Page Two THIRD SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME - SUNDAY OF THE WORD OF THE LORD January 24, 2021



Greetings, everyone! The annual Church Unity Octave began on January 18 and goes until January 25, the Feast of the Conversion of St Paul. As we all struggle for greater personal, family, Church, and societal unity in the face of all sorts of temptations to greater disunity, let us pray extra hard this week for that "unity which has the Spirit as its origin and peace as its binding force" (Ephesians 4:3).

Today, the Third Sunday of Ordinary Time, is also the Sunday that Pope Francis established as **"The Word of God" Sunday**. One way of honoring the Word of God more could be to **find a special place in the home where we could put a Bible and keep it open**, so that anyone passing by might be able to read a few words from God and be refreshed and guided. Here is an article about the "Sunday of the Word of God":

POPE FRANCIS' APOSTOLIC LETTER By Vatican News

The timing of Pope Francis' Apostolic Letter, motu proprio, "Aperuit Illis," published on September 30, 2020, is significant: September 30 is the Feast of St. Jerome, the man who translated most of the Bible into Latin, and who famously said: "Ignorance of Scripture is ignorance of Christ". This year also marks 1,600 years since his death. The title of the document, "Aperuit illis," is equally important. They are its opening words and are taken from St Luke's Gospel, where the Evangelist describes how the Risen Jesus appeared to His disciples, and how "He opened their minds to understand the Scriptures".

Recalling the importance given by the Second Vatican Council to rediscovering Sacred Scripture for the life of the Church, Pope Francis says he wrote this Letter in response to requests from the faithful around the world to celebrate the **"Sunday of the Word of God."** In the motu proprio (literally, "of his own initiative"), Pope Francis declares that **"the Third Sunday in Ordinary Time is to be devoted to the celebration, study, and dissemination of the Word of God."** This is more than a temporal coincidence, he explains: The celebration has "ecumenical value, since the Scriptures point out, for those who listen, the path to authentic and firm unity."

Pope Francis invites us to find ways to "mark this Sunday with a certain solemnity". He suggest that the sacred text be enthroned "in order to focus the attention of the assembly on the normative value of God's Word". In highlighting the proclamation of the Word of the Lord, it would be appropriate "to emphasize in the homily the honor that it is due. The Bible is not meant for a privileged few; it belongs to those called to hear its message and to recognize themselves in its words. The Bible cannot be monopolized or restricted to select groups either, because it is the book of the Lord's people, who, in listening to it, move from dispersion and division towards unity".

He writes that "the homily possesses a quasi-sacramental character" and warns against improvising or giving "long, pedantic homilies or wandering off into unrelated topics." Rather, he suggests using simple and suitable language. For many of the faithful, he writes, "this is the only opportunity they have to grasp the beauty of God's Word and to see it applied to their daily lives". The Pope uses the scene of the Risen Lord appearing to the disciples at Emmaus to demonstrate what he calls "the unbreakable bond between Sacred Scripture and the Eucharist". Since the Scriptures everywhere speak of Christ, he writes, "they enable us to believe that His death and resurrection are not myth but history, and are central to the faith of His disciples". When the sacraments are introduced and illumined by God's Word, explains the Pope, "they become ever more clearly the goal of a process whereby Christ opens our minds and hearts to acknowledge His saving work".

"The role of the Holy Spirit in the Scriptures is primordial," writes Pope Francis. "Without the work of the Spirit, there would always be a risk of remaining limited to the written text alone. This would open the way to a fundamentalist reading, which needs to be avoided, lest we betray the inspired, dynamic and spiritual character of the sacred text." It is the Holy Spirit who "makes Sacred Scripture the living word of God, experienced and handed down in the faith of His holy people." Pope Francis invites us not to take God's Word for granted, but instead to "let ourselves be nourished by it, in order to acknowledge and live fully our relationship with Him and with our brothers and sisters".

The Pope concludes his Apostolic Letter by defining what he describes as "the great challenge before us in life: to listen to Sacred Scripture and then to practice mercy. God's Word has the power to open our eyes and to enable us to renounce a stifling and barren individualism and instead to embark on a new path of sharing and solidarity". The Letter closes with a reference to Our Lady, who accompanies us "on the journey of welcoming the Word of God, teaching us the joy of those who listen to that Word—and who keep it."

