PASTOR'S MESSAGE

Christ is risen! He is risen indeed!!!

A most Blessed Easter Sunday and Octave of Easter, everyone!!!

Here is St. John Chrysostom capturing the flavor of this most Holy of days:




Whoever you are, come, celebrate this shining happening, this festival of light. You, the devout, God's unshakable lover, and you the servant brimming with thanks. Come, walk into the joy of your Lord.

And you, the impoverished faster, come for your wages. You, who began before sunrise, come for your stipend. You who waited till nine in the morning: the feast is for you. And you, the not-till-noonday starter, do not hesitate; you shall not lose a thing. You, who began at only three in the afternoon, have no scruples, come! And you, who arrived just before sunset, forget you were late.

Do not be bashful. Our Master is magnanimous and welcomes the very latest with the first. He will not entertain you less, you of the eleventh hour, than you the dawn toiler. To this one He gives, and on that one He showers rewards. Whether you were a success or whether you only tried, He will greet you, make much of your effort, and extol your intention.

Let everybody, therefore, crowd into the exhilaration of our Savior. You the first and you the last: equally heaped with blessings. You, the rich, and you, the poor: celebrate together. You, the careful, and you, the careless: enjoy this day of days. You, who have kept the fast, and you, who have broken it: be happy today! The table is loaded. Feast on it like princes. Let no one go hungry.

And drink, all of you: drink the Cup. The vintage is faith. Feed sumptuously all: feed on His goodness, His sheer abundance. No one need think he is poor, for the universal empire is emblazoned, wide open for all.

No one need mourn uncountable falls, be they over and over. For forgiveness itself has reared from the tomb. No one need fear death; for our Savior Himself has died and set us free. He confronted death in His own person, and blasted it to nothing. He made it defunct by the very taste of His flesh.

This is exactly what Isaiah foretold when he declared: "Hell is harrowed by encounter with Him." Of course, it is harrowed, for now Hell is a joke, finished, done with. Harrowed because, now taken prisoner. It snatched at a body and—incredibly—lit upon God. It gulped down the earth, and gagged on Heaven. It seized what it saw, and was crushed by what it failed to see.

Poor death, where is your sting? Poor Hell, where is your triumph? Christ steps out of the tomb and you are reduced to nothing. Christ rises and the angels are wild with delight. Christ rises and life is set free. Christ rises and the graves are emptied of dead. Oh, yes, for He broke from the tomb like a flower, a beautiful fruit: the first fruit of those already gone. All glory be His, all success and power...for ever and ever!

My prayer is that each and every one of you will receive from the Risen Lord Jesus what He wants to give you: an experience of Him alive and delighting in you today—especially after you receive what looks like a piece of Bread, but what is really the Risen Lord Jesus Himself!!! And tomorrow is Bright Monday which, according to Eastern Church tradition, is a day for playing a healthy joke on someone (like waiting for the pastor/priest after Mass and throwing a cup/bucket of water on him to get him to shriek with surprise and joy), in honor of Jesus playing the best joke ever—on the devil!—by rising from the dead!!! Let us all just ask Jesus to inspire each of us about an appropriate bit of joyful surprise for a loved one.

Just a quick note on the Gospel today: Why does St. John write that the beloved disciple looked into the tomb and saw and believed? What did he see? Well, it says just before that verse that Simon Peter saw the burial cloths and the cloth covering Jesus' face lying apart by itself, drawing attention to itself. So when in doubt, check out the rest of Scripture and see if the same or a similar word is being used and in what context. If we go to Isaiah (25:7-8), we also hear about a face covering (used to cover the face of a deceased person): "*The Lord God will destroy on this mountain the covering that is cast over all peoples, the veil that is spread over all nations. He will swallow up death for ever.*" So the beloved disciple, with the help of the Old Testament, sees Scripture fulfilled, because the face cloth of Jesus has been removed and, unlike with Lazarus, Jesus' face cloth will never cover His face again, because He will never die again!

DIVINE MERCY SUNDAY

Next Sunday, April 24, is Divine Mercy Sunday. To mark this feast, we will have a special celebration at St. Therese as follows:

3:00—4:00 p.m.: Exposition of the Blessed Sacrament/Holy Hour/Chaplet of Divine Mercy

3:00—5:00 p.m.: Confessions

4:45 p.m.: Benediction **Eternal Father, I offer you the Body and Blood, Soul and Divinity, of your dearly Beloved Son, Our Lord Jesus Christ,**

5:00 p.m.: Holy Mass **in atonement for our sins and those of the whole world.**



HISTORY OF THIS DEVOTION: Beginning in February of 1931, St. Faustina Kowalski, a Polish nun, reported receiving visitations from Jesus. One of the things He asked her for was that a painting be made of the vision of His Merciful Heart and that a Feast of Divine Mercy be established on the first Sunday after Easter. She also related that Jesus told her, "I am offering people a vessel with which they are to keep coming for graces to the Fountain of Mercy. That vessel is this image with the signature: 'Jesus, I trust in You.'" When St. Pope John Paul canonized her in 2000, he proclaimed that the Second Sunday of Easter would be known from then on as "Divine Mercy Sunday."

PLENARY INDULGENCE: Our Lord promised St. Faustina that all those would attend Mass and receive Holy Communion on Divine Mercy Sunday, as well as go to Confession and pray for the intentions of the Holy Father, would obtain a plenary indulgence, meaning "complete forgiveness of their sins and punishment." Alternatively, the promise extends to those who, in the presence of the Blessed Sacrament, recite the Our Father and the Creed, adding a devout prayer to the merciful Lord Jesus (e.g. "Merciful Jesus, I trust in you!"), go to Confession, and pray for the intentions of the Holy Father.

