

CATECHESIS Q & A: DEEPENING OUR KNOWLEDGE

WHAT DOES THE CHURCH TEACH ABOUT SATAN AND HIS DEMONS?

Scripture tells us that angels and demons (especially Satan) are spiritual creatures gifted with intelligence, will, freedom, and initiative. Those modern theologians who identify Satan as an abstract idea of evil are completely mistaken. Theirs is true heresy; that is, it is openly in contrast with the Bible, the Church Fathers, and the Magisterium of the Church. The truth about Satan was never doubted in the past; therefore, the only dogmatic definition in this respect is this statement from the Fourth Lateran Council: ***"The Devil [that is, Satan] and the other demons were created good by God; but they became evil through their own fault."*** Whoever denies the existence of Satan also denies sin and no longer understands the actions of Christ. Scripture talks to us about the Kingdom of God but also of the kingdom of Satan. It is impossible to understand the salvific action of Christ if we ignore the destructive action of Satan.

Lucifer (Satan) was the most perfect being created by the hands of God before creating the world. His God-given authority and superiority over the other angels was recognized by all, so he thought that he had the same authority over creation as God. Satan tried to understand all of creation but could not, because creation was oriented toward Christ. Until Christ came into the world, God's plan could not be revealed in its entirety. Hence Satan's rebellion. He wanted to

continue to be the absolute first, the center of creation, even if it meant opposing God's design. This is why Satan continually tries to dominate the world. Beginning with our forefathers, he seeks to enslave men by making them obey himself and disobey God. He was successful with Adam and Eve, and he hoped to continue with all people, with the help of the other rebelling angels (now demons). Even though Satan and his angels broke with God, He allowed them to maintain their power and rank (thrones, dominions, principalities, powers, etc.) even if they use them for evil purposes. St. Augustine did not exaggerate when he wrote that, if God gave Satan a free hand, "no man would be left alive." Since Satan cannot kill us, he tries to "make us into his followers in opposition to God."

The truth of salvation is this: Jesus came "to destroy the works of the Devil" (I Jn 3:8), to free man from Satan's slavery, and to establish the kingdom of God after destroying the reign of Satan. However, between the Birth of Christ and the Second Coming of Christ, the Devil tries to entice as many people as possible to his side. Therefore, Paul tells us that "we are not contending against flesh and blood, but against the principalities, against the powers, against the world rulers of this present darkness, against the spiritual hosts of wickedness in the heavenly places" (Eph 6:12).

Let us be clear about this: Jesus defeated Satan through His sacrifice. However, Jesus also defeated Satan before His death, through His teachings: "If it is by the finger of God that I cast out demons, then the kingdom of God has come upon you" (Lk 11:20). Jesus first gave the power to cast out demons to His apostles; then He extended the power to the seventy-two disciples, and in the end He granted it to all those who would believe in Him. **How can those who deny the existence and the many activities of Satan understand the achievements of Christ? How can they understand the value of the redemptive death of Christ?** On the basis of Sacred Scripture, the Second Vatican Council affirms that "Christ, by His death and resurrection, has freed us from the power of Satan".

During a May 24, 1987, visit to the Sanctuary of Saint Michael the Archangel, John Paul II said, *"The battle against the Devil, which is the principal task of St. Michael the Archangel, is still being fought today, because the Devil is still alive and active in the world. The evil that surrounds us today, the disorders that plague our society, are not only the results of original sin, but also the result of Satan's pervasive and dark actions."* Revelation tells us that demons were hurled down to earth; therefore their final damnation has yet to happen. That is why they asked Jesus, *"Have you come here to torment us before the time?"* (Mt 8:29).

How can we defend ourselves from Satan and his demons? By prayer, the Sacraments, almsgiving, leading a Christian life, pardoning offenses, and soliciting the aid of our Lord, Mary, the saints, and the angels. Let me end here by speaking about the angels. They are our great allies! Each of us has a guardian angel, the most faithful of friends—who is with us twenty-four hours a day, from conception to death. The believer who lives in the presence of the Trinity and is certain of God's life within himself knows that he also has God's own Mother, who ceaselessly helps him, as well as the help of the angels and of the saints. **Therefore, how can we feel alone, abandoned, or oppressed by evil?** In the life of the believer there is pain, because it is the Cross that saves us, but there is no room for sadness. He who believes is always ready to give witness to those who ask him about the hope that sustains him (I Pet 3:15).

(Note: For many years, Fr. Amorth was the Chief Exorcist of Rome—until his death on September 16, 2016, at the age of 91. He said that, during his exorcisms, the names he invoked that the demons most hated to hear were the Blessed Mother, followed by Pope St. John Paul. Fr. Amorth wrote two books about his thousands of exorcisms).

POPE FRANCIS ON "THE SACREDNESS OF THE MASS"

Last November, a fiery Pope Francis chastised those who spend Mass talking to others, looking at their phones, or even taking pictures during papal liturgies, saying that those are distractions that take focus away from the "heart of the Church," which is the Eucharist. *"The Mass is not a show: it is a time to go to meet the Passion and Resurrection of the Lord,"* the Pope said. *"The Lord is here with us, present. Many times we go to Mass and we look at things and chat among ourselves while the priest celebrates the Eucharist... But it is the Lord!"*

In particular, Francis condemned the use of cell phones to take photos at papal Masses: *"At one point during the Mass the priest says, 'we lift up our hearts'; he does not say, 'We lift up our phones to take photographs!' It's a bad thing! And I tell you that it gives me so much sadness when I celebrate here in the Piazza or Basilica and I see so many raised cell phones, not just of the faithful, but even of some priests and bishops. But think: when you go to Mass, the Lord is there! And you're distracted. It is the Lord!"*

During the general audience, Pope Francis said the Eucharist would be the new focus of his weekly catechesis for the year, because *"it is fundamental for us Christians to understand well the value and meaning of the Holy Mass so as to live more and more fully our relationship with God. In the Eucharist we rediscover, through our senses, what is essential. Just as the Apostle Thomas asked to see and touch the wounds of Jesus after His resurrection, we need the same thing: to see Him and touch Him to be able to recognize Him."*

In this way, the Sacraments meet this very "human need" of ours, he said. And in the Eucharist, in particular, we find a privileged way to meet God and His love. He continued, *"...the Second Vatican Council was inspired by the desire to help Christians understand the beauty of the encounter in the Eucharist even better. This is why it was necessary first to implement, with the guidance of the Holy Spirit, an adequate renewal of the liturgy."*

A central theme emphasized at Vatican II was the liturgical formation of the faithful, which Francis said is also the aim of the series of catechesis he began today: to help people "grow in the knowledge of this great gift God has given us in the Eucharist." As a side note, Francis asked if people had noticed the chaotic way children make the Sign of the Cross at Mass, moving their hands all over their chests, and asked people to teach children to perform this holy action well.

"We need to teach children to make the Sign of the Cross well," he said, *noting that this is how Mass begins, because just as Mass begins this way, "so life begins, so the day begins."*

Concluding his reflection on the Mass and the Eucharist, Pope Francis said that he hopes that through these brief weekly lessons, everyone will rediscover the *"beauty hidden in the Eucharistic celebration, which, when revealed, gives full meaning to the life of everyone."*


RESPECT LIFE ROSARY


