



On Friday, September 22nd Wakelee students and staff held a reading celebration. We celebrated the second year of 100% participation in the Governor's Reading Challenge. I would like to thank the Wakelee PTO for donating gift certificates. Each student was given a raffle ticket and one student from each classroom was drawn. Students will be able to use the certificate to purchase books from our school book fair next month. We also spoke to students about setting their reading goals for the

school year. We are challenging our k-1 students to read 4,000 minutes and our grades 2-5 students to read 40 books during the course of the school year. Students then paired up with their book buddies for reading and activities. We ended the day with ice cream from an ice cream truck, which worked out nicely for the unseasonably warm weather we had been experiencing.





# Tyrrell Middle School:

Tyrrell students have recently had the opportunity to participate in two assemblies presented by special guest speakers. On October 5<sup>th</sup>, Chris Waddell presented a positive motivational assembly for students in which he shared his story. Mr. Waddell is a 13 time Paralympic medal winner and has appeared on Dateline, 20/20, and Oprah. He is the first paraplegic to climb to the summit area of Mt.

Kilimanjaro. He presented his Nametags Educational Program which emphasizes to students: "It's not what happens to you in life. It's what you do with what happens to you" Students were presented with the concept that they have the power to make choices about how they are perceived. In the face of adversity, they can choose resiliency! Students seemed to genuinely enjoy the assemblies in that many students presented Mr. Waddell with questions regarding the



adversity he has overcome as well as some of his post-accident successes.

Grade seven students took part in an assembly with a second guest speaker, Ray Lozano, who presented an empowering anti-alcohol/drug assembly. Mr. Lozano's interactive presentation style kept students engaged and focused on this important topic throughout the assembly. Ray Lozano's message was focused on the physiological and social effects of alcohol on young people. Students seemed genuinely interested and engaged as evidenced by the high level of student participation during the interactive assembly.

# Wolcott High School:

Wolcott High School is committed to helping our students become college and career ready. On Wednesday, September 20, students in Mr. D'Andrea's Anatomy and Physiology class at Wolcott High School learned about medical career options available to students after graduating high school. Following a demonstration by Alexandria Szantyr, an EMT with American Medical Response, students had the opportunity to practice taking someone's blood pressure using a stethoscope and blood pressure cuff (sphygmomanometer). Emma Adduci (photo, above), a senior at the high school, participates in the demonstration. This is just one example of how we are trying to increase student awareness and preparation for careers.



I would also like to pass along a commendation from the Autism Served and Resources of Connecticut organization. WHS student Morgan Mancini arranged a Walk, "Completing the Puzzle" and formed "Team Gillian" and solicited other teams to participate in the walk. Her efforts raised \$7,400. According to ASRC executive director Lois Rosenwald, Morgan "displays marketing and fundraising skills" and wants our community to know "a wonderful and talented student" attends our school. I certainly concur and share this as an example of the many wonderful civic and community activities in which our students engage.

### **Student Services:**

In the Pre-K 4 classroom Alcott's School Psychologist, Amanda Gorton, has been going into the class to do monthly lessons from the social thinking curriculum called We Thinkers! Students are working on skills such as thoughts and feelings as things that we experience but cannot see. Learning these skills help students to stop and think about how they can handle various situations without becoming frustrated and/or angered by choices which other students may make. The first lesson required children to work together to



follow the Group Plan, rather than following their own, individual plan to complete a project.

The month of October signifies the start of the district's comprehensive professional development calendar. Teachers and administrators are engaging in a wide-variety of learning activities to further develop their knowledge of best instructional practices. The goal of the professional learning plan is to promote continuous district and school improvement by building the collective capacity of all personnel to enhance and support the learning needs of students now and in the future. Below please find a sample of the activities taking place in October:

Elke Blanchard from Literacy How is working with teachers in grades 2 and 3 on foundational reading strategies with a focus on vocabulary development.



Kevin Fleming from ACES is working with science and social studies teachers on the integration of the Next Generation Science Standards and the new CT Social Studies Frameworks into the district's curriculum and classroom lessons.

NEASC Liaison Bill Wehrli is meeting with Wolcott High School staff as they begin their self-study in preparation for a 2019 NEASC accreditation visit.

Tracy Antonioli from I-Ready is working with high school teachers on the interpretation of I-Ready Diagnostic data to differentiate student learning and improve classroom instruction.

District and School-wide data team meetings are successfully underway.



#### School Breakfast Program

Did you know that Wolcott Public School serves breakfast as soon as your child gets off the bus?

Breakfast is served at all schools, before school starts in the café and during study halls at Tyrrell Middle and Wolcott High. The cost of breakfast is \$1.50 full paid, \$.30 reduced students and free for students who qualify.



#### Research Demonstrates the Importance of Providing Breakfast to Children and Youth



Children who eat a good breakfast tend to:

- Perform better in school
- Have better attendance
- Exhibit fewer behavior problems

In addition, children who eat a good breakfast develop healthy eating habits, visit the school nurse less frequently, and are less likely to be obese.

Despite the benefits of breakfast, for a variety of reasons, many kids aren't able to eat a healthy breakfast at home in the morning.

The School Breakfast Program offers kids a nutritious breakfast at school so they can start their day off right.