In 2002, St. John Paul extended the promise so that Confession can be made up to 20 days before or after Divine Mercy Sunday.



THE OUTPOURING OF THE HOLY SPIRIT



It was not accidental that only two years after Vatican Council II (in 1967), the outpouring of the Spirit that had spread among Protestants came into the Catholic Church. It began at a retreat held for a group of college students from Duquesne University in Pittsburgh. The two faculty moderators of this group had been experiencing a hunger for more of the Holy Spirit. A few weeks before the retreat, they decided to seek out charismatic Christians—a very unusual step for Catholics at that time. They heard about an interdenominational charismatic prayer group nearby and decided to go. The leader of this group, a housewife, named Flo Dodge, sensed the significance of Catholics coming to receive the Holy Spirit and felt that no one in her prayer group should lay hands on the two Catholics, so that none of them could take credit for the baptism in the Holy Spirit coming into the Catholic Church. The group prayed for the two faculty members, and they were baptized

in the Holy Spirit. The faculty moderators did not tell the Duquesne students what had happened to them at the prayer group, but in preparation for the retreat, which would take place a few weeks later, they asked them to read chapters 1 through 4 of Acts and a book by David Wilkerson, *The Cross and the Switchblade*.

On the retreat weekend, the students sang the same ancient hymn Pope Leo XIII had sung to open the 20th Century, *Veni Creator Spiritus*. They prayed for God to deepen the grace of their confirmation. At one point the plumbing at the retreat center broke down, and the students were told they might have to go home. So, they prayed fervently for God to send water—and He answered their prayer in more ways than one! The plumbing was fixed, and when one student, David Mangan, went into the little Eucharistic chapel to give thanks, he was immediately overwhelmed by the presence of God. He found himself flat on his face, prostrate before the Lord, completely immersed in God's love, praising Him in an unknown language. One by one, other students came into the chapel and—in a similar way—were flooded with the glory of God. Almost immediately, they began to praise God in tongues—some without even knowing what this gift was—and to manifest other gifts of the Spirit.

Today, an estimated 150 million Catholics have experienced the baptism in the Holy Spirit. For many, it has awakened them from spiritual complacency into a life of passionate love of Christ. For others, it has catapulted them into mission, including healing and deliverance ministries, service to the poor, and lay leadership in the Catholic Church. How does the baptism in the Holy Spirit relate to the sacraments of baptism and confirmation? For Catholics, this is an especially important question since the Catholic Church teaches that we receive the Holy Spirit in baptism, and again in a fuller way at confirmation. Is it possible to receive more of the Spirit?

Feasting on Kindness and Worthiness

PAUSE TO HEAR GOD SPEAK:

"We are the Easter people
and hallelujah is our song."

-St. John Paul II

"I, then, a prisoner for the Lord,
urge you to live in a manner worthy
of the call you have received,
with all humility and gentleness,
with patience, bearing with
one another through love."

-Ephesians 4:1-2

Today, I choose to feast on kindness and worthiness. Kindness is the virtue that replaces envy, and worthiness heals the wound of shame. We come to kindness by knowing who we are in God's eyes, rather than through our own eyes or the eyes of others. The incredible story of Jesus' encounter with the Samaritan woman at the well (John 4:5-42) is one filled with the woman's shame, guilt, and condemnation by others. She has been married five times and is currently living with a man outside of marriage. Because of her shame, she avoids the well in the morning when others might be there. On this particular day, Jesus meets her there. With amazing kindness and mercy, He frees her from her shame. After her encounter, she goes into the streets to preach about Jesus to anyone who will listen. She has been found to be worthy by Jesus—and that is everything!

The next time you go to Mass, get there a little early. Settle into your seat and offer your week to God. In your mind, place it on the altar and prepare your heart for the gifts of the liturgy. As you pray for the Lord's mercy during the Penitential Act, allow your heart to release envy and shame.

Embrace the good news (Gospel) of kindness and worthiness that is available to you and celebrate your restoration and healing in the Eucharist. Remember that Lent is the preparation for resurrection, for freedom, for joy.

Take time to ask yourself...

- What does it mean for me to be worthy in God's eyes?
- How has God shown His kindness in my life?



Pray slowly... Heavenly Father, in the name of our Lord Jesus Christ, and by the power of the Holy Spirit, I accept the gifts of kindness and worthiness in my life. I accept my identity as the beloved child of a gracious Father God. I thank you for my life's purpose and the strength to fulfill it. I accept your healing grace. Amen.


Quiet Listening Prayer

FROM THE LIVING FLAME OF LOVE

By St. John of the Cross

"If we don't want to be fools and blind the intellect, there's no reason for doubt.

Receiving Communion is not like picturing with the imagination, as when we reflect upon the Lord on the cross or in other episodes of the Passion, when we picture within ourselves how things happened to Him in the past.



In Communion the event is happening now, and it is entirely true. There's no reason to go looking for Him in some other place far away. Since we know that Jesus is with us as long as the natural heat doesn't consume the accidents of bread, we should lovingly approach Him. If, when He went about in the world, the mere touch of His robes cured the sick, then why doubt—if we have faith—that miracles will be worked while He is within us and that He will give what we ask of Him, since He is in our house? His Majesty is not accustomed to paying poorly for His lodging if the hospitality is good."