It is truly right and just that we should give you thanks and praise, O

Hatred can be overcome only by love. God, almighty Father, for all you do in this world, through our Lord Jesus Christ. For though the human

race is divided by dissension and discord, yet, we know that by testing us, you change our hearts to prepare them for reconciliation. Even more, by your Spirit you move human hearts that enemies may speak to each other again, adversaries may join hands, and peoples seek to meet together. By the working of your power, it comes about, O Lord, that hatred is overcome by love, revenge gives way to forgiveness, and discord is changed to mutual respect. Therefore, as we give you ceaseless thanks with the Choirs of Heaven, we cry out to your majesty on earth, and without end we acclaim: Holy, Holy, Holy, Lord....

liet Listening

This meditation deals with dryness in prayer and with what, in St Teresa's opinion, might take place at this stage, how it is necessary to test ourselves, and with the fact that the Lord tries those who are in these dwelling places.

1. I have known some souls and even many—I believe I can say—who have reached this state and have lived many years in this upright and well-ordered way, both in body and soul, insofar as can be known. After these years, when it seems they have become lords of the world, at least clearly disillusioned in its regard, His Majesty will try them in some minor matters, and they will go about so disturbed and afflicted that it puzzles me and even makes me fearful. It's useless to give them advice, for since they have engaged so long in the practice of virtue they think they can teach others and that they are more than justified in feeling disturbed.



2. In sum, I have found neither a way of consoling nor a cure for such persons other than to show them compassion in their affliction—and, indeed, compassion is felt on seeing them subject to so much misery-and not contradict their reasoning. For everything in their minds leads them to think they are suffering these things for God, and so, they don't come to realize that their disturbance is an imperfection... What it seems to me would be highly beneficial for those who through the goodness of the Lord are in this state (for, as I have said, He grants them no small mercy because they are very close to ascending higher) is that they study diligently how to be prompt in obedience.

"A NEW DAY HAS DAWNED"



Today we hear how Jonah (Jonah 3:1-5, 10), sent by God to warn the people, storms through the streets of Nineveh, scaring the citizens out of their wits. And it works! God has a change of heart, seeing "by their actions" how the people turn from evil. **A new day has dawned!** When the whole city repented the very first day, they showed it by wearing sackcloth and fasting from food. Sometimes we might think that way: That repenting means only punishing ourselves or feeling sorry. Jesus sees things differently. He preached a repentance that meant changing one's heart, a new way of looking at things, a new way of acting. (Note: Consider reading the whole book of Jonah, just 48 verses, together with a good commentary. The book is read at Jewish services at Yom Kippur as a profound reflection about God and about all of us.)

Next we hear Paul telling the Corinthians, "The world in its present form is passing away" (1 Corinthians 7:29-31). He calls for the needed change of heart. Stopping short of telling them to

stop carrying out their everyday activities, he urges them to live "as though" they aren't doing the things they are doing. A new day has dawned.

Finally, Jesus stands on the shore and cries, "The kingdom of God is at hand!" (Mark 1:14). As fishermen, Simon and Andrew would have considered their family, their partners, and their boat as the most important things in their lives. Yet the disciples don't even hesitate when called by Jesus. They leave behind their boats, their nets—even their own father!—to follow Jesus. They don't worry about what they will do or look back at what they are leaving behind. Now they are fishers of men. **A new day had dawned!** Everyone has to change when a new day dawns: the Ninevites, the Corinthians, even the apostles! Didn't a new day dawn today for us as well? In the Gospel today, we see an example. The first people He calls to be disciples were fisherman. The apostles' "repentance" was also more than just giving up sins. They were beginning a new life and a new way of looking at the world.

The rest of Mark's Gospel—all of Jesus' preaching and healing, His death and resurrection—describes the inauguration of this kingdom of God. For Mark, the life of Jesus is the center point of history, where everything leads up to Jesus, and everything follows from Jesus. Because compared to Jesus and the life He offers, everything else is secondary.

The Penitential Rite

Standing together in the presence of the Lord, we acknowledge our weakness, our sins and faults, our and failings. But the penitential rite is really less about our sins than it is about God's

mercy. It is not a time for individual confession, like a mini-sacrament of reconciliation. It is, rather, a preparatory rite, preparing us to praise the mercy of Christ as we acknowledge our own weakness.

When Simon Peter witnesses the miraculous catch of fish-when he realizes who is in the boat with him—he falls at Jesus' feet with the words, "Depart from me, Lord, for I am a sinful man" (Luke 5:8). We are like Peter. The more aware of the Lord's presence we become, the more awareness we also have of our sinfulness, our weakness.

The penitential rite of the Mass takes several forms, from the traditional Confiteor or "I confess" to a litany, spoken or sung by the deacon or cantor with responses by the entire assembly. The penitential rite always includes the words Kyrie, eleison; Christe, eleison-Lord, have mercy; Christ, have mercy. This ancient Greek prayer came to the Roman liturgy from the East, and still echoes in many of the litanies of the Eastern Rite Churches. These words turn our gaze from our own weakness to the gentleness, the kindness, the forgiving love of Christ.
