundly, a new moment in God's story. Even in our smallest "ves," God celebrates our partnership in God's great work. Through our openness and acceptance, God has new opportunities to bring all of us into loving unity with Him.

In the Gospel (John 1:35-42), Jesus is out teaching. Various people notice Him and begin to gather around. They soon become disciples and, like the young Samuel, are ready—not ready yet to do anything, but ready to listen. "Speak," they say, "we are listening." Jesus' first spoken words in the Gospel of John are: "What are you looking for?" This penetrating question reverberates throughout John's Gospel. The disciples who form Jesus' first community, and many others who meet Jesus

during His life, are drawn to Him, seeking something they can't quite name. As Jesus called and formed His community of disciples, He probed their hearts and allowed them to probe His heart. They shared their deepest needs, hopes, and commitments.

Jesus' words are also directed to us, here and now. Like Samuel and Jesus' disciples, we are invited into a relationship of trust and friendship with God. We are also invited to employ the gifts God has given us, always in dialogue with our God, in our daily lives. We learn to share our dreams and also to open our hearts to know God's dreams. In time, with lots of practice, with many successes and failures, we learn to trust God to shape and to fulfill our deepest desires. Sometimes we struggle to name what we really want.



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Just before our first reading it says that "the word of the Lord was rare; there were not many visions" (1 Samuel 3:1). I imagine most people today would think that was true. Haven't you ever wished you lived in biblical times, to see some of the miracles you read about? Wouldn't it be cool to hear the Lord speaking to you in a vision? Do you think God has stopped talking? People apparently felt that way in Samuel's time, too.

Let's look again at the first reading to see what Samuel's experience can teach us. It is not unusual for people to miss a sign from God. If you have a talent that you are proud of, perhaps it is a sign that God wants you to use that talent to help others. Or if a friend tells you she is concerned about your health, it could be God's way of telling you to get help. Try to see God speaking in whatever happens to you and you may hear a lot more than you think. Just as Eli began to recognize that God was speaking to Samuel, sometimes we too need help to discern what the Lord is telling us. A good spiritual director can lead you to understand what God is saying to you—just like Eli helped Samuel to listen to God. (Warning: Be prepared for any spiritual director to ask how often you pray!) Try spending more time in prayer with Him to know what He wants of you. Don't be like the man who complains he never knows what his wife wants from him. When asked what she tells him, he says, "I don't know; we never talk."

I bet we have all had times where we didn't know if we are doing God's will because we didn't take time to pray. But don't do all the talking! Give God some quiet time to hear His response. For God hasn't stopped talking; we just stopped listening. Today, ask God for the ability to keep your ears open so you don't miss His voice and His message!

east of Faith The Greeting: At several points during the liturgy, the presider greets us with the "The words. Lord be with vou." These simple words are not like the



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greetings that we exchange all day long—our "good mornings," our "hellos" and "how are yous." This liturgical greeting has roots deep in the Old Testament. In the book of Ruth, the words "the Lord be with you" are spoken by Boaz to the harvesters who are laboring in his fields (2:4); in the book of Judges, an angel speaks similar words to Gideon (6:12), where they are words of promise: for soon Gideon will lead his oppressed people to victory and freedom.

For us, the words become a greeting of peace, a prayer that the Lord will indeed be with us, and a reminder of His promise to be with us always, to the end of the world (Matthew 28:20). Our response—"And with your spirit" returns to the presider this prayer for the Lord's presence. As we know from the Scriptures, a prayer for the Lord's presence is no small thing, for when God comes in our midst, God brings healing, grace, and challenge. God's presence transforms us.
