

Tyrrell Middle School:

The School Counseling Department has been visiting classrooms throughout the school to conduct needs assessments in an effort to gather information and input from students. The information and student needs gleaned from these visits is used to inform lessons that are tailored to specific student needs in each grade level. Counseling lessons include a variety of topics that incorporate, career interest, internet safety, study skills, tolerance, and self-advocacy. In addition to whole class lessons, each counselor has begun their twice annual individual meetings with students. These meetings include reviewing personal needs data and college and career information provided to us by students via Naviance software, which students have used during School Counseling visits to classrooms.

Wolcott High School offers a class during the regular school day called Unified Sports. This is a class where students with special needs (the athletes) and students within the general education population (the coaches) come together and play a variety of sports. The goal of the class is to promote lifelong wellness while providing the opportunity for all students to support each other in social and emotional growth. Right now, the athletes and their coaches are working on developing soccer skills. The athletes are working on dribbling, passing, and scoring goals. The athletes and coaches are also working on team work and what it means to be part of a team. Many students are also involved in after school Unified Sports and there will be a soccer game coming up very soon! Everyone is invited to attend these games and support our students!


Student Services:

School Social Worker Mr. Cianchetti has begun implementing a program called Second Step along with teachers at Alcott Elementary School. The program teaches social and emotional skills for violence prevention. This researched-based program works best when school and home are in partnership with using the developed strategies. The program is designed to reduce impulsive, high-risk, and aggressive behaviors; and increase children's social-emotional competence and other protective factors.

Preschool to fifth grade teachers have already started conducting lessons for this program which includes a teacher-friendly curricula, training for educators, and parent-education components.

Through the lessons, elementary students learn to practice pro-social behaviors through group



discussions, modeling, role-playing and coaching. By understanding their emotions and how to respond to them, young students are able to remain focused on academics. The group lessons contain child-friendly, poster-size photo-lesson cards and dynamic videos depicting children expressing emotions in real-life situations.

The success of the program was evident last year as many of the children particularly enjoyed the role-playing activities within the Second Step curriculum and often asked their teachers when the next lesson would be implemented.



Student Learning & Teaching:

Starting in early September, students in grades 3-10 worked diligently through the district's first round of I-Ready assessments for this year. Students in grades K-2 will be administered the assessment starting Oct 1st. I-Ready is an adaptive diagnostic assessment taken entirely on the computer. Students are assessed three times a year in the subjects of English and math in order to determine specific areas of strength as well as those areas in need of improvement. With this detailed information in their possession, teachers apply interventions to help close academic gaps and engage in enrichment to further challenge student learning. As a result, I-Ready has proven to be extremely beneficial when monitoring a student's academic growth over time and the information gained plays a key role in the district's decisions about short and long term academic improvements.
