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### From the Board Chairman & Superintendent:

Happy New Year, Wolcott Families and Staff:

As we move into the new calendar year and the second half of the school year, we'd like to take this opportunity to update you on important projects and issues in the 2018-2019 school year.

Thanks to great collaboration from our school administrators, our additional levels of school security are going very well. Officer Mauriello has become an important part of the Tyrrell Middle School community. We appreciate the efforts of Chief Stephens to provide this additional School Resource Officer to the district this school year. Both Officer Mauriello and Officer Garguilo (WHS SRO) are available to work with our elementary schools as the need arises. The addition of our front door security staff is also going well at all of our schools K-8. These professionals are serving as the "face" of the schools when parents and others come to visit. Thank you to parents who have been very cooperative in our new procedures of sign-in/sign-out. These protocols help us better control who has access to our schools during the day.

- Thanks to the support of the Board of Education, we are making great strides with student technology. While TMS achieved a one-to-one student-to-Chromebook ratio last year, we've added a substantial number of these devices to WHS and are nearly at one-to-one this year. This means that any teacher can design technology-rich lessons at any time and almost never have trouble getting these resources into the classroom. As we finish this project, the need for our more traditional desktop computer labs will diminish. Additional student technology for our elementary schools will be part of this year's budget request to Town Council.
- In January, the Board of Education will begin the process of building its proposed budget for 2019-2020. This is the most important work that the Board does during each school year as it drives what resources and expectations will be found at the classroom level. Teachers, principals, district administrators, the Superintendent, and the Board all have a role to play in the budget process. If parents have an idea or suggestion, they are encouraged to call or email the Superintendent's office. This year, we are placing an extra emphasis on our district-wide Vision of the Graduate as a primary driver of budget decisions and strategic new projects.

### **Alcott School:**

Alcott School just completed a two week artist residency with musicians, Chuck and Mira Costa (The Sea The Sea). The two week program is called Where the Songs Come From. During the residency Chuck and Mira worked with each student in grade levels PK-5. They taught students how to write a song: You start with a blank page, have a theme, and then develop lyrics and a chorus around this theme. Students used the theme of kindness, friendship and home for their songs. These themes connect directly to our one book-one school reading initiative that we will start in March (shhh...the book is still a surprise for our students). Students shared their songs at our December town meeting performing them for friends and family members. They did a tremendous job!

Also at our December town meeting, staff and students participated in our community giveback donating a dollar or more to wear pajamas to school to raise money for CCMC. Wearing pajamas is symbolic because it shows solidarity with patients at CCMC who often wear pajamas while they are in the hospital fighting and receiving treatment for cancer. I am happy to announce that through this giveback, the Alcott community raised over \$530.00 for CCMC. Great work!

### Frisbie School:

Frisbie students are completing 3 Act Math Tasks to facilitate deep mathematical thinking. Students are shown a video on a new mathematical concept that engages and peeks their curiosity. After the video, students are asked to share what they notice and wonder about how math plays a part in the video. The teacher guides the students to investigate a mathematical wondering. During Act 2, students are given some information after quality classroom discourse about what information might be needed to solve the problem. Students then work in groups to solve the problem and almost always students use different methods to arrive at the same solution. Act 3 is the reveal of the actual answer after students have shown their peers how they arrived at their solution. This reveal is the most exciting part of the task as students learn from their mistakes and that there are different ways to approach a problem. These 3 Act Math Tasks are getting students excited about everyday math while promoting a positive growth mindset.







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### Wakelee School:







The Wakelee Variety Show was a hit with all the student body. I would like to congratulate all the student acts for their preparation and willingness to perform before such a large audience. I would also like to thank the committee of teachers that worked together to run the show so seamlessly.

Wakelee students and staff were able to raise \$757 for CCMC PJ Day. The students were also treated to a visit from Adam Miller from KC 101, who stopped by the Wakelee assembly on his way to CCMC. # **Assistant Superintendent:**

**Update on I-LEAP Projects:** Last spring, teachers were invited to bring forth proposals for the first annual I-LEAP Projects. I-LEAP, the Incubator for Learning, Engagement, Assessment and Pedagogy, gives teachers an opportunity to pilot innovative, out-of-the-box projects that would have a significant and positive impact on instructional practice, student engagement and school culture. If successful, these projects could be expanded into other grade levels and schools. Four projects were selected for piloting this year. Two of the projects will be highlighted in this newsletter and the remaining two will be reported on in the spring.

At Tyrrell Middle School, the "Sweets and a Smile" I-LEAP project is well underway. The teachers leading this pilot are Bethany Stango and Avery Doyle along with students in their Life Skills class. Assisting in the project are Pam Conway and students in Project Explore. The mission of "Sweets and a Smile" is to assist in developing connections among students in the Life Skills program, their peers and Tyrrell Middle School staff. The teachers and students involved in this project created a coffee cart program to facilitate these connections in order to further support students' communication and daily living skills. The students in the Life Skills program and their peer mentors are significantly benefiting from the collaborative efforts and the real-world experiences that this program offers.

In fourth grade classrooms throughout the district, teacher Nancy Warzecha is implementing a new coding curriculum as part of her I-LEAP project titled, "Cracking the Code." Students are utilizing the code.org resources to learn text-based coding in their computer classes and the results thus far have been extremely positive, as students are engaging in innovative problem-solving activities in a highly collaborative environment.

# Business & Operations:



Winter is officially here! To prepare for the winter season, the Wolcott Public School's Safety and Wellness Committee has launched a campaign to help raise awareness and reduce accidents and injuries during the winter months.

With winter arriving, the Wolcott Public School Safety and Wellness Committee offer the following tips:

- Dress appropriately for outdoor activities, especially when waiting for the bus. Wear several thin layers to stay dry and warm, and don't forget warm boots, gloves/mittens, and a hat!
- Choose the right footwear. Soles that provide good traction are best for maneuvering on snow and ice. Avoid leather soles and shoes with high heels.
- Try to stay in designated walkways where our maintenance staff directs their snow and ice removal efforts.
- Watch out for black ice, particularly in parking lots.
- Use caution at entrances where snow is tracked in.
- Report icy conditions to district staff.
