Dear Fellow Parishioners and Fellow School Parents,

It has been a true joy and blessing to have our children attend Saint Therese Carmelite School for almost four years now. Prior to attending STCS, we spent seven years as a homeschooling family. When we finally chose to enroll our children in a school, it was a difficult decision, one that we did not make lightly.

You see, my husband and I came from very different educational backgrounds that made the choice all the more difficult. I had attended public school from Grades K-12 and then went on to become a teacher within the public school system. Not only was I disappointed in my own educational experiences, but my time as a teacher in the public schools was disappointing in an entirely different way. It seemed that the public schools endured endless changes in curriculum and were always at the mercy of current government trends. Just as quickly as a curriculum was adopted, it was cast aside in the next great attempt to improve State test scores. It was very frustrating to endure these changes as a teacher, and even more so for my students. With that in mind,

my husband and I decided that our children would not be following in my educational footsteps.

It would seem that our choice was now evident. If we decided not to go public, then Catholic school would surely be the answer. If only it were that easy! My husband had attended Catholic schools for his K-12 education, so we decided to analyze his experiences to gain some insight. He was fortunate to attend wonderful Catholic schools with a strong academic focus. His Catholic high school is even considered one of the most academically-rigorous high schools in the area. Many would describe his educational experience as "top notch". However, we noticed an unfortunate trend within the Catholic school community. Class reunion upon class reunion, we came to discover that few, if any, of his classmates had remained practicing Catholics. Worse yet, many became outspoken adversaries of the Faith. Having come from the public school system myself, I was genuinely baffled. I wondered why we would send our children to Catholic schools when so many of the students attending these schools were not remaining Catholic? Isn't that the entire point of it all? As we researched the faith formation of local Catholic schools, we became more and more frustrated and concerned.

Fortunately, our frustrations dissipated and our prayers were answered at an Open House for Saint Therese Carmelite School. Having been parishioners, we were aware that they had a school, but we were also concerned with our findings about the Catholic school community. We needed to know what made STCS different from these other Catholic schools. Well, one Open House and four years later, we can tell you! My husband and I call it **"The 3 Cs,"** and they are as follows:

CATHOLICISM

There is a reason that this is the first "C". Catholicism is genuinely a priority at STCS. The faith formation is truly impressive, and every aspect of the School is rooted in Carmelite spirituality. Speaking of the Carmelites, we have the Carmelite friars regularly on campus, with Bro. Jason serving as a teacher for the 7th Grade. The Carmelites are everpresent for School activities, assemblies, field trips, sports, and more. They can be seen praying over children, playing basketball with them, instructing them in painting religious works of art, teaching them how to make rosaries, offering them spiritual guidance, or hearing frequent confessions. The School is also closely located to the Carmelite Sisters and Cloistered Nuns as well. On occasion, they will pay a visit to our STCS students or the students get to take a walk to the monastery to pay a visit to them. It is a great blessing to have our children surrounded by religious life. The School and its community genuinely exude the Faith, and Catholicism is undoubtedly more than just a title at STCS.

The next "C" addresses our concerns over curriculum. As Fr. Philip puts it, "Classical never goes out of style." At STCS, there are no curricular trends to keep up with. The students are reading classical, timeless pieces of literature that have been used to educate generations. The curriculum encompasses all that is good, true, and beautiful in our world and gives due credit to our Creator. The students spend time committing intricate poems and significant speeches to memory, as well as dressing the part and acting out classic scenes from works by Shakespeare and Sophocles. The curriculum is not something they merely "DO;" it becomes so much a part of who they ARE as developing Catholic youth.

COMMUNITY

Last but not least, the final "C," is for community. This last "C" is not to be underestimated. Leaving our homeschool community was incredibly challenging, and we genuinely thought that the community at a brick and mortar school would be more difficult to cultivate. We were wrong—wildly wrong! We were welcomed to STCS from the start and felt an instant sense of safety and care for our children. Parents regularly reach out to one another to offer help with transportation, School events, faith formation, youth group, sporting events, and so on. Our children have formed friendships of great value and, as parents, we have done the same. Above all, it is a community rooted in faith and we are confident that each of us is here to grow in virtue and lift each other up in our goal towards sainthood. It is sincerely a privilege to be a part of the STCS community.

In closing, we pray that others will have the opportunity to experience what we have here at STCS. We genuinely believe that Saint Therese Carmelite School is a gift to all who choose to experience it, and we would like to express our sincerest gratitude to those who continue to contribute to our School and recognize the need for families to have access to a truly Catholic, classical education. Thank you!

Classical Education

A Classical Education enables students to develop, form, and strengthen their minds. The end of this educational process is wisdom. Man desires by nature to know, and that means we want to have not only the facts, but also the reasons for the facts. We want to think about the most noble and interesting things. Therefore, the goal of education is to teach children how to think—to help them "learn the art of learning." If children learn how to learn, they will be able to master *any* subject. In large measure, the role of the teacher of both Grade School and High School children is this: teaching the students to think.

Saint Therese Carmelite School is faithful to the doctrine and teaching of the Catholic Church, which enlightens and informs all the areas of the curriculum. It is not the number of facts children are acquainted with that measures their educational success, but it is instead what they are able to do with those facts, such as make distinctions, follow an argument, make reasonable deductions from the facts and, finally, to have the right judgment about the way things are.

The ultimate end of Classical Education is to enable the students to better know and glorify God. Classical education teachers ask God to use their teaching, dispositions, and actions as instruments in His hand to cultivate the students' souls toward holiness. In this sense, learning is a means of grace.



To fulfill a good of a lower order, one must proceed to the good of the next highest order (e.g., to fulfill the good of finishing homework, the student must proceed to the slightly higher good of trying to get a good grade; to rightly gain food and shelter, we must seek first the Kingdom of God and His righteousness; to get into the most appropriate college and to do well when we get there, we must seek wisdom and virtue). Failure to recognize this principle in every area of education and life leads to a disordered soul and a school that cannot succeed in what it values most highly. To nurture rightlyordered souls requires the cultivation of the moral imagination.

The knowledge, insights, or experiences we are given lay on each of us the duty of stewardship. "To whom much is given, much will be required." What we do with what we are given is the principle of our accountability. MEET OUR STAFF!

She graduated Magna Cum Laude from Loyola Marymount in Los Angeles with a Bachelor of Arts in Psychology. She is certified in both Levels 1 and 2 for Catechesis of the Good Shepherd. She is the TK/K Homeroom teacher and teaches Religion to First and Second Grades. She enjoys reading and board games.

Her expertise in Early Child Education from the Franciscan University of Steubenville is a great asset to our young scholars.
